

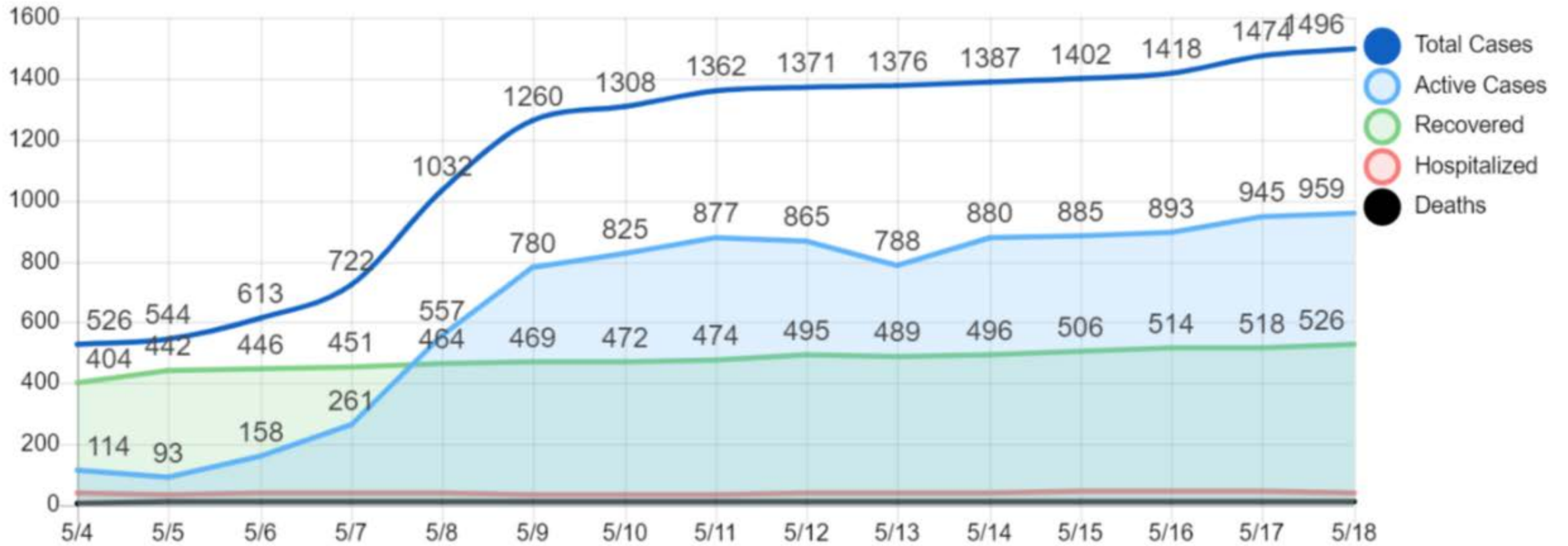

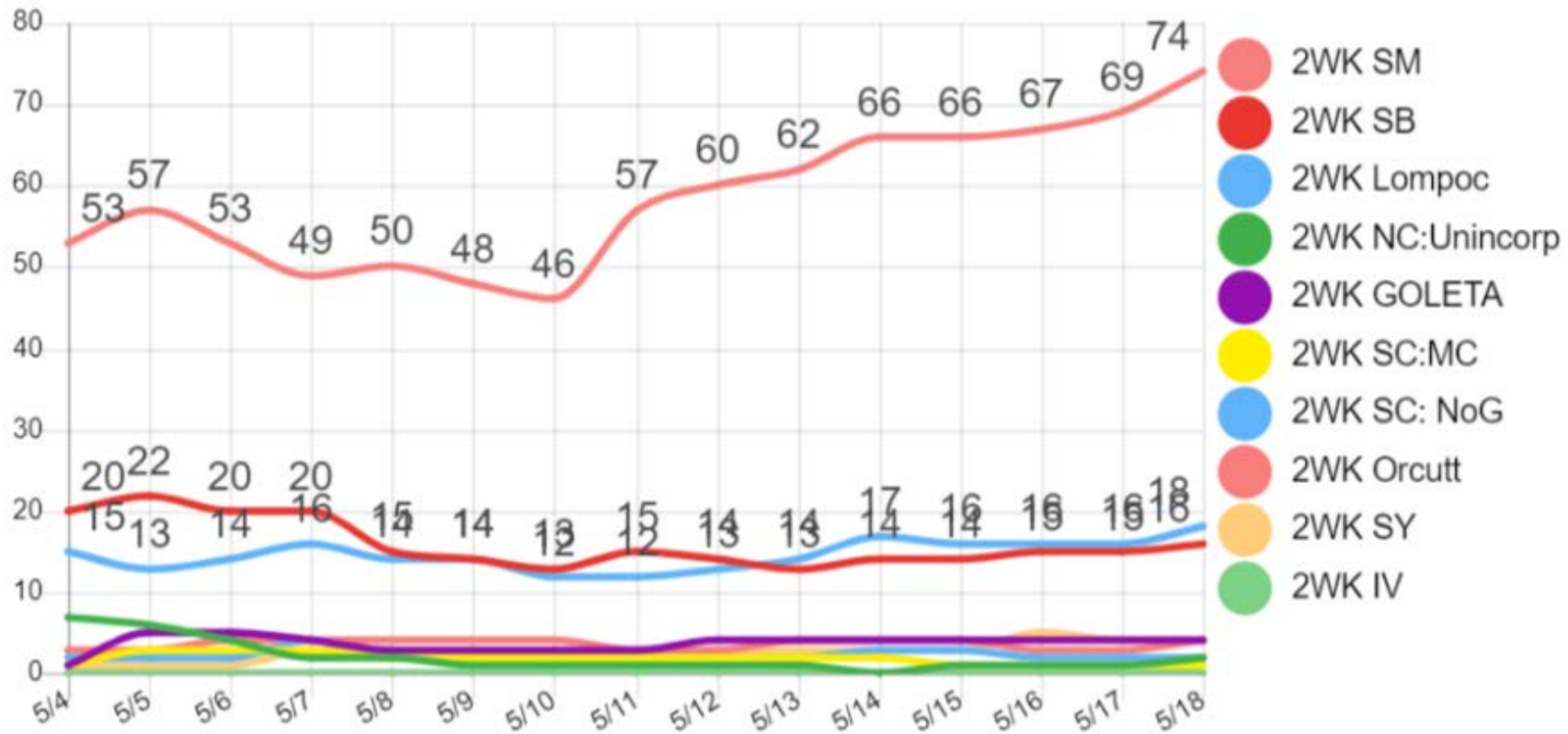
Santa Barbara County COVID-19 By The Numbers

CASE STATUS



