I am a long-time resident of Santa Barbara (I grew up and worked here, attended San Marcos High and SB City College) and I have watched our world evolve as we adjust to economic impacts and social changes. When I was a boy, I watched all of the benches and picnic tables get removed from East Beach due to homeless individuals taking them over. This seems to be the norm in many areas of Santa Barbara. Lots of our beautiful local vegetation gets removed to discourage encampments. Trash is left in piles around these encampments with little consequence. I don't want to come off as heartless because these individuals need care and redirection. It just should not be at the expense of the residents and visitors.

Now that I am a senior in the community, one of my greatest joys has been to get a cup of coffee and a breakfast sandwich or pastry from a local merchant and park for a brief period of time on Channel Dive to enjoy the morning and the spectacular view back towards Santa Barbara harbor. I am disabled and have been limited in my walking for some time. I used to go to lunch at the Biltmore to enjoy the view, but that has not been an option for some time now.

For the past several months, 2 large RVs have been parked every day – all day – in this prime viewing location (see the pictures below). You can tell they are permanent residents as they have their wheels blocked up and windows covered. How is this fair to the rest of us? Why doesn't the Sheriff's department do something about this? This feels like just one more take away from hard

working, tax paying citizens. This is not accommodating unfortunate individuals that have found themselves homeless. This is a takeover of prime community property for the sole and exclusive use by two individuals (or families) in large campers.

Please address this situation. There are other campers that park every day along this stretch, but these two are the ones that block the prized viewing location. Can't you post a 2 to 3 hour parking limit that would accommodate the beach goers and discourage campers?


