

[edit] Introduction to the subject matter

The nuclear incident at the Fukushima Diaichi power plant has sparked a renewed interest in evaluation of the risks posed by nuclear power plants worldwide, among them Diablo Canyon Power Plant (DCPP) in San Luis Obispo County, California. As you can read in the <u>Diablo Canyon Power Plant</u> chapter, it was built in close proximity to numerous earthquake fault zones, and is a source of on-going public policy debate.

According to wikipedia, Diablo Canyon was originally designed to withstand a 6.75 magnitude earthquake from four faults, including the nearby San Andreas fault|San Andreas and Hosgri faults, [1] but was later upgraded to withstand a 7.5 magnitude quake. [2] Recent public disclosure of the existence of the Shoreline fault proximal to DCPP has created renewed public interest in the current ongoing re-licensing [3] application of DCPP, including calls for a suspension of the licensing process until the seismic studies are complete. [4] Although the plant has redundant seismic monitoring and a safety system designed to shut it down promptly in the event of significant ground motion, there remains considerable public concern about safety.
