1. PROCLAMATIONS/PRESENTATIONS:

A. PROCLAMATION – RECREATION AND PARKS MONTH

Councilmember Boysen presented a Proclamation in recognition of Recreation and Parks month to Recreation and Parks Commissioners Gayle Pratt, Yleana Velasco, and Kirk Spry.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD (NOT TO EXCEED A TOTAL OF 15 MINUTES):

Craig Shafer, President of the Santa Maria Arts Council, thanked the Recreation and Parks Department for their support and collaboration over the past nine years.

Darryl Scheck, representing SEIU Local 620, spoke in support of Item 3C on the evening's meeting agenda. He asked that, going forward, the City continue its meet and confer process with the SEIU. He said he is optimistic that the Union and the City will continue to work together with increasing effectiveness.

Mark Muller, representing Santa Maria Bonita School District, commended the Recreation and Parks Department for their outstanding service to the community, particularly with the school district. He explained the Healthy School Pantry Program where more than 200 families come together each month for cooking demonstrations and nutrition information.

Natalie Tayahua, representing Santa Maria PAL Key Club, spoke about how important Recreation and Parks programs are to local youth. She appreciated how the programs teach social skills and confidence, improving a child's ability to communicate. She requested more programs for youth and thanked the City for those currently offered.

City Manager Haydon introduced Andrew Tse, the City's new Deputy City Manager. Mr. Tse came to Santa Maria from the City of Cypress where he was Assistant to the City Manager and the

Administrative Services Manager. He holds a Master's Degree in Public Administration and has an extensive background in human resources and labor relations.

Deputy City Manager Tse thanked the Council for the opportunity to be a part of the community.

City Manager Haydon went on to introduce Acting Public Works Director, Shad Springer. Mr. Springer will be taking the place of recently retired Director of Public Works, Dave Whitehead. Mr. Springer has a Master's Degree in Public Administration and has many years of experience in construction and engineering. Mr. Springer was instrumental in many city projects, including the establishment of the City's Public Library, the transit center, and Union Valley Parkway.

Councilmember Boysen reported that he would be recusing himself from Item 3D (Donation of Surplus Computers to Good Samaritan) due to a conflict of interest.

Councilmember Zuniga asked to comment on Item 3C, Personnel Changes.

Item 3C, Personnel Changes

Councilmember Zuniga expressed concerns about having personnel-related changes on the Consent Calendar. Given that this item contained a lot of information to comprehend, she felt it should have been listed under Regular Business. She said it would be helpful to have descriptions included with the staff title descriptions to clarify whether a change was a title change or actual change in responsibilities. She asked that future Council Agenda Reports, for employee items, state in the text that the changes are based on a meet and confer with the Union. She also inquired if a Planner position was being eliminated in the Community Development Department.

City Manager Haydon explained the Advanced Planner position had been open since October 2011 and that staff has determined that this position is not necessary at this time, and that resources would be better used toward a public safety officer.

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz gave a presentation as detailed in the written Council Agenda Report. The City Council was requested to make one appointment to the Santa Barbara County Library Advisory Committee. An Appointee was needed to fill a term that runs concurrently with the County-wide library contract, until discharged by the County Board of Supervisors, or resignation by the member. One application was received from Incumbent Maureen Theobald.

On motion by Mayor Patino, seconded by Councilmember Orach, and carried unanimously, Maureen Theobald was reappointed to the Santa Barbara County Library Advisory Committee.

PUBLIC HEARING:

5. PLANNED DEVELOPMENT PERMIT AND TENTATIVE TRACT MAP FOR CELEBRATION II, LOCATED WEST OF MILLER STREET, SOUTH OF INGER DRIVE, NORTH OF DANIEL STREET, PD-2013-0010, TRACT 5993, E-2013-0040. The City Council conducted a public hearing to consider a recommendation of the Planning Commission approving an Addendum to the Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for the Celebration II project (E-2013-0040) and adopting resolutions approving the Tentative Tract Map (Tract 5993) and the Planned Development Permit PD-2013-0010 for Celebration II project site located south of Inger Drive, north of Daniel Drive, and west of Miller Street.

