#### **Recommended Actions:**

That the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. Approve and, contingent on the University of California Regents' first signing the four separate agreements between the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB) and the County of Santa Barbara addressing the impacts of UCSB growth under the proposed 2010 Long-Range Development Plan (2010 LRDP), authorize the Chair to sign the same agreements. The four agreements, attached hereto as Attachments A-D, are as follows:
  - A. Long Range Development Plan Mitigation Implementation and Settlement Agreement (addressing traffic and housing);
  - B. Cooperative Agreement for Fire Protection, Emergency Response and Paramedic Services:
  - C. Cooperative Agreement for Law Enforcement;
  - D. Cooperative Agreement for Isla Vista Community Improvements.
- 2. Accept the CEQA Exemption pursuant to Section 15378(a) and 15378 (b) (4) of the Guidelines for Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act, included as Attachment E, and authorize the filing of a Notice of Exemption.

3. Approve and authorize the Chair to sign the letter in Attachment F to the University of California Regents indicating the County's conditional support of the Long Range Development Plan, subject to execution of the four agreements.

## **SUMMARY AND DISCUSSION:**

## **Summary of Proposed Long Range Development Plan:**

UCSB is a world-class institution of higher education that enriches the community and figures prominently in the lives of County residents. UCSB is updating its Long-Range Development Plan (LRDP) which governs campus growth and development. At the meeting of the UC Regents on September 14 through 16, UCSB intends to present its 2010 LRDP together with the four agreements to the UC Regents for approval and acceptance of the associated environmental impact report (EIR). Following approval by the UC Regents, the 2010 LRDP will also require certification by the California Coastal Commission before it becomes effective.

As summarized in the table below, the proposed 2010 LRDP envisions significant UCSB growth in population over the next 15 years. To accomplish its academic planning goals, UCSB proposes to increase the size, extent, and capacity of campus development and increase campus population and enrollment by in excess of 11,000 people.

UCSB currently has some 2.7 million assignable square feet of academic and support space in eight categories, plus an additional 169,000 gross square feet of building space on the Devereux property acquired in 2007. As shown in the table below, UCSB is proposing almost 1.8 million square feet of additional academic and support space as part of the 2010 LRDP:<sup>2</sup>

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# **Analysis of Long Range Development Plan:**

The additional growth proposed under the 2010 LRDP would place additional demands on public services and infrastructure, especially fire protection, law enforcement and transportation infrastructure. Normally, the County of Santa Barbara would be in a position to mitigate the impacts resulting from a development project within its jurisdiction through its lead agency status under CEQA and in the context of a required planning permit. In the case of development on a University campus, local jurisdictions, including the County, are not lead or responsible agencies under CEQA and do not have any permit authority over campus development. The County may comment on and ultimately challenge the CEQA review for a University project.

In addition to the lack of permit authority, the County of Santa Barbara does not collect property taxes associated with University development. While UCSB is exempt from payment of property taxes, the County has historically provided services to UCSB without direct monetary compensation. The gap between costs and revenues for services necessary to support the University has grown wider over time, and according to a study developed for the County by consultant EPS, this gap will grow to an estimated \$8.3 million per year in 2025.

In 2008, the County provided extensive comments on UCSB's draft environmental impact report (DEIR) for the 2010 LRDP. In response to comments received on the document, UCSB re-circulated the DEIR in early 2009. The County sent UCSB extensive comments on the re-circulated DEIR (RDEIR) in March 2009.

The County initiated joint negotiations with UCSB in the fall of 2009, following comments on UCSB's re-circulated DEIR. Over the past year, the County has engaged UCSB in negotiations to address the impacts of UCSB growth under the 2010 LRDP on County infrastructure and services. The City of Goleta, which would also be directly affected by UCSB growth, has also participated in these negotiations. The agreements presented for the Board's consideration today are the result of these negotiation efforts.

Staff is recommending that the Board approve and, contingent on the University of California Regents' first signing the four agreements, authorize the Chair to sign the same agreements. Should the University and Regents approve some, but not all of the agreements, staff will return to the Board for further direction.

#### **CEQA Exemption**

Pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines Section 15378(a) and 15378(b)(4), the four agreements with the University of California that are the subject of this Board letter address government funding mechanisms for the provision of public services required to serve UCSB and growth proposed under UCSB's 2010 LRDP, including transportation and housing, fire protection and emergency services, law enforcement, and services and infrastructure improvements to serve the Isla Vista community. Many such services currently exist. County's included promise not to bring suit to challenge the validity of the 2010 LRDP and 2010 LRDP EIR also is not a project subject to the requirements of CEQA. Where the agreements refer to any specific project (such as particular road improvement or infrastructure projects), any

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necessary project-specific environmental review required by CEQA will have been completed prior to commencement of the project.

