Greetings. It's that Donna Lewis person, your APCD CAC appointee.

I submitted the letter below to the Planning Commission after examining the voluminous docs of PCEC's Planning application in June. Although the Planning Commission denied the project 3 to 2, staff's subsequent and strangely short staff letter failed to address not only my main concerns of hydrogen sulfide risk and fresh water use, but also these **same concerns** expressed by 2 of the Planning Commissioners at the June hearing.

As a result, your Board is without key facts. I have therefore pasted in below my June letter to the Planning Commission.

DO NOT BE DISMAYED by the multitude of references. They make it look more complex than it is. I request that your Board deny PCEC's appeal.

Commissioner Ferini and members of The Commission,

Please accept these comments on the above project proposed by Pacific Coast Energy Company (PCE). The comments are offered on my own behalf. I worked at APCD as an engineer and performed many of the analysis types I discuss in this letter. I thank APCD Division Manager Ben Ellenberger for his quick responses to my questions on 6-21 and 6-22-16.

#### 1. Hydrogen Sulfide (H<sub>2</sub>S) Is Not Getting Its Due.

#### a. H<sub>2</sub>S is lethal, not just an odor

Applicant incorrectly characterizes the expected releases of H<sub>2</sub>S as an odor issue instead of a Class I acute health risk. Example: "odor" is listed alone as "Most relevant effects" at EIR page 4.1-5, row 4. Even though the EIR states that H<sub>2</sub>S levels in produced gas are expected to be up to **20,000 ppm** (EIR page 4.1-21, parag 2) and "travel considerable distances" from the release locations (Ibid), and be detectable by smell miles away, and even though it acknowledged a lethal threshold of 100 ppm (EIR page 4.1-7, 5<sup>th</sup> parag), the Applicant does not address the lion's share of the health risk.

Applicant makes much of the fact that H<sub>2</sub>S can be smelled at very low thresholds but neglects a key fact. H<sub>2</sub>S causes olfactory nerve paralysis, which makes the exposed person unable to smell it at 100 ppm. See OSHA chart on page 2 of this letter.

It appears that P&D Staff accepted Applicant's incomplete assessment of the  $H_2S$  impact and based critical CEQA conclusions on  $H_2S$  as just an odor issue (P&D Report page Sec 6.1.2,  $2^{nd}$  parag). In fact,  $H_2S$  is a large scale acute health risk. Below I explain why this is so, why the Staff assessment of  $H_2S$  is incomplete and why complete analysis reveals a Class I impact that cannot justify a Statement of Overriding Consideration.

The Applicant's own value for the project produced gas concentration, 20,000 ppm, is far higher than all of the thresholds for serious effects of this gas. The US OSHA chart below shows thresholds for deadening of the ability to smell  $H_2S$  (100 ppm), lowest concentration associated with death (100 ppm), collapse within 2 breaths (700-1000 ppm) and instant death (1000-2000 ppm).

H<sub>2</sub>S is not a hypothetical hazard. It has killed in our local oilfields. In 1994, Vintage Petroleum lost 3 workers to H<sub>2</sub>S at its Seacliff facility which is just off Highway 101 north of Ventura. (http://articles.latimes.com/1994-08-11/news/mn-26016 1 hydrogen-sulfide on 6-22-16) Assistant Fire Chief Dave Festerling responded to the Vintage deaths. He said that hydrogen sulfide "can be absorbed so rapidly into the blood stream that it is sometimes fatal by the time a person smells it." (Ibid) According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), H<sub>2</sub>S caused 60 worker deaths between 2001 and 2010. https://www.osha.gov/SLTC/hydrogensulfide/ on 6-23-16) These facts show that Applicant soft-pedals the environmental impact of H<sub>2</sub>S and has erroneously characterized its Class 1 impacts as Class II.

b. County P&D and APCD Are Inexplicably Silent on H<sub>2</sub>S. Neither the APCD condition letter (P&D Staff Report, Att B, pg 31-34) nor the P&D Staff report mention H<sub>2</sub>S. It is APCD's role to review at least the air portions of the EIR for sufficiency and adequacy, especially health risk impacts, which is why County P&D includes APCD's condition letter in its staff report.