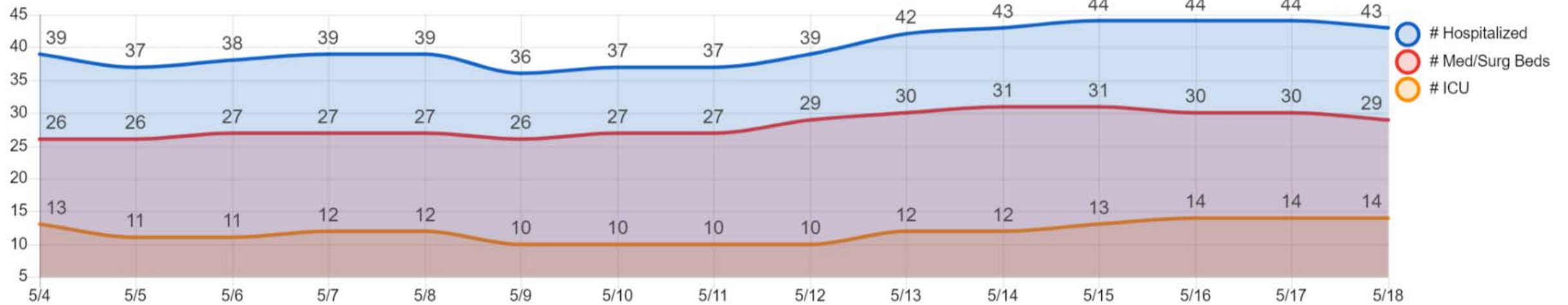

Stages for Reopening California



STAGE 1: Safety and preparedness

Make workplaces safe for our essential workers.