## Form and Terms of the Agreements:

Negotiations with UCSB have resulted in four separate agreements which comprehensively address the potential impacts of 2010 LRDP growth on County infrastructure and Services. County staff from all affected County Departments, including County Executive Office, Planning & Development, Public Works, Fire and Sheriff, were involved in the negotiations and are satisfied that the proposed terms would substantially offset the impacts of 2010 LRDP growth. The salient terms of these agreements are summarized below:

- 1. Mitigation Implementation Agreement addressing enrollment commitments, housing and traffic (tri-party agreement between City of Goleta, County of Santa Barbara and UCSB).
  - UCSB student enrollment capped at 25,000 students.
  - UCSB will provide housing for all new students (5,000 new beds) phased in step with enrollment growth.
  - Over the course of the 2010 LRDP, UCSB will construct 1,874 new faculty/staff units phased to meet the demand caused by the LRDP growth.
  - Any student housing provided off campus is in addition to UCSB's 5,000 new bed commitment; UCSB must negotiate in good faith to provide mitigation of service and infrastructure impacts of such additional housing.
  - County will not oppose housing projects consistent with analysis in the 2010 LRDP.
  - UCSB will mitigate its projected 2,170 p.m. peak hour trip (PHT) increase from 2010 LRDP growth by paying the County a total of \$3,119,318 for area traffic improvements (Los Carneros/Mesa Road intersection improvements, Los Carneros widening, Storke Road widening). Substantial additional funds are also provided to City of Goleta for area traffic improvements within the City of Goleta.
  - UCSB will monitor actual traffic generation through a prescribed monitoring program.
  - If UCSB-generated traffic exceeds the projected additional 2,170 PHT and UCSB is unsuccessful in reducing trips through other means, then for each trip in excess of the projected 2,170 PHT, UCSB will pay the average of the City and County's GTIP fee for each trip in excess of the projected additional 2,170 PHT. Based on the current GTIP fees, the Supplemental Trip Fee in excess of 2,170 PHT would be \$14,215 per trip.
- 2. Isla Vista Foot Patrol Cooperative Services Agreement addressing County and UCSB law enforcement (two-party agreement between County of Santa Barbara and UCSB).
  - Ongoing commitment by UCSB to maintain the current UCSB staffing of seven UC Police
    officers to the Isla Vista Foot Patrol (IVFP) office, with enforceable and enhanced staffing
    requirements (UC Police officers must be available for regular duty, UCSB to fund overtime
    to County for any unmet staffing commitment).
  - UCSB commitment of an additional 2.25 officers to be temporarily assigned to the IVFP during nights and weekends, in step with enrollment growth.

- A separate, operational MOU has been developed and will be maintained to address specific staffing and scheduling issues at the IVFP.
- 3. Fire Cooperative Services Agreement addressing provision of Fire Department services to UCSB (two-party agreement between County of Santa Barbara and UCSB).
  - UCSB to provide ongoing funding for 70 % of the firefighter posts at Station 17 necessary to serve the existing population on campus at a ratio of one firefighter post for every 4,000 students (2.04 additional firefighter posts) to achieve full 2-in/2-out capability to protect existing UCSB development at current student levels, at a current cost of \$979,112 annually. This funding will be comprised of estimated revenue from emergency medical response services at UCSB (\$600,000) and payment of \$379,112 annually (adjusted based upon 55% of the actual cost of a post).
  - UCSB to fund 100% of the cost of additional firefighter posts needed to serve new UCSB student enrollment growth at a ratio of one firefighter post for every 4,000 students, which equates to 1.25% of a post at full enrollment of 25,000. At the current cost of a post, this commitment represents \$858,750 annually.
  - County to assume emergency medical response services at UCSB (currently provided by UC Police). Additionally, the County will maintain and UCSB will fund their current student emergency medical technician (EMT) intern program (\$83,500 annually).
  - UCSB agrees to fund the cost of a replacement ambulance.
  - UCSB to construct a replacement to Fire Station 17 in the event UCSB demolishes the station.
  - UCSB agrees to lease to the County a one-acre parcel on West Campus for development of a future fire station.
  - UCSB to make payments to the County in lieu of property tax for any faculty or staff units which are leased or rented instead of sold.
- 4. Isla Vista Cooperative Relations Agreement addressing IV Programs, such as a parking program and sidewalk and intersection safety improvements (two-party agreement between County of Santa Barbara and UCSB).
  - UCSB will give the County a total of \$3,600,000 for improvements in Isla Vista that facilitate circulation between Isla Vista and the UCSB campuses (\$1.6 million of these funds have been allocated from El Colegio by separate agreement and the remaining \$2 million will be provided based upon student growth at a rate of \$400/student over the current 20,000 enrollment cap).
  - UCSB agrees to participate in the development and implementation of a parking program for Isla Vista.
  - University agrees to support programs in Isla Vista, such as alcohol and drug awareness,
     Greek life extracurricular opportunities and community service, and Isla Vista Master
     Planning efforts of the County.

Negotiation with UCSB of the settlement and cooperative agreements was funded by the CEO's and the Planning and Development Department's budgets for Fiscal Year 2009-2010 and 2010-2011. In the current budget, see Long Range Planning, Community Plans, at page D-328.

## Fiscal Analysis:

The agreements would provide capital to Public Works for transportation improvements in the Goleta and Isla Vista areas, capital and operational funds to the Fire Department, and operational assistance and funding for any unmet operational commitments of UCSB to the Sheriff's department for the Isla Vista Foot Patrol.