Via email to the signatory of the APCD Condition Letter, I asked the APCD why its input to the EIR review is silent on  $H_2S$  given the lethality of this gas. APCD responded that its Mitigation Measure AQ-3a addresses tank releases of  $H_2S$ . My concerns about this Mitigation Measure are in the next section.

The fact that this gas is not named raises concerns about the adequacy of the project conditions. Until  $H_2S$  is named and efficacious conditions are specified, Applicant and agency conclusions cannot be relied upon as meeting CEQA or protecting public health.

- c. **Questionable Efficacy of Tank Detection System Mitigation Measure AQ-3a:** There are 3 concerns with this measure that could render it ineffective.
  - Either monitor pressure or send gas to VRS: This measure calls for a system that either monitors headspace pressure (NOT headspace H<sub>2</sub>S concentration) or directs gas that escapes the tank from pressure relief devices (PRDs) to a vapor recovery system (VRS). Applicant may prefer to monitor pressure because it is simpler and lower cost. Pressure is here used as a proxy for H<sub>2</sub>S detection. The way this measure is written, with an "or," no control method is specified in the first of the 2 choices. This is probably a clerical error, but it should be precisely stated because we cannot know efficacy until it is clear.
  - VRS does not address H<sub>2</sub>S: PRDs exist to protect the structural integrity of the tank (i.e. prevent rupture). Even if the PRDs are sensitive enough to vent 10% short of rupture as specified and they do vent the H<sub>2</sub>S to a VRS, VRSs do not remove H<sub>2</sub>S. H<sub>2</sub>S removal, called "sweetening," requires a different process. (<a href="http://naturalgas.org/naturalgas/processing-ng/on 6-25-16">http://naturalgas.org/naturalgas/processing-ng/on 6-25-16</a>) All that a VRS system does is cool, condense and collect gas that can be condensed. Accordingly, the measure seems ineffective as mitigation for H<sub>2</sub>S.
  - Tanks Are *Part* of the Picture, Not the Main Source: The measure addresses only tanks even though H<sub>2</sub>S is emitted as "fugitive emissions" from oil field component connections. The project is adding hundreds of connections in its 10,000+ feet of new pipelines. H<sub>2</sub>S is highly corrosive and rusts ferrous metals rapidly. Staff does not mention, quantify, limit or condition these **new** H<sub>2</sub>S emissions.

Measure AQ-3a, therefore, is not adequate to mitigate the risks presented by project H<sub>2</sub>S.

- d. H<sub>2</sub>S Impacts Sensitive Species. CEQA requires consideration of this impact. H<sub>2</sub>S is colorless and sinks into depressions and displaces oxygen there, which is one way that it kills. Exposure times of 2-15 minutes deaden the victim's ability to smell it (See table on page 2). This caused many a worker to think it was gone and then succumb. In addition to humans, H<sub>2</sub>S asphyxiates airbreathing creatures such as amphibians, mammals, birds and reptiles. The California tiger salamander is an amphibian that lives in or near water, which, like H<sub>2</sub>S, accumulates in low areas. It is therefore at special risk. The salamander might not care much about the odor, but it is not immune to the lethality of this gas.
- e. H<sub>2</sub>S Is Far From Inert: Applicant incorrectly characterizes H<sub>2</sub>S as inert (EIR section 4.1-3, parag 4). This is objectively and scientifically inaccurate. It is highly reactive, corrosive, lethal, and has its own ambient air quality standard (Hydrogen Sulfide Corrosion: Its Consequences, Detection and Control, USEPA, Sept 1991, #832S9100, page 2 and (<a href="http://www.arb.ca.gov/research/aaqs/caaqs/h2s/h2s.htm">http://www.arb.ca.gov/research/aaqs/caaqs/h2s/h2s.htm</a> on 6-24-16). Inert compounds do not become the subjects of ambient air quality standards. If what Applicant means is that H<sub>2</sub>S does not react with ROCs or NOx and sunlight to form ozone, Applicant should so limit its assertion to avoid the potential for misleading the reader into thinking H<sub>2</sub>S is harmless.
- 2. Inscrutable Basis For Emission Totals: MRS/PCE uses the numbers in EIR Table 4.1-8 to conclude that air impacts will be mitigable. This conclusion would allow the project to pass CEQA muster if mitigations are efficacious. One way to assess impacts is to compare project emission totals to emission thresholds set by the jurisdiction.

