

Site Purpose & Activation Thresholds

Disaster Care Site	Threshold for Activation
Temporary Evacuation Points (TEPs)	 <u>Initial</u> safe gathering place related to an evacuation Typically outdoors with limited services Activated by field command or EOC
Evacuation Centers	 An indoor facility that provides temporary location related to an evacuation Greater evacuation services for the public are needed, but not overnight services Activated by field command or EOC
General Population Congregate Shelters	 Evacuation warnings/orders in effect overnight Typically indoor shelter with food, bedding and other services Activated by field command or EOC





Site Purpose & Activation Thresholds

Disaster Care Site	Threshold for Activation
Warming Centers	 General population indoor resource site to stay warm Activation: Overnight temperature of 35°F or less is forecast; AND Disruption to electricity/natural gas services is expected to last more than 2 hours
Cooling Centers	 General population indoor resource site to stay cool Activation: NWS issues an Excessive Heat Watch or Warning Temperatures significantly above normal, for multiple days with little cooling at night
County Power Outage Resource Centers	 Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) or other power outage occurs or is forecast to occur lasting longer than 24 consecutive hours Activation: Whether SCE or PG&E are providing services Recommended by OEM with DES approval

Primary Agencies for Disaster Care Program



- County Dept. Social Services:
 - Lead disaster care agency
 - Staffs EOC's Care and Shelter Branch
 - Maintain County's program and this plan
- County Public Health Dept:
 - Medical, environmental, and animal support to disaster care services
 - Staffs EOC's Public Health and Medical Services Branch





Primary Agencies for Disaster Care Program


- County Office of Emergency Management:
 - Coordinates with all jurisdictions within the county and state/federal agencies
 - Provides 24/7/365 on call coverage
 - Staffs multiple EOC positions
 - Maintains operational readiness of the EOC
- American Red Cross:
 - Lead disaster care site operator (MoU)
 - Subject matter expert
 - Staffs EOC's Red Cross Branch

Finance and Department Reimbursement

- Departments are responsible for tracking their own costs
- If eligible for state or federal reimbursement:
 - CEO Budget Office will coordinate the financial recovery process
 - Departments will provide their cost documentation as needed
- Department may request GF reimbursement
 - Submit request to CEO Budget Office
 - State/federal reimbursement funds would then go to the General Fund
