#### **Recommended Actions:**

- a) Authorize the Community Services Director, or designee, until otherwise ordered by the Board, to take the following actions required for the acceptance and administration of Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Round 5 funds allocated to the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care (CoC) and County of Santa Barbara:
  - i. Submit, by March 27, 2024, a joint funding application which includes a Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan, and execute all certifications, standard forms and a grant agreement required for disbursement of HHAP Round 5 funds. Such standard agreement shall be in a form substantially similar to the HHAP 4 Standard Agreement and subject to concurrence by County Counsel, Risk Management, and Auditor-Controller; and
- b) Approve and authorize the Community Services Director, or designee, to execute the Memorandum of Understanding with the Santa Maria / Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care from the HHAP 5 Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan and their inclusion in the Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness, which are required for the application, acceptance, and administration of the HHAP Round 5 funds allocated to the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care and the County of Santa Barbara;

c) Determine the above recommended actions are not the approval of a project that is subject to environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15378(b)(5), finding that the actions are organizational or administrative activities of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.

## **Summary Text:**

Staff is recommending authorization for the Community Services Director, or designee, to apply for Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) 5 funding including execution of the standard agreement substantially similar to HHAP Round 4 (Attachment A) and approval of the Memorandum of Understanding (Attachment B). The application includes key actions that will be added to the Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness and serve as a guide of the partnership and collaboration between the County of Santa Barbara and the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care (CoC). The HHAP Regionally Coordinated Action Plan is required for the application, acceptance, and administration of Round 5 funds allocated to the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County CoC and the County of Santa Barbara.

The State legislature appropriated funding for HHAP Round 5 through Assembly Bill 129. HHAP Round 5 allocations are made pursuant to the 2023 Point in Time Count. The state allocation percentages for HHAP 5 are 42% to the 13 largest cities, 30% to Continuums of Care, and 28% to Counties. The base allocation to the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care is \$2,713,487 and the County allocation is \$2,603,351, for a total allocation of \$5,316,838 to serve the county geographic region. The County allocation will continue to be focused on operations of interim housing. The CoC is finalizing their uses in order to continue the actions and strategies as identified in the Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness.

## **Background:**

The County and CoC have received four previous rounds of State HHAP funding totaling \$16,268,249. Table 1 shows the allocation amounts and Table 2 shows how those funds will be or have been invested to address homelessness. As of December 31, 2023, HHAP funded programs have served 1,480 unduplicated persons experiencing homelessness, of which 507 have transitioned out of homelessness into permanent housing. Some of the HHAP funding has only been recently contracted as the new temporary interim supportive housing projects, Hope Village and La Posada prepare to open.

Staff is recommending Round 5 County allocated funding *not* set aside for administration (7%), Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) costs (1%) and youth programs (10%) be used for operations of interim housing (\$2,134,749) at the Hope Village and La Posada temporary interim supportive housing projects. The CoC determined and approved the uses for the CoC allocation at their board meeting of March 7, 2024, deciding to focus on Rapid Rehousing and Services Coordination. A joint HHAP 5 application will be submitted to the State of California prior to the due date on March 27, 2024.

The California Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH) released the HHAP Round 5 Notice of Funding Availability on September 29, 2023 with a due date of March 27, 2024. The Application requires applicants to be a signatory to a Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan (HSC 50235(h)) as part of the application. The application package includes:

- A detailed plan for allocated funds
- Identifying roles and responsibilities
- Current system performance and key actions to improve performance
- Key action to ensure racial and gender equity
- Key actions to reduce exits to homelessness form institutional settings
- Explanation of utilization of all local, state and federal funding to end homelessness
- Key actions to connect people experiencing homelessness to all eligible benefit programs

The HHAP-5 application requires a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) committing each signatory to participation in and to comply with the HHAP 5 Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan described above and detailed in Attachment B. The MOU commits the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care (CoC) and County of Santa Barbara to uphold, participate in, and comply with the

actions, roles, and responsibilities in the region as described in the HHAP-5 Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.

The Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan is different in structure from the County's Community Action Plan approved by the Board on February 23, 2021. Staff has aligned the HHAP 5 key actions with the previously approved plan and will be added as an addendum to the Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness.

The County serves as the Administrative Entity for the CoC. The CoC (per 24 Code of Federal Regulations 578) is designed to promote communitywide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness. The CoC has designated responsibilities through an elected governing Board including coordination of the housing and services system for persons experiencing homelessness, oversight of the Point in Time Count, the Homeless Management Information System and the Coordinated Entry System. These systems are required to comply with State of California and Department of Housing and Urban Development requirements demonstrating a regional planning process and adequate data collection.

The following key dates demonstrate the history of the CoC and partnership with the County to serve as the system lead.

- March 6, 2014 Central Coast Collaborative on Homelessness (C3H) assumes the role of lead agency for the CoC (United Way of Northern Santa Barbara County as fiscal agent).
- August 7, 2014 First meeting of the inaugural CoC Board which voted to establish the County of Santa Barbara as the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) Lead Agency and Collaborative Applicant
- October 14, 2014 County of Santa Barbara executes Memorandum of Understanding with the CoC to become the Collaborative Applicant and HMIS Lead Agency
- March 13, 2018 County assumes role of lead agency for the CoC from C3H
- July 31, 2021 United Way of Northern Santa Barbara County opted not to renew their Coordinated Entry System (CES) contract, County becomes CES Lead Agency

## **Performance Measure:**

Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Program Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan Outcome Goals are referenced in Table 3 as performance measures. These goals will be added to the Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness as an appendix. The system performance goals are set from review of baseline Calendar Year 2022 Santa Barbara County Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data provided by the State of California. Community Services then reviewed multi-year trends and calculated the projected percent change during the funding period.

## **Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:**

Approval of this Board action authorizes staff to submit a funding application and execute all certifications, standard forms, and grant agreements for HHAP Round 5. When combining the CoC and County allocations, Community Services will administer \$5,316,838 in HHAP funding to address homelessness in Santa Barbara County. The funds will be budgeted in FY 24-25. HHAP Round 5 is a multi-year grant of one-time funds. HHAP Round 5 fund recipients must obligate at least 75% of the funding allocation and expend at least 50% by June 30, 2026. All of these funds must be expended by June 30, 2028. Failure to expend will result in supplemental allocations to not be allocated.

## **Key\_Contract\_Risks:**

The County assumes responsibility for the administration of funding in accordance with all State and federal requirements governing their use. No sub-recipient agreements or contracts are included in this Board Letter.

## **Staffing Impacts:**

Staff costs directly related to implementing or carrying out activities funded by the program allocation are included in the existing Community Services budget. No additional staff is being considered.