  The validity of the emission totals in EIR Table 4.1-8 is therefore critical. Underlying these totals are mobs of calculations and emission factors (EFs). I will spare you the calculations. Let's look just at EFs. Noting the vagueness of references to sources of emission factors (more in Sec 3 below), I asked the APCD staff member who signed APCD's condition letter these questions:

- a. What are the sources for the EFs?
- b. Did PCE/MRS discuss the EFs with APCD before the EIR was finalized in April 2016? APCD staff tracked down the EFs to my satisfaction; I am much obliged. I still do not know, though, whether this was done before APCD sent its condition letter. Although it does state that a permit is required, APCD's condition letter does not state that criteria pollutant offsets or Best Available Control Technology (BACT) would be triggered. In other words, the APCD has relied on Applicant's emission calculations which lead to the conclusion that two of APCD's most powerful methods of controlling air pollution, BACT & offsets, are foreclosed. This acceptance by APCD makes it difficult for it to decide later to require BACT or offsets. It stretches credulity that a project of this size involving drilling, well enhancement and 96 wells would not trigger BACT or offsets. Accordingly, any decision on the project should be deferred until the emission totals are shown to be accurate.
- 3. **Vague References:** The EIR is replete with references that are vague enough to make it very difficult for the lead agency, and almost impossible for the public, to find what is being cited. Examples:
  - a. On pg 4.1-19 of the proposed Final EIR, MRS/PCE states that "APCD spreadsheets were utilized in estimating tank emissions and crude oil properties." What spreadsheets? APCD has thousands of them.
  - b. "APCD website accessed 2014". This reference is unworkably vague. To enable the reader to find the source, the minimum information needed is the webpage URL and the date of access. In the case of the APCD's website, this is even more important because it is deep, with hundreds of webpages. It is reasonable to assume that it has been updated at least 6 times since 2014.
  - c. MRS/PCE state in Sec 4.1 of the April 2016 EIR App B that some EFs are "proposed by the Applicants." The implication is that they are nonstandard or negotiable. Both are red flags when it comes to EFs.

Given the vagueness of references, how would the public assess MRS/PCE's totals? Adequate citations are essential because they would enable the reader to determine if the EFs are correct.

#### 4. The Project's High Water Use in the Current Drought is Unjustified

Freshwater usage on just the drilling phase is 1.2 million gallons<sup>[1]</sup>. This is too much in a county in the 5<sup>th</sup> year of a serious drought, reservoirs close to empty, aquifers dropping, 35% conservation already achieved, sharply rising water rates, and new construction of a desalination plant. As a frame of reference, using my half-acre home and average water usage as a sample, 1.2 million gallons could supply 39 homes like mine for a year<sup>[2]</sup>. 39 such homes would be a 24 acre housing tract<sup>[3]</sup>. 24 acres is over three times the area that this project allocates to habitat disturbance, 6.09 acres (Attachment B; Conditions of Approval, page B-15). 1.2 million gallons is more than Applicant's share of finite freshwater supplies on which we all depend.

The fact that Applicant's plan includes drilling its own water wells does not remedy the problem because aquifers are finite in a drought. We are without facts on which to base a reasonable conclusion that the target aquifer is recharging. Accordingly, water removed from it reduces the supply for everyone else relying on the aquifer. Despite the scale of Applicant's planned water use, I find no limits on the freshwater to be taken from the proposed new water wells, nor is there any mitigation for the reduced freshwater supply.

#### 5. Statement of Overriding Consideration is Unjustified

Applicant cites six justifications for a Statement of Overriding Consideration (SOC) (Staff Report page 8). Two of the six cite reducing the need for foreign oil or meeting domestic energy needs, both of which are not justifications when the *US* is exporting domestic oil.

The question, then, is whether the 4 remaining "justifications" are adequate to support an SOC. The second listed justification is to leverage extraction technology for efficiency of extraction (Staff Report page 8). While this may benefit PCE, it would not automatically benefit the environment or the public. If, to be a "justification", it were enough that the item benefit the Applicant, profit would be listed as a justification, yet it is not.

