I support the odor issue being dealt with separately from the rest of the cannabis Land Use Amendments. We in Carpinteria have been dealing with this for the last 3 years and can not wait for this to be resolved only by winter of 2021 - that would make this problem last for 4 years.

We need this odor problem to be dealt with as soon as possible because our health and quality of life are suffering. In Carpinteria, it is not fair that 24 operators are causing this nuisance for approximately 20,000 residents.

It is incumbent on your board to require that in order to operate a cannabis cultivation site and a processing site, there needs to be carbon filters installed in both and by a certain date to continue to operate while their land use permit is being applied for. The vapor phase system that many use does not work, is spewing more stuff into the air and is causing health issues for some. Odor must not leave the property. Opening vents in greenhouses is akin to growing outdoors and the residents in Carpinteria need to be protected, not the cannabis growers.

Your board also needs to deal properly with expansion of nonconforming sites. At last week's hearing re: Herbal Angels I don't think you understood properly that <u>their expansion was never investigated</u> because they then applied for their land use permit and were then excused. That must not happen again. There must be some punishment for flouting rules for non-conforming.

Please deny the Santa Barbara West Coast Farms Project. This is another large grow along our beautiful Corridor into the Santa Rita Hills Wine Appellation.

Our beautiful rural lifestyle will be forever polluted by irresponsibly allowing the proliferation of industrial cannabis production operations like Busy Bee to line the scenic rural corridor along Hwy 246 called out in the Santa Ynez Valley Plan, and in close proximity to NINETEEN ADDITIONAL huge cannabis cultivation projects threatening to engulf our pristine neighborhoods. Please consider the **Cumulative Impacts of Project Clusters**.
