SUBJECT: Approval for Sex Offender Management Discretionary Grant Application

That the Board of Supervisors:

A. Authorize the Chief Probation Officer to apply for, and if awarded, receive up to \$250,000 in Sex Offender Management Discretionary Grant funds through the U. S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Program's Bureau of Justice Assistance, as well as all related contracts or extensions with the U.S. Department of Justice.

Alignment with Board Strategic Plan:

The recommendations(s) are primarily aligned with Goal No.2. A Safe and Healthy Community in Which to Live, Work, and Visit, and Goal No.7. Strengthen the Safety and Well-Being of Children and their Families to Ensure a Strong Future for our Community.

Executive Summary and Discussion:

The Probation Department is mandated to provide supervision for offenders. Of high priority is the management of sex offenders released into the community subject to special terms and conditions of probation. These offenders present a threat to the safety of our community and Deputy Probation Officers assigned to specialized sex offender caseloads must provide immediate response when identifiable potential victims are presented.

Our grant application addresses the need to begin a full assessment of Santa Barbara County's ability to provide effective sex offender management. The funding agency requires a collaborative approach and the Probation Department has been successful in securing the participation of the Superior Court, District Attorney, Public Defender, Department of Social Services, Alcohol, Drug and Mental Health Services,

Sheriff's Department, Sexual Abuse Response Team, Child Abuse Listening and Mediation, Santa Maria Police Department, Santa Barbara Police Department, Lompoc Police Department, and University of California at Santa Barbara Police Department.

Should we be selected for a grant award, it is proposed that our efforts focus on the following primary areas:

- The establishment of an ongoing Sex Offender Management Collaborative Policy Council that will provide oversight of interagency efforts. Additional efforts will be made for the inclusion of representatives from the Departments of California State Parole and California Youth Authority.
- Development of a shared data collection system wherein data elements will be identified, information shared amongst the partner agencies to the extent legally allowable, and data used to provide ongoing project evaluation.
- The selection of an assessment tool to better determine the level of risk posed by a sex offender upon release to the community is essential to securing public safety. The utilization of an assessment specialist will ensure consistent application. A North County assessment provider is yet to be selected.
- The implementation of a "vertical supervision" model similar to the method of vertical prosecution used by the District Attorney's Office will be initiated by Probation. Following conviction, high-risk sex offenders will have their cases assigned to a specialized sex offender management Deputy Probation Officer who is trained and experienced. This officer will be responsible for the investigation and recommendation as to sentencing of the offender. Should the offender be granted probation, the same Deputy Probation Officer will be responsible for supervision. Utilizing this method, reduction of harm to the victim will hopefully be achieved in that there will not be multiple Deputy Probation Officers with whom they must become acquainted. As written in our project narrative, the offender can currently be exposed to a minimum of three Deputy Probation Officers prior to the initiation of active supervision. By using a "vertical supervision" model, manipulation by the offender will be minimized, case management and communication can be achieved without redundancy, and case management is seamless in that there is no inactive time during which the case is in transfer status.

Mandates and Service Levels:

Acceptance of the Sex Offender Management Discretionary Grant requires the services provided by the County of Santa Barbara to comply with the Federal grant requirements for: submission of progress and financial reports, lobbying, debarment, suspension, and other responsibility matters, grant records access, Federal Fair Labor Standards Act, drug-free workplace, civil rights compliance, and non-supplantation of funds

The Probation Department is governed by numerous statutory mandates which are attached for your review.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

There will be no anticipated facility impacts and there will be no increase in General Fund contribution.

The Sex Offender Program grant application consists of a \$250,000 federal grant covering a two-year service period October 1, 2004, to September 31, 2006. The grant amount and service period are the maximum allowable under for this federal grant. The grant required match is defined as 25 % of the total federal grant award or \$62,500 (i.e. \$250,000 grant award x 25 % = \$62,500 required match). The required match will consist of General Fund financed Probation indirect cost rate proposal (ICRP) costs not already matched to other grant or entitlement funding sources.

The \$250,000 grant award will pay for an additional Deputy Probation Officer to replace an officer previously deleted due to funding reductions, subcontracted assessment services provided by local community-based organizations, and specialized sex offender management training.

If the grant is approved by the federal Office of Justice Programs (OJP), we will present to your Board either a Final Budget Adjustment, or Budget Revision for fiscal year 2004-2005 (the first year of the grant).
