Recommended Actions:

That the Board of Supervisors:

- A. Approve, and authorize the Chair of the Board of Supervisors to execute the following amendments to subrecipient agreements for State of California Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP) funds with the specified subrecipients in the specified amounts, subject to annual appropriations and budget approval:
 - i. First Amendment to Subrecipient Agreement with Good Samaritan Shelter (Good Samaritan) allocating \$1,214,850 in additional funds for Outreach, Case Management, and Housing Assistance to be fully expended by June 30, 2025, for an increased total GSS Subrecipient Agreement contract amount of \$2,349,700;
 - ii. First Amendment to Subrecipient Agreement with Legal Aid Foundation of Santa Barbara County (Legal Aid) allocating \$205,000 in additional funds for disability benefits advocacy and legal services to be fully expended by June 30, 2025, for an increased total Legal Aid Subrecipient Agreement contract amount of \$490,000; and
- B. Determine that the above recommended actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) per CEQA Guidelines Section 15378(b)(4), since the recommended actions

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are government fiscal activities which do not involve commitment to any specific project which may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment.

Summary Text:

The CA Dept of Social Services sent a letter, dated August 10, 2022, to every county director allocating additional funding in the amount of \$1,526,720 from the California Department of Social Services to expand the Housing Disability and Advocacy Program (HDAP) in Santa Barbara County. HDAP offers outreach, case management, housing assistance, and disability benefits advocacy including legal services. HDAP participants receive program services until a final disability benefits determination is made and the participant is stabilized in permanent housing. With the additional HDAP funding, HDAP subrecipients Good Samaritan and Legal Aid will expand their programs to provide intensive support for HDAP participants' long term housing stability and self-sufficiency.

Staff is requesting that the Board of Supervisors approve and authorize the Chair to execute the following amendments to subrecipient agreements to provide for additional funds and extend the period of performance of each agreement, subject to annual appropriations and budget approval:

- 1. First Amendment to HDAP Sub-recipient Agreement for outreach and case management with Good Samaritan Shelter (Good Samaritan Amendment), allocating \$1,214,850 in additional funds, modifying the scope of work, and extending the period of performance to June 30, 2025 (Attachment A); and
- 2. First Amendment to HDAP Sub-recipient Agreement for disability benefits advocacy services including legal services with Legal Aid (Legal Aid Amendment), allocating \$205,000 in additional funds, modifying the scope of work, and extending the period of performance to June 30, 2025 (Attachment B).

Background:

HDAP was established by Assembly Bill 1603 (Chapter 25, Statutes of 2016) and updated by Senate Bill (SB) 80 (Chapter 27, Statutes 2019) to assist people experiencing homelessness who are likely eligible for disability benefits by providing advocacy for disability benefits as well as housing support. HDAP has four core requirements: outreach, case management, disability advocacy, and housing assistance. The Budget Act of 2021 (Senate Bill 129, Chapter 69, Statutes of 2021) appropriated a total of \$175.0 million for HDAP in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22.

Santa Barbara County Community Services Department (CSD), Housing and Community Development Division (HCD) awarded funds to Good Samaritan and Legal Aid through a Notice of Funding Availability released on April 19, 2022. Subrecipient agreements reflecting such awards were approved by the Board on August 16, 2022, and both subrecipients are now providing these critically needed services.

HDAP supports participants in meeting two important program goals: securing disability benefits, and stabilizing in permanent housing. HDAP provides case management activities for participants who are experiencing homelessness, or who are at risk of homelessness, through the entire application process for disability income benefits. Trained Supplemental Security Income (SSI)/Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR) model staff support chronically homeless individuals in obtaining SSI/SSDI benefits.

Performance Measure:

The two subrecipients, Good Samaritan and Legal Aid (Subrecipients) provide quarterly reports to the County regarding services provided and the outcomes, or performance measures. Tables 1 and 2, below, summarize the number of persons/households served with the additional HDAP funds, as well as the performance measures for each Subrecipient.

HDAP offers housing-related financial assistance and wrap-around supportive services, including, but not limited to: interim housing, rental assistance, housing navigation, case management, security deposits, utility payments, moving costs, legal services, and credit repair. HDAP also provides outreach services and case management for connections to additional service needs, as applicable.

HDAP offers disability benefits legal advocacy, including developing and filing completely prepared documents and coordinating with HDAP Outreach, Care Coordination, and Housing Assistance Staff, and federal and State offices relative to the disability income benefit. Subrecipients shall obtain all relevant documentation from hospitals/medical centers, physicians, clinics, employers, case managers and others to meet the necessary burden of proof of a disability income benefit recipient's disability.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

CSD/HCD will receive an allocation of \$213,740 in HDAP funds to provide local HDAP project administration services, including implementation, oversight of the review process to select providers, contracting, project development, invoicing, monitoring, and ensuring fulfillment of all HDAP requirements. Table 3 reflects the allocations (including previous HDAP allocations) to each recipient of HDAP funds for eligible activities.

Fiscal Analysis:

CSD will track all expenditures and monitor subrecipient performance and compliance with applicable laws, regulations, program guidance, and evidence-based practices. CSD will determine the eligibility of expenditures and report them to the State of California Department of Social Services (DSS) in a format specified by DSS to complete claims for reimbursement. CSD/HCD will also submit project budget

spreadsheets showing itemized costs to DSS on a quarterly basis, and provide supporting documentation for any costs upon request by DSS staff.

Key_Contract_Risks:

The County assumes responsibility for the administration of HDAP funds in accordance with all State requirements governing their use. HDAP program guidelines indicate that failure to comply with program requirements may result in the County being required to repay funds. The Subrecipients have prior experience operating homeless assistance projects.

HDAP funding is provided under the Subrecipient Agreements on a cost-reimbursement basis, which allows CSD to review and monitor Subrecipients' claims for eligible costs to the extent prescribed by the State guidelines to mitigate risk. Disbursements will be made after the Subrecipients demonstrate that reimbursable services were provided and substantiate the eligibility of incurred costs to the satisfaction of CSD.

Staffing Impacts:

A 1.0 FTE position approved as part of the FY 2022-23 budget process is partially funded by the HDAP Administration Funds in the estimated total amount of \$106,870. The amount of HDAP funds allocated to administration will increase to \$213,740 with the additional allocation.
