Grant Application

The Santa Barbara County Fish and Game Commission (SBCFGC) is charged with recommending expenditures of fine revenues to the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors. Announcement of the grant period will be made during a noticed meeting of the SBCFGC and posted on the Santa Barbara County Planning and Development website at http://sbcountyplanning.org/, and noticed with a press release.
- All members of the Fish and Game Commission receive copies of grant applications prior to the Commission's review at a noticed meeting of the SBCFGC.
- The SBCFGC will discuss each grant application and the benefits the program or project has for
 protection, conservation, propagation, preservation, or education as they pertain to fish and wildlife.
 Attendance at the meeting by the grant applicant is strongly encouraged to allow for questions from the
 SBCFGC members.
- The SBCFGC will select grants that will be recommended to the County Board of Supervisors for approval of funding. A report to the County Board of Supervisors will be prepared with each recommended grant attached.
- Successful grant applicants will be contacted following County Board of Supervisors approval.

Experts around the world agree that aquatic birds are in a global crisis of survival. Santa Barbara County is especially important to hundreds of species of aquatic birds because of its central location on the Pacific Flyway. Immediate human impact here has concentrated, long-term effects on global populations. Most of the threats to marine wildlife are human-induced, including oil and chemical spills, plastics/garbage/pollution, fishing hooks and lines, and habitat loss. Our Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation program resolves negative human-wildlife interactions by providing direct, immediate, effective, and ethical responses that save the lives of individual animals harmed by human impact. The primary objective of the program is to rescue and rehabilitate approximately 80 aquatic birds from Santa Barbara County. Our secondary objective is to secure sufficient financial support from stakeholders to keep our work sustainable. A \$14,500 grant will partially offset the cost of service we provide to the people and wildlife of Santa Barbara County, represents a modest portion of total annual cost for serving County wildlife, acknowledges inflation, matches funding from many other County Fish and Game Commissions, and would be matched 3:1 by other donors.

The project is a direct expression of 13103(b): "Temporary emergency treatment and care of injured or orphaned wildlife." The animals we return to the wild are then able to propagate future generations. When we work with Animal Control Officers and Game Wardens, we also address element 13103(c): "Temporary treatment and care of wildlife confiscated by the department as evidence." Rigorous scientific research (including "Variation In Distribution And Fate Of Brown Pelicans Injured And Rehabilitated In California Based On Band Sightings" and "Prevalence, Incidence, and Characterization of Dermal Lesions In Diving Birds Undergoing Rehabilitation" done by our qualified researchers, and our ongoing citizen-science projects (blue-banded Pelican returns) address element 13103(i).

PART 4: BENEFITS TO SANTA BARBARA COUNTY WILDLIFE

As a "referral hospital," we treat the most challenging cases that are beyond the capacity or skills of other regional wildlife centers and clinics, and receive hundreds of birds transferred to us from other local rescues and centers. We also receive animals rescued by the general public. Our Los Angeles Wildlife Center in San Pedro, CA admits more than 1,500 local, native aquatic birds annually, and releases them back into the wild once they are successfully rehabilitated. The most common species we receive from Santa Barbara County include Western Grebes, Common Murres, Black-Crowned Night-Herons, Mallards, Brown Pelicans, Pacific Loons, and Western Gulls. Their most common ailments include: petroleum oiled, fishing line and hook entanglements, trauma (wing/leg/body fractures), and orphaned.

