The drive north on Highway 1 into Lompoc shows the failure of past reclamation efforts and its failure to return the landscape back its original form. These properties will be forever impacted and the valuable open, natural views in the area will never be the same.

The potential degradation of the visual and aesthetic qualities of this area is particularly significant since the project's viewshed serves as the "entrance" to the western end of the Sta. Rita Hills, world-renowned for its vineyards, wineries and beautiful rolling hills. I would like to comment on the Planning Commission hearing on the Sepulveda Project, Wednesday 2/28 in Santa Maria, item # 1 on the 9 AM agenda. Unfortunately I will not be able to attend.

The principle approach to Lompoc from Santa Barbara and the Southland is by way of Highway 1. The scenic route traveling from Las Cruces, where Highway 1 connects with Highway 101, is one of the important attractions for visitors to the City. Ending the 19 mile trip with the ugly scar of an unregulated mine would directly damage the hopes for the Lompoc's travel and wine industries. Rather than a city known for Arts and Flowers, we will become the victims of embarrassingly ugly environmental management.

Hollywood captured the bucolic beauty of the Santa Ynez Valley in the film Sideways (2004) which has become an attraction in the wine industry. Travelers approaching Lompoc from the East on Highway 246 expect the great scenic beauty, popularized in the film, to bring them past the wonderful Hibbits Ranch, with the beautiful walnut grove, into the City of Arts and Flowers, but would instead be greeted by an unimaginable, ugliness of an unregulated mine. The Sepulveda site threatens the water supply for Lompoc and the agriculture industry in Lompoc Valley. Uncovering a metalliferous sulfide body within the diatomaceous deposits could release toxins unknown in the days when this site was permitted. The Santa Ynez River is the source of water for all uses to the west and this resource could be damaged by unintended and unpredicted releases. I worry that without a correct environmental review the project will risk the water supply of Lompoc and its agriculture industry.

Please require this project to comply with existing land use rules of the county, restrict damage to the views seen from our major roads, and require modern pollution rules to guide risk assessment for the Lompoc Valley water supply. Please require the level of environmental review this project needs.
