Dear SB County Board of Supervisors Members,

I recently became aware of further discussion on the configuration for the upcoming Modoc Class I Multi-path segment. The configuration I saw concerned me from a safety perspective.

I understand that this path will be used in multiple modes - pedestrians, scooters, and cyclists. Having those modes share a path, while not ideal, can work. The Cabrillo multi-use path is a longstanding local example. There are a couple of key differences from a safety perspective, though.

First, the Cabrillo multipath is an "experience" path. It isn't a transportation corridor in the way that Modoc is. That may not be code-specific jargon, but people tool along on the Cabrillo path. They travel and commute on the Modoc path, and that leads to different user expectations and (likely, I expect) higher speeds.

Second, that section of Modoc Road is a hill. It's just a reality that people will go downhill faster. Downhill, with pedestrians, dogs (inevitably, and hopefully on leashes at least), etc. is going to be a bigger challenge. Minimalist width design is going to result in frustrated users, and a higher risk of injuries.

Finally, and most importantly, the Cabrillo path doesn't have immediately adjacent high speed oncoming traffic like we will see on Modoc. The downhill (northbound) side of the path is looking straight at uphill (southbound) vehicle traffic that is going 45+mph. That's a closing speed of 65+ mph. Without substantial separation or a strong physical barrier between those two head-on lanes, users will not be safe. I can easily imagine riding down that path, and someone with earbuds stepping in front of me, or their dog lunging out, so to avoid them I veer off the curb directly into oncoming traffic. Even at conservative speeds, that scenario scares me. And I am an experienced rider. We need infrastructure that makes *in*experienced riders comfortable, and safe. If the proposed configuration doesn't provide substantial separation from traffic, or a physical/hard barrier, I don't see how it even remotely meets that criteria.

I understand that the points above are qualitative evaluations - though again, from an experienced rider. I will do some code research.

I urge you not to make an expedient choice for this path configuration that will design us into something that will discourage, injure (or worse) active transportation users on this critical segment of the Goleta-Santa Barbara trunk. The rest of the path is exceptional.

Thank you for your consideration. And if there is some way that I can help with this project, please let me know.

I urge you to deny this dangerous project as recommended by the Santa Barbara Planning Commission.

In addition to the significant and unavoidable risks of spills from trucking the oil, the purported benefit of producing oil from the offshore platforms and processing it on the Gaviota coast would bring with it unacceptable risks of offshore oil spills, air pollution and toxic fire and smoke risks that were not analyzed in the EIR, which focused narrowly on trucking impacts.

The recent oil spill off of Orange County underlines the severity of these risks. In addition, ExxonMobil's facilities were the largest sources of air pollution in the county and contained dangerous and toxic materials in an area that has burned by wildfire twice in the 6 years since the facilities have been shut down. We were fortunate that oil and dangerous gases were not present at the site during the recent Alisal fire, which burned onto ExxonMobil's property.

It is not just that the trucking routes are along sections of road with above average accident rates, there have been specific and recent instances of oil tankers on this route spilling oil into rivers and starting fires. In fact, on October 11 -- the same day as the Alisal fire -- an oil tanker crash near Orcutt caused a fire in Eucalyptus trees.

Thank you for denying this dangerous and unacceptable oil trucking project.