Attachment A FISH AND GAME CODE SECTION 13100-13104

- 13100. (a) The amounts paid to and retained in the county treasury pursuant to Sections 12009 and 13003 shall be deposited in a county fish and wildlife propagation fund and expended for the protection, conservation, propagation, and preservation of fish and wildlife, under the direction of the board of supervisors, pursuant to this chapter.
- (b) All proposed expenditures from a county fish and wildlife propagation fund shall be reviewed first at a regular meeting of the county board of supervisors or its designated county fish and game commission to ensure compliance with Section 13103.
- 13101. (a) The board of supervisors of any county may enter into a written agreement with the board of supervisors of one or more counties for the expenditure of any funds deposited in its fish and wildlife propagation fund pursuant to Section 13100 for any purpose authorized by Section 13103 in either, or any, of the counties for the joint benefit of both, or all, of the counties as the judgment of the boards of supervisors may direct. The purchase of real property necessary for that purpose is lawful and title thereto shall be taken in the joint names of each county which contributes funds therefor. The property may be deeded to the state upon the express condition that it shall be employed for the purposes of this chapter within the counties.
- (b) The board of supervisors of one or more counties may enter into a written agreement with the department for the expenditure of any funds deposited in its fish and wildlife propagation fund pursuant to Section 13100 for any purpose authorized by Section 13103.
- 13102. Expenditures from the fish and game propagation fund of any county shall be subject to the provisions of Division 3 (commencing with Section 29000) of Title 3 of the Government Code.
- 13103. Expenditures from the fish and wildlife propagation fund of any county may be made only for the following purposes:
- (a) Public education relating to the scientific principles of fish and wildlife conservation, consisting of supervised formal instruction carried out pursuant to a planned curriculum and aids to education such as literature, audio and video recordings, training models, and nature study facilities.
 - (b) Temporary emergency treatment and care of injured or orphaned wildlife.
 - (c) Temporary treatment and care of wildlife confiscated by the department as evidence.
- (d) Breeding, raising, purchasing, or releasing fish or wildlife which are to be released upon approval of the department pursuant to Sections 6400 and 6401 onto land or into waters of local, state, or federal agencies or onto land or into waters open to the public.
- (e) Improvement of fish and wildlife habitat, including, but not limited to, construction of fish screens, weirs, and ladders; drainage or other watershed improvements; gravel and rock removal or placement; construction of irrigation and water distribution systems; earthwork and grading; fencing; planting trees and other vegetation management; and removal of barriers to the migration of fish and wildlife.
 - (f) Construction, maintenance, and operation of public hatchery facilities.
- (g) Purchase and maintain materials, supplies, or equipment for either the department's ownership and use or the department's use in the normal performance of the department's responsibilities.
- (h) Predator control actions for the benefit of fish or wildlife following certification in writing by the department that the proposed actions will significantly benefit a particular wildlife species.
- (i) Scientific fish and wildlife research conducted by institutions of higher learning, qualified researchers, or governmental agencies, if approved by the department.
- (j) Reasonable administrative costs, excluding the costs of audits required by Section 13104, for secretarial service, travel, and postage by the county fish and wildlife commission when authorized by the county board of supervisors. For purposes of this subdivision, "reasonable cost" means an amount which does not exceed 15 percent of the average amount received by the fund during the previous three-year period, or ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) annually, whichever is greater, excluding any funds carried over from a previous fiscal year.
- (k) Contributions to a secret witness program for the purpose of facilitating enforcement of this code and regulations adopted pursuant to this code.
- (l) Costs incurred by the district attorney or city attorney in investigating and prosecuting civil and criminal actions for violations of this code, as approved by the department.
- (m) Other expenditures, approved by the department, for the purpose of protecting, conserving, propagating, and preserving fish and wildlife.
- 13104. The department may audit, or require the county to audit, expenditures by the county from its fish and wildlife propagation fund in order to determine compliance with this chapter. Per FG Code Sec. 13103(e), improving fish and wildlife habitat. Project adds to in-stream surface water flows in Mission Creek during periods of critically low water flow in 2021 to 2023 to sustain populations of rare and endangered fish and wildlife. This reach of upper Mission Creek was adversely impacted by SCE's December 2019 grading and habitat destruction along Tunnel Road, stressing fish and wildlife populations. Natural water flows in this stretch are reduced by the Mission Tunnel, which intercepts over 1000 af/y of groundwater, a portion of which would otherwise surface in Mission Creek. The drought has further impacted surface flows in this reach. In summer 2021, for the first time in recent history, flows in this stretch of Mission Creek to certain CDFW identified important habitat units stopped entirely, jeopardizing resident fish and wildlife populations. In coordination with CDFW staff and the City of Santa Barbara, a nearby landowner agreed to let their City water connection be used to add water to the Creek. A metering and conveyance system was constructed and operated to deliver and dechlorinate domestic water from this residential City water meter into upper Mission Creek. Augmentation begins annually around July and ends around October, depending on conditions. Flows were augmented in 2021, 2022, and are expected to continue into 2023.

