Storms

Major storm events occurred between 2014 to 2017 removing more than 100,000 cubic yards of sand from Goleta Beach, eroding 53,000 square feet of parkland and damaging park facilities

<u>2015-16 El Niño</u>: "One of the Most Powerful Climate Events of the Past 145 Years..."

 "New research conducted by U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) scientists and their colleagues at UC Santa Barbara and six other institutions found that during the 2015-16 El Niño winter beach erosion on the Pacific coast was 76 percent above normal, and that most beaches in California eroded beyond historical extremes" (UCSB The Current 2017).








Revetment Map

Possible Additional Cost Fiscal Years 2017-2018

- Park Re-Build (2017 storm)
 - \$600,000 estimate (parking lot 3, turf, irrigation, pier)
 - Unfunded and not included in Emergency Work
- Community engagement workshops
 - \$75,000 estimate
- CDP Amendment (2017 Emergency Permits)
 - \$50,000 estimate
 - Not included in Emergency Work noted in previous slides
- Removal of Emergency Work from Jan/Feb 2017
 - \$500,000 estimate
 - Location of rock disposal unknown



Next Steps

- Staff seeking a time extension for emergency permits with CCC to September 30, 2017
- Coastal Engineer to review and evaluate
 - Existing data
 - Effects of the emergency revetments on beach width and beach access
- Continue to coordinate efforts with Goleta Sanitary District regarding sewer vault protection emergency permit and possible relocation
- Analyze and evaluate all possible future beach and park adaptive management options
- Coordinate community engagement workshops
- Staff to return to Board August or September to present adaptive management options and seek direction