STAGE 2: Lower-risk workplaces

Gradually reopen retail (curbside only), child care, manufacturing & logistics. Later, relax retail restrictions, adapt & reopen schools, offices & limited hospitality, personal services.



STAGE 3: Higher-risk workplaces

Adapt and reopen movie theaters, religious services, & more personal & hospitality services.



STAGE 4: End of Stay Home Order

Reopen areas of highest risk: e.g. Concerts, conventions, sports arenas.



Stage 2: Re-opening of lower-risk workplaces

➤ Variance in Stage 2

- SBC can move more quickly through the Initial Stage 2, if we meet State's readiness criteria
- SBC must stay in Stage 2; *cannot advance into Stage 3 until Governor moves State into Stage 3*



Stage 2: Re-opening of lower-risk workplaces

➤ If approved for variance:

- Destination retail, including shopping malls and swap meets
- Personal services, limited to: car washes & tanning facilities
- Office based businesses (telework still strongly encouraged)
- Dine-in restaurants (other facility amenities, like bars or gaming areas, are not permitted)
- School and childcare facilities

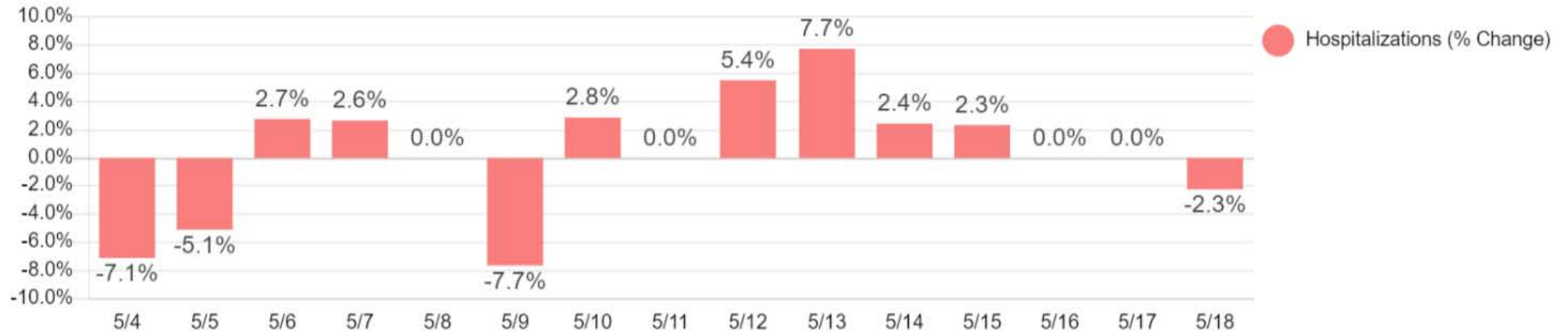


NEW Local Variance Criteria:

➤ Stable or down trending hospitalization

- 7-day average of daily percent change of less than 5% OR no more than 20 COVID hospitalizations on any single day in the past 14 days
 - SBC's 7-day average of daily percent change is 2.2%