Water flowing in upper Mission Creek sustains pools and maintains various live stretches of the creek, allowing aquatic and related terrestrial wildlife habitat and conditions essential for their survival. aquatic fish and wildlife populations in this reach have been stressed by sedimentation caused by SCE's grading, in addition to the drought. The project advances and supports CDFW's ongoing monitoring of fish and wildlife populations in this reach to increase the probability for these populations to survive and be present when SCE completes habitat restoration activities in the area.

August 2022

In early 2022, City of SB relocated Landowner's water meter to site 300 yards away and at an elevation approximately 100' lower. This substantially reduced pressure and flow to creek. It became evident that even running 100% of the houses' water to the creek all night, it was impossible to provide adequate water to the creek augmentation. In response, Landowner

installs booster pump, discharges shortened to 30-60 minutes, resulting in increased aeration and lower temperatures

1) site prep and electrical (Swan Construction)

2) Pump and Tank installation (Construction Plumbing)

Materials: \$4,004.02

Although the booster pump was necessary to deliver water to the creek, it also benefitted landowner by enabling water supply at night. Landowner has agreed to pay a pro rata share of booster pump system expenses. Chair and Members of the Commission:

Please accept this letter in support of the request for funding for the costs of augmentation of surface flows in Mission Creek to enhance habitat and support populations of important fish and wildlife.

While Friends of Mission Canyon is technically a sponsor of this project, and will serve as the fiscal agent for distribution of the grant proceeds, these funds will reimburse individuals that have stepped up and taken swift action to protect these resources. We acknowledge the support of the landowners that agreed to provide the water supply with the hope that this grant would allow at least partial reimbursement of their out of pocket costs. Without their action, populations of important fish and wildlife may have perished from the cumulative effects of SCE's dumping of debris in the upper Mission Creek Watershed, the diversion of groundwater out of the watershed, and the drought.

We believe this project is extremely well-suited for funding from the County's Fish and Wildlife Propagation fund that received \$656,250.00 as part of the Judgment in *People of the State of California v. Southern California Edison Company*, Santa Barbara County Superior Court No. 20CV04002, filed December 4, 2020.

We ask that your Commission recommend that the Board of Supervisors approve this request.

†PROPOSED] FINAL JUDGMENT BY STIPULATION

Plaintiff, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA, appearing through their attorneys, Joyce E. Dudley, the District Attorney of Santa Barbara County, by Deputy District Attorneys Morgan S. Lucas and Christopher B. Dalbey (the "People"); and Defendant, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY, a California Corporation, ("Defendant" or "SCE"), by its attorneys, Munger, Tolles & Olson LLP, by Brad D. Brian and E. Martin Estrada, have stipulated to the entry of this Final Judgment Pursuant to Stipulation ("Final Judgment") without the Court taking evidence.

The Parties also have waived their right to appeal and have agreed to resolve and settle the above-captioned matter without further litigation and without admitting, denying, or

conceding any allegation or claim referred to herein or discussed between the Parties or as set forth in the First Amended Complaint, except as set forth below under the "LIABILITY" heading.

The Court having considered the pleadings and good cause appearing HEREBY ORDERS, ADJUDGES, AND DECREES that the People have judgment against Defendant as follows.

DEFINITIONS

- 1. For purposes of this Final Judgment, the People and Defendant shall be referred to collectively as "Parties" and individually as "Party."
- 2. As defined in the First Amended Complaint, the term "Impacted Area" applies to the area where SCE conducted its maintenance and road grading work beginning on December 4, 2019. It includes approximately 1.6 miles of Spyglass Ridge Road, commencing at the Inspiration Point Trailhead where Spyglass Road branches toward the northeast from Tunnel Road.

JURISDICTION and VENUE

The action is brought under the laws of the State of California and this Court has
jurisdiction of the subject matter hereof and the Parties hereto. Venue is proper before this
Court.

APPLICABILITY

4. The injunctive provisions of this Final Judgment are applicable to SCE and all successors, assigns, and subsidiaries of SCE and are applicable to SCE's parent corporation, Edison International (collectively "Enjoined Persons"). Enjoined Persons are also subject to these injunctive provisions for any instructions or directives SCE gives to subcontractors or other entities performing work on behalf of SCE.

