

Re: Draft Gaviota Coast Plan

Dear Honorable Supervisors,

This letter is submitted by the undersigned community groups, urging the Board of Supervisors to preserve the Gaviota Coast for the entire Santa Barbara community by ensuring the Gaviota Coast Plan's policies provide meaningful protection for wildlife habitat, agriculture, scenic vistas and public access. Our vision for Gaviota is to protect this last undeveloped stretch of California's rural coastline in a manner that preserves its rich biological, cultural and rural character from inappropriate development and land uses, while also supporting agriculture that helps maintain Gaviota's rural character.

To that end, our community groups urge the Board of Supervisors to support the inclusion of the following amendments to the Draft Gaviota Coast Plan recommended by the Planning Commission:

• To improve the balance between Gaviota's agricultural land uses and wildlife habitats, we urge the Board to protect Gaviota's Environmentally Sensitive

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Habitats ("ESH") from land clearing by amending the Gaviota Plan ESH Ordinance to protect ESH from new and expanded large scale agricultural activities.

- Protect Gaviota from industrialization by prohibiting new oil and gas projects that use fracking, steam injection, and other unconventional enhanced oil and gas extraction technologies in the Gaviota Coast Plan Area.
- Protect scenic vistas and give special consideration to views from important public viewing areas, including the railroad, in addition to Highway 101.
- Ensure the Gaviota Coast Plan's coastal policies are consistent with the Coastal Act.
- Support local Gaviota farmers by promoting flexible agricultural permitting and allowing additional small scale uses on agriculturally zoned land, such as farm stays and farm stands.
- Ensure that the Plan will provide public access to and along the coast.

We urge the Board to ensure the Gaviota Coast Plan it approves and submits to the Coastal Commission will include policies that serve these core community values.