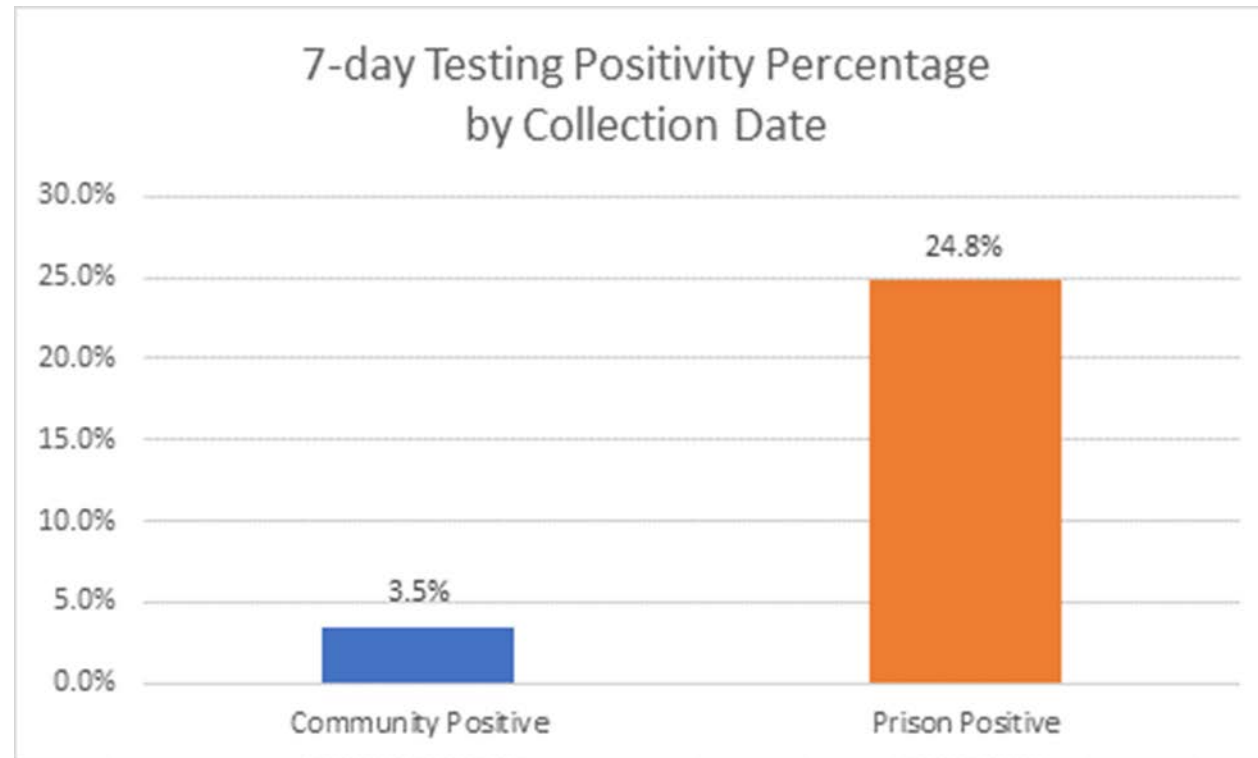
DAILY CHANGE IN HOSPITAL CENSUS



NEW Local Variance Criteria:

➤ Cases per population count and Test positivity rate

- Less than 25 new cases per 100,000 residents in the past 14 days OR *less than 8% testing positive in the past 7 days.*



Local Variance Criteria

➤ Protection of Stage One Essential Workers Status:

- Clear guidance for employers and essential critical infrastructure workplaces to protect essential workers
- Availability of disinfectant supplies and protective gear

➤ Testing Capacity:

- Minimum daily testing of 1.5 per 1,000 residents

➤ Containment Capacity:

- At least 15 contact tracers per 100,000 residents
- Ability to temporarily house at least 15% of county residents experiencing homelessness



Regional Variance Criteria, cont.

➤ Hospital Capacity:

- County or Regional capacity to accommodate a minimum surge of 35%
- Hospital facilities must have a robust plan to protect hospital workforce

➤ Vulnerable Populations

- Additional coordination criteria (NEW!)
- Skilled nursing facilities must have more than 14 day supply of PPE on hand for staff with ongoing procurement from non-state supply chains

➤ Sectors and Timelines

- Which sectors and spaces will be opened, in what sequence, and what timeline

➤ Triggers for Adjusting Modifications

- Metrics that serve as triggers for either slowing the pace through Stage 2, or tightening modifications

Next Steps

- PH Department ready to submit attestation of meeting readiness criteria
- Began attestation process with phone consultation with CDPH
- Letters of support received from area hospitals
- Requesting letter of support from Board of Supervisors
- Submit Variance Attestation Form
- Readiness plan will be posted publicly on CDPH's website
- HO Orders will be release with allowance & guidance for sectors



Governor's Roadmap Stages

Stage 1 – “Early” Stage 2 (Open Now)

- Ag and livestock
- Auto dealerships
- Childcare
- Communications
- Construction
- Delivery services
- Energy/utilities
- Food packing
- Hotels and lodging for essential workers
- Life sciences
- Logistics and warehousing
- Manufacturing
- Mining and logging
- Office spaces – essential workers
- Ports
- Public Transit
- Real estate transactions
- Retail – curbside only
- Limited person services: car washes, pet grooming, tanning facilities, landscape gardening
- Office-based business (telework still recommended)
- Outdoor museums and open gallery spaces