INJUNCTIVE PROVISIONS

5. Pursuant to the statutory provisions cited below, Enjoined Persons are enjoined for a period of five years from the date of entry of this Final Judgment from engaging, directly or indirectly, in any of the following acts or practices in the State of California:

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- a. Under Fish and Game Code section 1615(e) and Business and Professions Code section 17203, without prior authorization from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife ("CDFW") in accord with Fish and Game Code section 1602(a)(1) through (a)(4), substantially diverting or obstructing the natural flow of, or substantially changing or using any material from the bed, channel, or bank of, any river, stream, or lake, or depositing or disposing of debris, waste, or other material containing crumbled, flaked, or ground pavement where it may pass into any river, stream, or lake, in violation of Fish and Game Code section 1602(a).
- b. Under Fish and Game Code section 5650.1(f) and Business and Professions Code section 17203, except as authorized by Fish and Game Code section 5650(b), depositing in, permitting to pass into, or placing where it can pass into the waters of the State of California any substance or material deleterious to fish, plant life, mammals, or bird life, in violation of Fish and Game Code section 5650(a)(6).
- c. Under Business and Profession Code section 17203, causing or permitting to exist any log jam or debris accumulation or any other artificial barrier, except a dam for the storage or diversion of water, public bridges and approaches thereto, groins, jetties, seawalls, breakwaters, bulkheads, wharves and piers permitted by law, and debris from mining operations, in any stream in California, which will prevent the passing of fish up and down stream or which is deleterious to fish, in violation of Fish and Game Code section 5948.
- d. Under Business and Profession Code section 17203, knowingly or negligently discharging pollutants to the navigable waters of the United States, in violation of Water Code section 13387 and United States Code, title 33, section 1311(a).

- e. Under Santa Barbara County Ordinance section 14-34(b) and Business and Profession Code section 17203, causing or allowing a significant environmental impact to occur as a result of new grading, in violation of Santa Barbara County Ordinance section 14-6.
- f. Under Business and Profession Code section 17203, engaging in or performing any of the following acts within California: committing acts of unfair competition by violating Fish and Game Code sections 1602, 5650, or 5948; Water Code sections 13376 or 13387; United States Code, title 33, section 1311(a); or Santa Barbara County Ordinance section 14-6.
- 6. Under Fish and Game Code section 1602, SCE submitted a Notification of Lake or Streambed Alteration for the Mission Canyon Stream Habitat Restoration Project [hereafter "Restoration Project"] (Notification No. 1600-2020-0149-R5). Under Fish and Game Code section 1615(e) and Business and Professions Code section 17203, Enjoined Persons shall comply with all written instructions from CDFW concerning the completeness of Notification No. 1600-2020-0149-R5; modifications or additions to this Notification; preparation of and entry into a Lake or Streambed Alteration Agreement; and the completion of all requirements imposed on SCE by any Lake or Streambed Alteration Agreement for the Restoration Project.
- 7. Immediately upon the issuance of the Remediation Complete Letter from CDFW regarding the Lake or Streambed Alteration Agreement referenced in Paragraph 6 herein, Enjoined Persons' obligations under Paragraph 6 shall cease.
- 8. Under Business and Professions Code section 17203, unless otherwise notified in writing by the Santa Barbara Planning and Development Department, Enjoined Persons shall complete the Mission Canyon Road Repair Project as outlined in Land Use Permit No. 20LUP-00000-00132 issued by the County of Santa Barbara Planning and Development Department.
- 9. Under Business and Professions Code section 17203, in addition to the work outlined in Land Use Permit No. 20LUP-00000-00132, Enjoined Persons shall obtain all required permits from the County of Santa Barbara for work needed to complete abatement of

the violations described in the Notice of Violation issued on January 16, 2020, by the Santa Barbara County Planning and Development Department (NOV #7019-1120-0001-0376-7722), including submittal and performance of a restoration plan for damage caused by SCE to the Impacted Area.

10. Enjoined Parties' obligations under Paragraphs 8 and 9 herein shall cease upon notification in writing from the County of Santa Barbara that the terms of the permits referenced in Paragraphs 8 and 9 have been met.

