Proposed Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban Ordinance and the associated Environmental Impact Report

Statewide there are 109 adopted ordinances

- 137 Cities and Counties are impacted
- Locally this includes: City of Santa Barbara, City of Carpinteria, as well as the County and all cities within San Luis Obispo.

 May 17, 2013 - As a member of BEACON, Santa Barbara County released a regional EIR related to Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban Ordinances for Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties.

• June 25, 2013 – Your Board directed staff to develop a draft ordinance and a revised EIR with the County listed as the Lead Agency based on the work provided by BEACON.

• December 9, 2013 – Draft EIR was released to the public.

• January 16, 2014 – Public Hearing on Draft EIR. (Four members of the public attended this meeting.)

January 24, 2014 – Public comment period ended.
 (Two written comments were received and later responded to)

 Spring 2014 – Finalization of EIR and Draft Ordinance are placed on hold in lieu of developing State legislation.

September 30, 2014 – SB 270 signed into law

 Implementation of State law has been delayed pending the result of an initiative on the November 8, 2016 ballot

What is the Ordinance? What does it do?

Project Objectives

- Reduction of litter and associated environmental impacts related to single-use plastic bags
- Deterring the use of paper bags
- Promoting a shift toward the use of reusable bags
- Reducing the amount of single-use bags in the trash

Our Ordinance

 Based on BEACON ordinance (like the City of Santa Barbara and the County of Los Angeles)

 Similar to the State Single-Use Bag Ban legislation SB 270

- If SB 270 is enacted after the November 2016 election
 - State law will replace local ordinance
 - Due to similar language this is expected to be a smooth transition for affected retailers and customers

Our Ordinance - Stores Affected

- Only certain retailers affected...
 - Supermarkets
 - Grocery Stores
 - Pharmacies
 - Liquor Stores
 - Other retail stores selling a limited line of goods including: milk, bread, soda, and snack foods



Our Ordinance - Stores Affected

Doesn't include all bags...

Product & produce bags (i.e. bags for prescription drugs)

Doesn't include all stores...

- Department stores, clothing stores, hardware stores (stores that don't sell food)
- Restaurants
- Wine/beer tasting rooms

Our Ordinance - Stores Affected

- Estimated Total Number of Affected Stores in Unincorporated Area:
 74
- 8 Large "1st Tier" Retailers (over 10,000 square feet with gross sales over \$2 million)
- 66 Smaller Retailers (smaller markets, pharmacies, and liquor stores not covered by the above definition)

Our Ordinance - Enforcement

- Primarily complaint based similar to other jurisdictions
 - Research shows compliance universal
 - No found example of a fine or penalty given to an affected retailer
- Public Works responsible for enforcement
 - Education & outreach

The Purposes of CEQA

- Disclose significant effects of proposed actions
- Identify ways to avoid or reduce impacts
- Consider feasible alternatives
- Foster interagency coordination
- Enhance public participation
- Inform decision-makers and public at large

Alternatives in the EIR

- 1. No project
- 2. Ban of single-use plastic bags at all retailers except restaurants
- 3. Mandatory charge of \$0.25 for paper bags
- 4. Ban on both plastic and paper single-use bags
- 5. Mandatory charge for both plastic and paper single-use bags
- 6. Delayed implementation for the northern portion of the County

EIR study areas

- 1. Air Quality
- 2. Greenhouse Gas Emissions
- 3. Biological Resources
- 4. Water Resources
- 5. Utilities

Impact Classifications

- Class I Significant and Unavoidable
- Class II Significant but Mitigable
- Class III Adverse but less than Significant
- Class IV Beneficial
- Project Specific and Cumulative

This Project...

- Class III Adverse but less than Significant
 - 1. Air Quality
 - 2. Greenhouse Gas Emissions
 - 3. Water Resources
 - 4. Utilities

This Project...

Class IV – Beneficial

- 1. Air Quality reduction in air pollution associated with bag manufacture, transportation and use
- 2. Biological Resources reduction in overall amount of litter entering creeks and coastal habitats
- 3. Water Resources reduction of litter in storm drains

Findings...

- 1. Air Quality Beneficial and less than significant impacts
- 2. Greenhouse Gas Emissions Less than significant impacts
- 3. Biological Resources Beneficial impacts
- 4. Water Resources Beneficial and less than significant impacts
- 5. Utilities Less than significant impacts

Ordinance Schedule

- Ordinance goes into effect 30 days after adoption (second reading) –
 September 24, 2015
- Education & outreach efforts to affected retailers –
 Fall & Winter 2015/2016
- Operative as to first tier (large) stores 180 days after effective date of ordinance – March 22, 2016
- Operative as to second tier (small) stores one year after effective date of ordinance – September 24, 2016

Recommended Actions

- Today's hearing (July 21st, 2015)...
 - Approve the introduction (first reading) of an Ordinance amending the Santa Barbara County Code Chapter 16 to create 16B Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban (Attachment A);
 - Read the title of the Ordinance and waive reading of the Ordinance in full;
 - Receive and file a report on the Environmental Impact Report (SCH# 2013111013) for the Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban Ordinance within the Unincorporated Area of Santa Barbara County; and
 - Continue the hearing to August 25, 2015

Recommended Actions

- Next month's hearing (August 25th, 2015) on the Administrative Agenda...
 - Consider the adoption (second reading) of an Ordinance amending the Santa Barbara County Code Chapter 16 to create 16B to enact a Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban in the unincorporated areas of Santa Barbara County;
 - Read the title of the Ordinance and wave reading of the Ordinance in full;
 - Make the required findings for the Santa Barbara County Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban Ordinance Final Environmental Impact Report (included as Attachment B); and
 - Certify the Environmental Impact Report (SCH# 2013111013) for the Single-Use Plastic Bag Ban Ordinance within the Unincorporated Area of Santa Barbara County.