“Late” Stage 2 (Not Open until Attestation)

- Destination retail, including shopping malls, swap meets
- Dine-in restaurants

Stage 3-4 (Not Open until Governor allows)

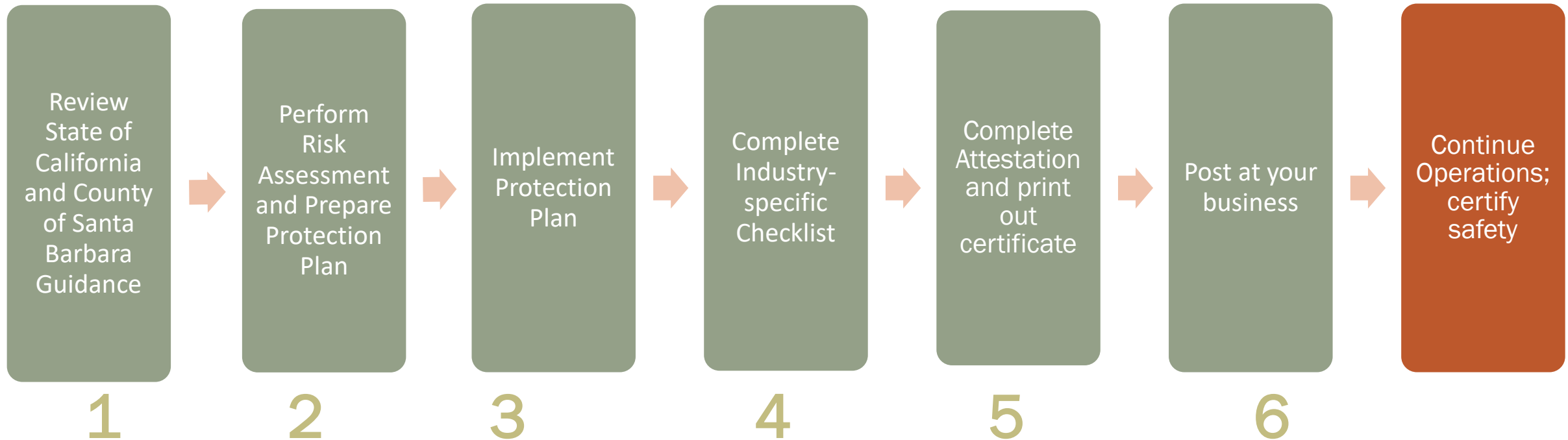
- Beverage industry – bars and lounges
- Hair and nail salons, barbers
- Body art
- Gyms
- Faith-based community services
- Events/venues/attractions
- Hotels and lodging for tourism and leisure





BUSINESSES ALREADY OPEN

Existing open businesses will need to follow the steps below and complete the attestation.