CIVIL PENALTIES and COST RECOVERY

- 11. Defendant shall, within twenty-one days after entry of this Final Judgment, pay civil penalties and costs in the total amount of Three Million, Five Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$3,540,000), pursuant to Fish and Game Code sections 1615 and 5650.1, Business and Professions Code section 17206, and Government Code section 26506. The payments shall be allocated as follows:
 - a. One Million, Three Hundred Twelve Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars
 (\$1,312,500) as civil penalties under Business and Professions Code
 section 17206, payable to the County of Santa Barbara.
 - b. One Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) as civil penalties under Fish and Game Code section 1615(a), payable as follows pursuant to section 1615(f):
 - i. Sixty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$62,500) to Santa
 Barbara County Fish and Wildlife Propagation Fund; and
 - Sixty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$62,500) to
 California Department of Fish and Wildlife Fish and Game
 Preservation Fund.
 - c. One Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) as civil penalties under Fish and Game Code section 5650.1(a), payable as follows pursuant to section 5650.1(h):

ENFORCEMENT OF FINAL JUDGMENT AND PENALTIES

13. Pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 664.6 and the request of the Parties, the Court retains jurisdiction over this matter and the terms of the Final Judgment. The People may move this Court to enjoin any violation of any provision of this Final Judgment, and to award other appropriate relief, and Defendant reserves any rights to oppose or defend as may be legally permissible. Nothing in this Final Judgment shall limit any rights of the People to seek any other relief or for criminal or civil remedies for future violations as provided by law, and nothing herein shall limit any rights of Defendant to oppose or dispute any such action by the People.

MATTERS COVERED BY THIS FINAL JUDGMENT

- 14. This Judgment is a final and binding resolution and settlement of all disputed claims, violations, and causes of action arising from the matters and allegations set forth in the People's First Amended Complaint against Defendant and/or its parent corporation, Edison International, and any subsidiary companies, as well as its officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, successors, and assignees up to the effective date of this Judgment, collectively known as "Covered Matters." Any claim, violation, or cause of action that is not a Covered Matter as defined above is a "Reserved Claim."
- out of matters or allegations that are not set forth in the People's First Amended Complaint,

 (2) any violation of the injunctive provisions of the Judgment entered in this action, (3) any
 violation that occurs after the effective date of this Judgment; and (4) any claim, violation, or
 cause of action against Defendant's independent contractors or subcontractors. The Parties
 reserve the right to pursue, or defend against, any Reserved Claim. This Paragraph does not
 affect any statute of limitations, if any, which may be applicable to any Reserved Claim, and
 does not prohibit Defendant from asserting any statute of limitations or other legal or equitable
 defenses that may be applicable to any Reserved Claim.
- 16. The provisions of Paragraphs 14 and 15 are expressly conditioned on Defendant making full payment pursuant to Paragraphs 11 and 12.

- 17. In any subsequent action that may be brought by the People based on any Reserved Claim, SCE agrees that it will not assert that failing to pursue the Reserved Claims as part of this action constitutes claim-splitting, laches, or is otherwise inequitable because such claims should have been brought as part of this action. This paragraph does not prohibit Defendant from asserting any statute of limitations or other legal or equitable defenses that may be applicable to any Reserved Claims.
- 18. Defendant has covenanted not to pursue any civil, appellate, or administrative claims against the People or against any agency or office of or within the County of Santa Barbara, or against any of its officers, employees, representatives, agents or attorneys arising out of or in any way related to any Covered Matter.

All notices and other communications required or permitted under this Final Judgment that are properly addressed as provided in this paragraph are effective upon delivery if delivered personally or by overnight mail, or are effective five (5) days following deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, if delivered by mail.

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EFFECT OF JUDGMENT

20. Except as expressly provided in this Final Judgment, nothing in this Final Judgment is intended nor shall it be construed to preclude the People or any state, county, or local agency, department, board, or entity from exercising its authority under any law, statute or regulation.