Planning Division Manager Gilli gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The applicant has requested a Planned Development permit and Tentative Tract Map to construct 11 single-family homes (averaging 1,527 square feet in size) and two medical buildings (one 10,771 square feet, the other 7,000 square feet). There are already 42 single family residential units on the site. A landscaped plaza with seating, decorative paving, and bicycle racks is proposed adjacent to the medical office building near Inger Drive.

The residential units are below the 30 foot height limitation in the R-2 zoning district and the medical buildings exceed the height limitation. Staff supports the increase in height to provide for aesthetic benefits. Residential homes will vary in architectural styles to include Spanish Colonial, Mediterranean, and Craftsman. They will also have a small backyard and detached garage. The medical buildings will have a contemporary design with prominent architectural features.

A total of 224 parking spaces will be provided with a reciprocal access and parking agreement between the lots to meet parking needs of the project. The final landscape plan will be reviewed during the building permit process for the project. Overall, the proposed project will enhance the

Miller Street frontage, no further environmental review is required, and no significant fiscal impacts would occur to the City as a result of the project other than typical costs associated with providing public services.

Written communications.

Public Hearing.

Mayor Patino opened the public hearing at 7:03 p.m.

Frances Romero, representing FORMA Consultants, spoke in favor of the project and thanked staff for working with them to create a project everyone can be proud of. The project should be a good visual enhancement for the neighborhood.

Councilmember Zuniga asked about the busy street and how the project will create a community atmosphere for residents living there.

Ms. Romero explained that the detached garages and a small backyard space will make the units feel like more of a home. The zero lot line will give each homeowner a little more room. There is also potential for a park at the entrance and the plaza next to the medical building will make the area more inviting.

Councilmember Boysen asked about the ingress off of Miller Street and whether the speed of cars on that particular road had been evaluated.

Acting Director of Public Works Springer responded that the Miller Street access had been evaluated in 2005. There is a right-turn deceleration lane to turn into the parking lot and the access was determined to be appropriate as the density of the project has decreased since its original conception. A left turn onto Miller would not be possible as there is a solid median in the street.

Freddy Smith spoke in favor of the project stating that he lives in the neighborhood. But he said he and his neighbors object to the park area on the Inger side of the proposed project and the open area on the Miller Street side near the bus area. Financially, they believe the Homeowner's Association (HOA) should not be responsible for the fees required to keep these two areas up. They were also concerned about the insurance issues involved.

Ms. Romero responded that the plaza next to the medical building will be the medical building's responsibility. The proposed park area will be the HOA's responsibility.

Community Development Director Appel responded that each project design requires a certain amount of open space. The basin had been required for both that reason and for flood control. He explained that there is no plan for recreational uses at this point.

Councilmember Boysen indicated that he had ex parte communications with Ms. Romero and Mr. Taylor (the developer) when the project was in its development phase. He has always supported an open space for the increasing population of children in the area given that there is no park area nearby, however, he did not think it should necessarily be the responsibility of the HOA. He said he did like the design of the proposed project.

Ms. Romero said that the Inger Street basin had been designed with an area that would be usable for recreation. There is already an HOA that covers that part of the basin and they have chosen not to develop that.

Councilmember Orach commented that with HOA situations, there are always certain homeowners who do not make their payments, so agreeing to fund a recreational component in the neighborhood can become a difficult situation.

Councilmember Zuniga said she agreed with Councilmember Boysen on the idea of having more of a recreational component, but she did not think the project space supported that component. She said she will be inclined to evaluate future projects based on their mixed use capabilities.

After hearing no further comments, Mayor Patino closed the public hearing at 7:24 p.m.

6. MUNICIPAL CODE TEXT AMENDMENTS FOR COTTAGE FOOD OPERATIONS, Z-2013-0003, E-2013-0041 (CITYWIDE). The City Council conducted a public hearing to consider a recommendation of the Planning Commission to approve a negative declaration and amendments to Title 12 of the City's Municipal Code establishing Chapter 12-29B Cottage Food Operations (CFO) and other related amendments to Title 12 to add the definition and amend allowed uses in all residential zoning districts for Cottage Food Operations.

Planning Division Manager Gilli gave a presentation as detailed in the written Council Agenda Report. In 2013, a new State law went into effect allowing CFO in all residential areas of the State. This would include the sale of certain food items such as baked goods, candies, dried fruit, honey, and jams to customers. Two primary concerns with CFO are food safety and neighborhood impacts. All CFO must get approval from the Santa Barbara County Public Health Department. The City then addresses neighborhood impacts such as parking, noise, and traffic issues.

