Recommended Actions:

That the Board of Supervisors:

- a) Approve, ratify, and authorize the Public Health Department Director to accept and receive supplemental funding for the County's Federally Qualified Health Centers and Community Health Division through the Health Resources and Services Administration Grant Award H8GCS47555-01-00 from the Affordable Care Act (ACA) Grants for New and Expanded Services Under the Health Center Program as funded through the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act for the period of December 1, 2022 through May 31, 2023 in the amount of \$265,765 (Attachment A); and
- b) Approve and authorize Budget Revision BJE #0008797 in the amount of \$265,765 to establish appropriations for \$265,765 of unanticipated revenue from the Federal Government for Health Resources and Administration supplemental funding to increase Salaries and Benefits (\$84,059) Services and Supplies (\$178,616) and Other Costs (\$3,090) for FY 2022-23 in the County's financial system (Attachment B); and
- c) Determine that the recommended actions are not a "Project" with the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") and is exempt per CEQA Guideline section 15378(b)(4), since the recommended actions are government fiscal activities which do not involve commitment

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to any specific project which may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment.

Summary Text: This item is on the Agenda to authorize the Public Health Department (PHD) to accept a grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) from the Affordable Care Act (ACA) Grants for New and Expanded Services Under the Health Center Program for activities that supplement and do not supplant planned activities that are using other funds to increase access to, confidence in, and demand for updated COVID-19 vaccines.

Background:

The fiscal year (FY) 2023 Expanding COVID-19 Vaccination (ECV) awards provide one-time funding to Health Center Program award recipients and look-alikes that received American Rescue Plan (L2C) awards to increase access to, confidence in, and demand for updated COVID-19 vaccines within their service areas. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through HRSA, has made these awards available to Health Centers as part of their ongoing support during the COVID-19 pandemic. The County's Federally Qualified Health Centers may use the awards for outreach and education, working with community partners, vaccine administration, enabling services (e.g. transportation and interpretation), personnel costs, extending hours or otherwise increasing availability, training, and supplies.

Since the Coronavirus crisis commenced, it was recognized that health centers around the country would need additional resources for assisting patients and communities in responding to the pandemic. It is now recognized that public response to intervention efforts, including vaccinations, has evolved with the duration of the pandemic. This funding supports enhancing confidence in vaccination activities and addressing barriers to access by covering costs associated with PHD Homeless program staff salaries and benefits and the costs related to COVID-19 education, outreach, and vaccination. While maintaining a focus on vaccination, PHD outreach to, and education of, persons experiencing homelessness includes expanding field-based team activities to promote an integrated, countywide approach consistent with the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) efforts to operationalize timely access to clinically appropriate COVID-19 therapeutics, the "Test to Treat" program.

Performance Measure:

HRSA requires that PHD use the funds to assist patients in accessing vaccinations for COVID-19. PHD must budget and report on activities to HRSA on a periodic basis. Other than budget information and activities list, no specific performance measures are expected.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

Budgeted: No

Fiscal Analysis: Approving and authorizing the Public Health Director to accept the Expanded Covid-19 Vaccination Grant and Budget Revision Request #0008797 will allow the Public Health Department to increase confidence in, demand for and access to COVID-19 vaccinations at the County Health Care Centers and other sites where underserved populations can be reached. This funding provided by Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) was awarded for use from December, 1 2022 through May 31, 2023. Due to timing of the request for application and the award, it was not feasible to start before April 1, 2023. The attached Budget Revision Request of \$265,765 represents the appropriation needed to amend the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Adopted Budget for the program.