LIABILITY OF THE PEOPLE

21. To the extent permitted by law, the People and its representatives herein shall not be liable for any injury or damage to persons or property resulting from acts or omissions by Defendant, its directors, officers, employees, agents, representatives or contractors, in carrying out activities pursuant to this Final Judgment, nor shall the People or their representatives be held as a party to or guarantor of any contract entered into by Defendant, its owners, directors, officers, employees, agents, representatives or contractors, in carrying out the requirements of this Final Judgment

NO WAIVER OF RIGHT TO ENFORCE

22. The failure of the People to enforce any provision of this Final Judgment shall neither be deemed a waiver of such provision nor in any way affect the validity of this Final Judgment. The failure of the People to enforce any such provision shall not preclude it from later enforcing the same or any other provision of this Final Judgment. No oral advice, guidance, suggestions or comments by employees or officials of any Party regarding matters covered in this Final Judgment shall be construed to relieve any Party of its obligations under this Final Judgment.

APPLICATION OF FINAL JUDGMENT

23. This Final Judgment shall apply to and be binding upon the People and upon Defendant and its successors and assigns.

LITIGATION EXPENSES and FEES

24. Defendant shall pay its own filing fees, attorney fees, expert witness fees and all other costs of litigation and investigation incurred to date.

NEUTRAL CONSTRUCTION

25. The terms of this Final Judgment were drafted equally by all Parties. The Parties agree that the rule of construction holding that ambiguity is construed against the drafting party shall not apply to the interpretation of this Final Judgment.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT

26. This Judgment is intended to be a final and binding resolution of the subject matter set forth in this Judgment and supersedes and replaces any and all prior negotiations, confirmatory letters, and proposed agreements or final agreements, whether written or oral.

FUTURE REGULATORY CHANGES

27. Nothing in this Judgment shall excuse Defendant from meeting any more stringent requirements that may be imposed after the effective date of this Judgment by changes in applicable and legally binding legislation or regulations. To the extent any future statutory or regulatory change makes Defendant's obligations less stringent than those provided for in this Judgment, Defendant's compliance with the changed law shall be deemed compliance with this Judgment.

REPRESENTATIONS and WARRANTIES

28. Each Party to this Judgment represents, warrants, and agrees that each Party has made such investigation of the facts and matters pertaining to this Judgment as it deems necessary and is not relying on any representations made by the other Parties in entering into this Judgment; each Party has had an opportunity to consult with an attorney regarding the contents of this Judgment; each Party or the responsible agent of the Party has read this Judgment and understands its contents; and each person signing this Judgment has the full authority to sign on behalf of the Party for which he or she is signing and to bind that Party to the obligations and commitments set forth herein.

BINDING EFFECT

29. This Judgment and its terms, covenants, conditions, provisions, obligations, undertakings, rights and benefits shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective successors-in-interest and assigns.

MODIFICATION OF FINAL JUDGMENT

30. This Final Judgment may be modified only on noticed motion by a Party with approval of the Court, or upon written consent of the Parties and the approval of the Court.

COUNTERPARTS

31. This Judgment may be signed in counterparts by the Parties and those counterparts when taken together shall have the same force and effect as if a single, original document has been signed by the Parties. For purposes of this Judgment, copies of signatures shall be deemed originals.

LIABILITY

- 32. Pursuant to the admissions by Defendant in the Stipulation for Entry of Judgment, Defendant is liable for the following:
 - a. At least one violation of Fish and Game Code section 1602(a), as pleaded in the First Cause of Action;
 - b. At least one violation of Fish and Game Code section 5650(a)(6), as pleaded in the Second Cause of Action;
 - c. At least one violation of Santa Barbara County Ordinance section 14-6, as pleaded in the Third Cause of Action;
 - d. At least one violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200 predicated on a violation of Fish and Game Code section 1602(a), as pleaded in the Fourth Cause of Action;
 - e. At least one violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200 predicated on a violation of Fish and Game Code section 5650(a)(6), as pleaded in the Fourth Cause of Action;
 - f. At least one violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200 predicated on a violation of Fish and Game Code section 5652(a), as pleaded in the Fourth Cause of Action;

- g. At least one violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200 predicated on a violation of Fish and Game Code section 5948, as pleaded in the Fourth Cause of Action; and
- h. At least one violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200 predicated on a violation of Santa Barbara County Ordinance section 14-6, as pleaded in the Fourth Cause of Action.

ENTRY OF JUDGMENT

- 33. The Court's clerk is ordered to enter this Final Judgment immediately, and to provide notice to the People through counsel.
- 34. The effective date of this Final Judgment shall be upon entry. The Parties need not file a Notice of Entry of Judgment.