Staff is proposing the following zoning regulations seven days a week: 1) Loading and unloading deliveries or sales shall be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.; 2) one non-resident employee may be on the premises; 3) a maximum of 20 employee, customer, or delivery vehicle trips related to the CFO may enter the neighborhood each day and will be limited to the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.; 4) vehicles must park in legal spaces and not block sidewalks or driveways; 5) no on-site consumption of products, other than small samples, may take place; and 6) no outdoor storage or display related to the CFO would be allowed.

For a resident to start a CFO, they need to complete an application in conjunction with the Business License, confirm they have read and understand the applicable regulations, and receive approval from the County Health Department. Special handouts with information on the process will be prepared by staff and made available at the Community Development Department's front counter and on the City's website. Currently, there are 14 CFOs in Santa Maria and none have indicated that the proposed ordinance would adversely affect them.

Public Hearing.

Mayor Patino opened the public hearing at 7:36 p.m., and closed the public hearing having received no requests to speak on this item.

Council Discussion

Councilmembers and Mayor Patino expressed concern about the seven day timeframe of the Ordinance given that Sundays are often a day when neighbors may object to business as usual with a CFO.

Mayor Patino asked if it would be possible to review the Ordinance in six months to see if any problems existed.

Director of Community Development Appel said the State had no restrictions on days of operation. He went on to say that staff could always revisit the Ordinance as needed.

Assistant City Attorney Sinco responded that days and hours of operation may be regulated by the City if there is a problem with traffic, noise, or parking. The 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. timeframe for operating a CFO should help keep any disturbance to the neighborhood minimal.

Councilmember Boysen indicated that weekends may be the only time for a Cottage Food operator to actually work his or her business due to full-time employment elsewhere during the week. He said CFO have become very popular as a way to make extra money and he would support passing the item and revisiting it as needed. He expressed some concern about the 7:00 a.m. start time on Saturdays or Sundays.

Councilmember Zuniga expressed support of leaving the weekend hours as they were and revisiting the item as needed.

Councilmember Green pointed out that many people now work seven days a week.

City Manager Haydon said any issues arising over the next six months would be evaluated and brought back to Council at a later date.

Councilmember Orach asked how long it would take to resolve issues. He also asked how often the County evaluates Cottage Food operations.

Mr. Sinco responded that police officers would be available on the weekends to handle any complaints and issue citations, if necessary. He said the ordinance could be revisited anytime if there were evidence of problems.

With regard to County evaluations, Mr. Appel responded that there are two different types of permits involved. Type A is issued when a CFO sells out of the house. Type B is issued when a CFO sells to another commercial operation such as a restaurant. The Type A permit involves no inspection. Type B requires inspection of the working area. Both types are required to be filed once a year.

Ordinance No. 2014-04 adopted. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING TITLE 12 OF THE SANTA MARIA MUNICIPAL CODE REGULATING COTTAGE FOOD OPERATIONS.

7. LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE DISTRICT ASSESSMENTS. The City Council held a public hearing for the 2014-15 annual assessments for the City's four Landscape Maintenance Districts – Northwest Landscape Maintenance District, Northeast Landscape Maintenance District, Southwest Landscape Maintenance District, and South Miller Street/South College Drive Landscape Maintenance District, and the 21 associated Special Benefit Zones.

Director of Recreation and Parks Posada gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The landscape assessments presented to the City Council on May 20, 2014 were approved authorizing that assessment amounts be placed on the 2014-15 Santa Barbara County Property Tax rolls. Staff is required to process the new assessments and submit them to the County Assessor's Office by the July 25, 2014 deadline. Annual assessments are adjusted by the Consumer Price Index (CPI). A formula adopted by the City Council limits adjustments in assessments not to exceed 3 percent annually. However, for 2014-15 no adjustment is being made to current assessment levels. The Landscape Districts and 21 Special Benefit Zone assessments will generate approximately \$2.7 million in revenue to fund direct maintenance services and District operations. The City's General Fund provides a financial contribution of approximately \$659,600. This contribution is made on behalf of the 24,064 commercial and residential properties not assessed by a Landscape Maintenance District, as they existed prior to the establishment of said Districts.