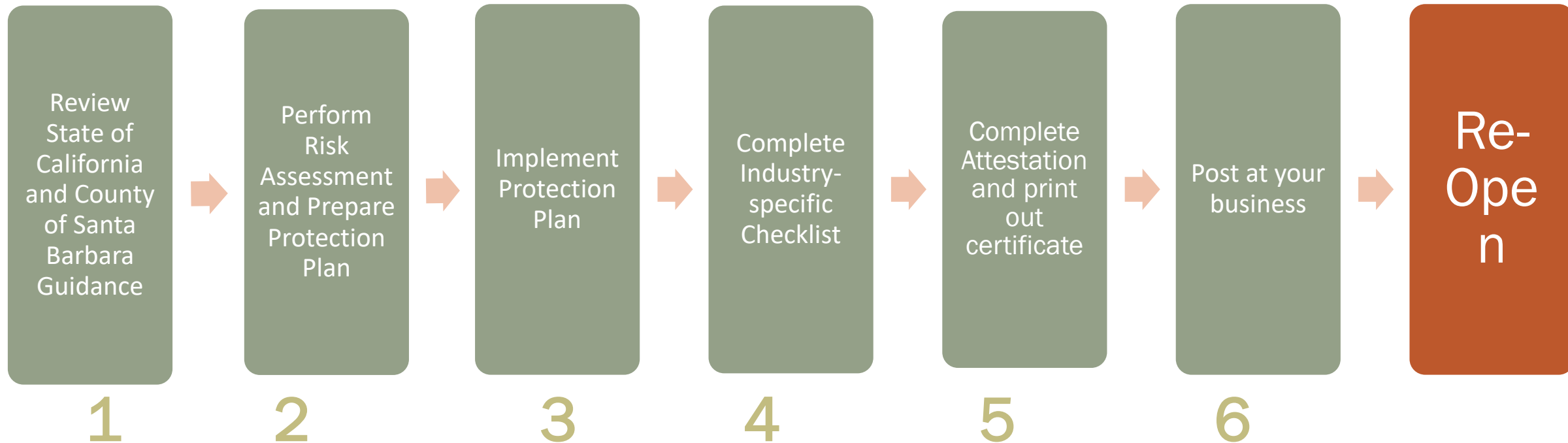


RISE

REOPENING IN SAFE ENVIRONMENT

BUSINESSES WITH NO SIGNIFICANT OR MINOR MODIFICATIONS

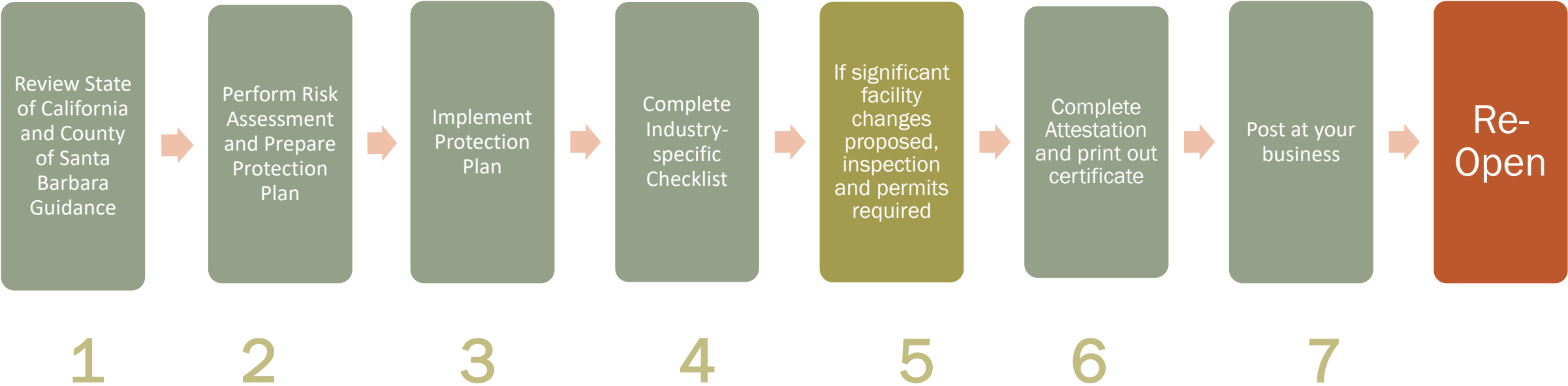
Businesses can reopen, in their currently approved square footage, after they meet each of the steps. **They do not need a formal inspection** before they open as long as they have followed the guidelines, have made no significant modification or made minor modification (movement or elimination of tables, furnishings or racks) without fire risk to their facility.





BUSINESSES WITH SIGNIFICANT MODIFICATION

Businesses in their currently approved square footage with significant modifications (new interior construction, changes to kitchen configuration) **require a permit and inspection from appropriate agencies** before opening. This may include County Environmental Health and your local Planning Department. They will also need to followed the guidelines below.





Santa Barbara County RISE Self Certification

The County of Santa Barbara has provided all currently available industry guidance by stage of reopening in accordance with the State's Resiliency Roadmap. The goal is to create a safe clean environment for workers and customers. Business may use effective or innovative methods to build on the guidance.

Review the guidance that is relevant to your workplace, prepare a plan based on the guidance for your industry, and put it into action. When complete, you can post the industry-specific checklist in your workplace to show your customers and your employees that you've reduced the risk and are open for business.
