




Assessment and Investigation

- 24 Hour In-person response
- Individual social worker, or multi-disciplinary response
- Assess for safety, risk, protective capacity, and family strengths, including the following factors:
 - prior child welfare involvement,
 - domestic violence,
 - substance abuse,
 - medical and mental health care needs


In 2013, Santa Barbara County social workers conducted 3,309 in-person investigations.


Foster Care

Children enter foster care when they cannot safely remain in the family home due to abuse or neglect. **Resource Families open** their homes, providing a safe haven for these children.

Family Reunification

 Provides intervention and support services for a limited time period to parents and their children who have been removed from the home.

 The goal is a safe home environment so that the child may return home.

Family Reunification Services

A case plan is developed by the social worker in collaboration with the family and may include services for:

- counseling
- mental health treatment
- substance abuse treatment
- domestic violence
- parent education

The Role of the Foster Parent in Family Reunification

Foster parents play a critical role in family reunification by:

- providing for the needs of the child
- helping the child to be successful in school
- support visitation between the child and their parents
- being a role model to the child and parents
- providing a safe environment for the child

Permanent Placement

To ensure that children have safe, stable, and permanent homes to grow up in

 To create lifelong connections with a caring adult





Adoption


- Federal policy prefers adoption as first permanency option
- Requires termination of parental rights

Legal Guardianship

Alternative Forms of Permanency

- Relative or non-relative who has legal authority and responsibility
- A relative may receive financial assistance through Kin-Gap
- Long-term foster care with relatives, non-relatives, or group homes
- Continued efforts are made to obtain legal permanency


Santa Barbara County Total Number of Children in Foster Care 2003-2013(Children 0-20)

Placement Home Types


Approved Relatives/Non- Related Extended Family Members	 Approved to care for identified children who are related or who have a pre-existing familial/mentoring relationship (coach, teacher)
County Licensed Foster Family Home	 Licensed to provide out of home care for up to 6 unrelated children.
Foster Family Agency Home	 Certified by Foster Family Agency to provide treatment foster care for up to 6 unrelated children.
Small Family and Group Homes	 Licensed by Community Care Licensing to provide specialized care for children with specialized medical, behavioral, or mental health needs.

Goals of RFA Process

Streamlined processes

Fewer placement changes

Greater stability and safety for the child

Greater support for Relative and Non-relative homes

Resource Family Approval

Legislative Intent: To develop a unified, family friendly, and child centered resource family approval process that:

- Eliminates duplication
- Increases approval standards
- Incorporates a comprehensive psychosocial assessment of all families
- Includes approval for: foster care, adoption, guardianship