It appearing to the Court that there is good cause for the entry of this Judgment, IT IS SO ORDERED.

1. California Department of Fish and Wildlife*

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY ("DEFENDANT") shall provide

Three Hundred Four Thousand Dollars (\$304,000.00) payable to California Department of Fish

and Wildlife ("CDFW") for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding Mission Creek Steelhead

Trout Recovery Monitoring, as follows:

The CDFW's Steelhead Unit will conduct two years (January 2021 to January 2023) of southern California steelhead population monitoring within Mission Creek. The monitoring will consist of winter spawning and summer/fall snorkel surveys. The survey area will consist of all available habitat from Rocky Nook Park to the limits of anadromy in Mission Creek and its principal tributary, Rattlesnake Creek. Most of the work will be conducted by temporary employees under direction from a CDFW Environmental Scientist based in Santa Barbara, California. All training, data management, and reporting will be provided by the CDFW Steelhead Unit. The specific surveys will entail biweekly spawner surveys to be conducted between December and May as well as snorkel/electrofishing surveys of the wetted sections of Mission and Rattlesnake Creeks in the late summer/fall in order to count juvenile and adult fish and to document the locations of the steelhead trout in Mission and Rattlesnake Creeks. This funding will cover personnel costs (25% of one full-time Environmental Scientist and at least

2. Santa Barbara Botanic Garden*

DEFENDANT shall provide Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) payable to Santa Barbara Botanic Garden, Inc., for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding the Upper Mission Creek Biodiversity Project. This Project shall focus on the removal of invasive species and re-establishment of native species, particularly those native species that have been extirpated from the area. This Project shall commence at the headwaters of Mission Creek and progress downstream as funding allows. This Project may include restoration efforts to increase slope stability, improve water quality, and provide improved habitat and reduce invasive species spreading along trails and roadways within the Mission Creek watershed.

3. Urban Creeks Council*

DEFENDANT shall provide One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) payable to Santa Barbara Urban Creeks Council, Inc. ("SBUCC") for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding the SBUCC Mission Creek Hydrology Study. The scope of this Study shall be determined by the Board of Directors of SBUCC, and the Board shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that the Study encompasses the upper non-urban watersheds of Mission Creek. The

DEFENDANT shall provide Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) payable to Santa Barbara Mountain Bike Trail Volunteers, Inc., d/b/a Sage Trail Alliance, for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding the Tunnel and Jesusita Trails Restoration, Improvement, and Maintenance Project. This Project shall include the following components: (a) survey of geology, hydrology, ecology, and biology, as necessary to perform the restoration, improvement, and maintenance work; (b) clearing of invasive species, protection of current native species, and replanting of native species; (c) trail hardening and drainage improvements; (d) creation of sediment captures and retaining walls along trail portions in close proximity to creeks, to prevent sedimentation; (e) signage improvements for safety and wayfinding; and (f) trail maintenance for

6. Channel Islands Restoration*

DEFENDANT shall provide Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) payable to Channel Islands Restoration for the sole and exclusive purpose of trail management and restoration, including the removal of invasive species, in the San Marcos Foothills Preserve, a County of Santa Barbara open space.

7. Santa Barbara County*

DEFENDANT shall provide Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) payable to the County of Santa Barbara for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding trail restoration along Mission

In 2021, over 5,000 donors came together in just 90 days to raise \$18.6 million to save the West Mesa of the San Marcos Foothills from imminent development of luxury houses. The property will be transferred to County Parks Division next year (2023), but currently CIR is managing the property and started habitat restoration early in 2022. CIR has been restoring habitat on the San Marcos Foothills Preserve (which is adjacent to the east side of the West Mesa) since 2010. CIR will continue to fundraise and perform restoration services for the County after the West Mesa has been added to the County Preserve. CIR is now devoting more resources to the Foothills, including trail maintenance, creating a volunteer docent program that will educate the public about the natural history of the Preserve and the rules mandating that dogs are on leash, and adding an accessible to all trail on the property.

The projects complies with multiple provisions of FG Code 13103. Particular provisions especially pertinent to the project are provisions (a), (e), and (i). The docent program and support of it represents "public education relating to the scientific principles of fish and wildlife conservation" as outlined in section (a), and prevention of disturbance of native wildlife as outlined in section (m).

