Jail Analysis Report Overview

April 1, 2025: Request of the Board of Supervisors for CCP to review jail population

Purpose: Analyze jail population and assess diversion program effectiveness and facility needs

Jail Data Analysis Ad Hoc Subcommittee: Created with participation from county departments, community organizations, and the public

Data Review and Recommendations: Extensive jail population data and existing diversion and criminal justice strategies reviewed to inform recommendations

Jail Population Data-2024

The 2024 jail population was stable but heavily unsentenced and felony-driven.

- **Demographics (2024):** Most admissions were male, Hispanic, and aged 30–49
- Jail Population: ADP stable at ~745; admissions and releases closely aligned
- Felony Prevalence: 87% of inmates incarcerated for a felony
- Custody Status: Majority unsentenced (73% in 2024; 82% in July 2025 snapshot)
- Serious Mental Illness (SMI): On average, about 11% of the jail population carries an SMI designation at any point in time.
- Average Length of Stay (ALOS): Longest for Part I Felony Violent offenses (58.1 days)

Projected Impacts of Recommended Strategies

Estimates suggest recommended strategies could lower the jail population.

Release on Bed Availability:

 In FY 2024–25, direct placement could have reduced the average daily jail population by ~ 9

READY Program Expansion:

 Expanding READY to the South County could reduce the average daily jail population by ~10

Reduced Length of Stay (LOS):

- A one-day reduction in the overall average LOS could lower the average daily population by ~33
- Larger reductions yield proportionally greater savings

Progress to Date

Current efforts driving diversion, early intervention, and alternatives to custody.

- Release on Bed Availability Monitoring and Internal Dashboard
- Adult Diversion Strategic Planning Initiative
- Reentry, Early Access, and Diversion (READY Program) Expansion
- Alternative Sentencing (AS)
- Sobering Centers

Next Steps

Recommended and existing strategies require ongoing collaboration and review.

Jail Population Review & Advisory Team (JPRAT):

- Requires clear goals, participants, and distinct structure from existing groups
- Regularly review individuals/groups eligible for release
- Focus on data-driven strategies and performance measures
- Improve system efficiency
- Established November 2025

Board Recommended Actions

- Receive and file a report from the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP)
 on the County jail population, strategies and recommendations on possible
 population reduction strategies; and
- Determine pursuant to CEQA Guidelines 15378(b)(5) that the above actions are not a project subject to CEQA review, because they are government administrative activities that do not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.