The third listed justification is to use the brine that comes from the formation with the oil. This brine is essentially a hazardous waste, so I favor a good use for it. It cannot be used, however, to water crops or landscaping or even to farm salt water fish. Whether Applicant can use this water for steam as stated without the use of chemicals is questionable. Brine is corrosive, and brine steam is even worse. Steam handling equipment that is challenged in this way requires chemicals yet no mention is made of chemicals. Where are the chemicals identified as to ingredients, quantity, usage limits, fire safety issues, etc? Absent adequate facts, this is more of a red flag than a justification. The fifth listed justification is increasing employment. The drilling jobs are temporary and many do not go to local residents. Once oil wells are in production, the number of employees needed to keep them running is small. Even when oil prices are high, oil production employs few workers in this county. For example, in 2013 the entire County of Santa Barbara employed just 641 people in direct oil and gas extraction (The Oil and Gas Industry in California, Its Economic Contribution and

Five of the six justifications, then, aren't justifications. Accordingly, an SOC would tack close to "arbitrary and capricious" — a hallmark of government decisions that get reversed on appeal.

Workforce in 2013, Western States Petroleum Association, June 2015, page 53).

**Request:** For the reasons stated above, there are Class I impacts that are not identified, Class II impacts that are not mitigated, air pollution totals that do not yet rest on a reliable foundation, massive water use, unaddressed red flags related to brine, and an unjustified Statement of Overriding Consideration. I request that this project be denied.

Salud Carbajal has made many thoughtful decisions and has cast votes that served Santa Barbara County well. Would he now take a radical position in the guise of "moderation"?

PCEC wants permission to drill 96+ new wells at Orcutt Hill, doubling their activity there. It is already one of the riskiest and dirtiest oil operations in the county. Just ask people who live in the vicinity. And unlike operations of the past, it is way out of normal bounds.

Existing activity is causing oil to seep uncontrollably in over 100 locations. If the project, or any proposed alternative, is approved, the seeps will continue to grow in number and destructive effect. PCEC should not get a permit to add new wells while current ones are shut down due to well failures.

It would be an "extreme" act to dramatically expand drilling in a field with that many seeps, explosive well-casing failures, surface cracks, heaving and other problems... and to allow a drilling process that would require almost 2 million gallons of our precious freshwater.

Voting for any expansion in Orcutt is an "extreme" position. It would be an "extreme" act to pretend that the possible benefits of approval, like short-term construction jobs, one or two permanent jobs and unknowable tax revenues, come close to outweighing the project's significant and severe impacts to water, habitat and air quality.

It would be an "extreme" act to take on the risks to the county of major health and environmental damage, including pollution of our water resources. Already financially stressed, PCEC might not be able to afford the costs of a major cleanup. This could leave us with the consequences and all taxpayers in the county with the tab.

There are no grounds for the claim that any PCEC proposal would reduce the incidence of seeps, spills and well-casing failure. None of the PCEC proposals would contribute much of value to the county. If more wells are not approved, not a single existing job would be lost. But, and not surprisingly, PCEC owners and shareholders stand to profit handsomely by more drilling there.

Some Orcutt residents are already suffering from toxic chemicals and odors from the site. That would only worsen if the project is permitted. Allowing any more drilling at that location is immoderate and irresponsible.

When our county supervisors cast their votes, the interests of our county, its residents and local businesses should count more than any potential short-term gain for PCEC shareholders. After long and careful study by our county planning commission and by expert civic organizations, the conclusions are clear, the right decision is obvious. The appeal by PCEC should be denied and no form of the project should be permitted.

Let's hope Salud Carbajal again takes the reasoned path and votes in our behalf.

Dear Santa Barbara Board of Supervisors Carbajal,

As a Defender of Wildlife and a resident of Santa Barbara, I am writing to urge you to deny the Pacific Coast Energy Company's oil drilling project.

The project, situated in the environmentally sensitive Orcutt Hills of northern Santa Barbara County, endangers one of the most biologically diverse locations in California - an area that is home to several rare plant and animal species, including the federally protected California Tiger Salamander.

There are already 96 wells on the Orcutt Oil Field, and the area has a history of accidents - to date, there have been 100 uncontrolled oil seeps seeps that inundate and ruin the homes of California wildlife.