As part of this project habitat and infrastructure improvements, trail maintenance, and environmental monitoring are all planned. Attachment A FISH AND GAME CODE SECTION 13100-13104

- 13100. (a) The amounts paid to and retained in the county treasury pursuant to Sections 12009 and 13003 shall be deposited in a county fish and wildlife propagation fund and expended for the protection, conservation, propagation, and preservation of fish and wildlife, under the direction of the board of supervisors, pursuant to this chapter.
- (b) All proposed expenditures from a county fish and wildlife propagation fund shall be reviewed first at a regular meeting of the county board of supervisors or its designated county fish and game commission to ensure compliance with Section 13103.
- 13101. (a) The board of supervisors of any county may enter into a written agreement with the board of supervisors of one or more counties for the expenditure of any funds deposited in its fish and wildlife propagation fund pursuant to Section 13100 for any purpose authorized by Section 13103 in either, or any, of the counties for the joint benefit of both, or all, of the counties as the judgment of the boards of supervisors may direct. The purchase of real property necessary for that purpose is lawful and title thereto shall be taken in the joint names of each county which contributes funds therefor. The property may be deeded to the state upon the express condition that it shall be employed for the purposes of this chapter within the counties.
- (b) The board of supervisors of one or more counties may enter into a written agreement with the department for the expenditure of any funds deposited in its fish and wildlife propagation fund pursuant to Section 13100 for any purpose authorized by Section 13103.
- 13102. Expenditures from the fish and game propagation fund of any county shall be subject to the provisions of Division 3 (commencing with Section 29000) of Title 3 of the Government Code.
- 13103. Expenditures from the fish and wildlife propagation fund of any county may be made only for the following purposes:
- (a) Public education relating to the scientific principles of fish and wildlife conservation, consisting of supervised formal instruction carried out pursuant to a planned curriculum and aids to education such as literature, audio and video recordings, training models, and nature study facilities
 - (b) Temporary emergency treatment and care of injured or orphaned wildlife.
 - (c) Temporary treatment and care of wildlife confiscated by the department as evidence.
- (d) Breeding, raising, purchasing, or releasing fish or wildlife which are to be released upon approval of the department pursuant to Sections 6400 and 6401 onto land or into waters of local, state, or federal agencies or onto land or into waters open to the public.
- (e) Improvement of fish and wildlife habitat, including, but not limited to, construction of fish screens, weirs, and ladders; drainage or other watershed improvements; gravel and rock removal or placement; construction of irrigation and water distribution systems; earthwork and grading; fencing; planting trees and other vegetation management; and removal of barriers to the migration of fish and wildlife.
 - (f) Construction, maintenance, and operation of public hatchery facilities.
- (g) Purchase and maintain materials, supplies, or equipment for either the department's ownership and use or the department's use in the normal performance of the department's responsibilities.
- (h) Predator control actions for the benefit of fish or wildlife following certification in writing by the department that the proposed actions will significantly benefit a particular wildlife species.
- (i) Scientific fish and wildlife research conducted by institutions of higher learning, qualified researchers, or governmental agencies, if approved by the department.
- (j) Reasonable administrative costs, excluding the costs of audits required by Section 13104, for secretarial service, travel, and postage by the county fish and wildlife commission when authorized by the county board of supervisors. For purposes of this subdivision, "reasonable cost" means an amount which does not exceed 15 percent of the average amount received by the fund during the previous three-year period, or ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) annually, whichever is greater, excluding any funds carried over from a previous fiscal year.
- (k) Contributions to a secret witness program for the purpose of facilitating enforcement of this code and regulations adopted pursuant to this code.
- (1) Costs incurred by the district attorney or city attorney in investigating and prosecuting civil and criminal actions for violations of this code, as approved by the department.
- (m) Other expenditures, approved by the department, for the purpose of protecting, conserving, propagating, and preserving fish and wildlife.
- 13104. The department may audit, or require the county to audit, expenditures by the county from its fish and wildlife propagation fund in order to determine compliance with this chapter. If, after reviewing the audit, the department determines that expenditures are not in compliance with this chapter, the department may require that
- all expenditures from the fund be temporarily suspended, or it may seek reimbursement of funds that the department determines, based on the audit, were expended improperly, or both.
