On Monday, October 22, 2018, starting at 9:00 a.m., the County Board of Supervisors will hold a **Special Public Hearing** to consider accepting and agreeing to the California Coastal Commission's certification, with modifications, of the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance in the Coastal Zone.


The Board Agenda Letter, Coastal Commission Action Letter, and related documents will be available to review the week of October 15th on the Board of Supervisors website.

Accepting the Coastal Commission's certification will require the County Board of Supervisors to adopt a resolution acknowledging receipt of the California Coastal Commission's certification with suggested modifications of an amendment to the County's Local Coastal Program, Coastal Commission Case No. LCP-4-STB-18-0039-1-Part C Cannabis Regulations (County Case No. 17ORD-00000-00010), accepting and agreeing to the modifications approved by the California Coastal Commission, agreeing to issue Coastal Development Permits for the total area included in the certified Local Coastal Program, and adopting the Local Coastal Program Amendment with the suggested modifications.

The Board of Supervisors special hearing will be held on Monday, October 22, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. at the Board of Supervisors Hearing Room, 4th Floor, 105 East Anapamu Street, Santa Barbara.

As a parent of a young child who descends from longtime SB County farmers here in Carpinteria, I support the 2 mile ban and the other recommended changes to the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance. I support agriculture, but I can't get behind the pot industry in its current incarnation. This industry needs rules and regulations ASAP. These growers have the money to pay for permits, slow down, be considerate neighbors, add smell controls, and do things right, but they won't bother until there are people and laws to hold them accountable.

Re: Certification of the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance

#### Members of the Board:

As a 54 year old environmental organization protecting the Carpinteria Valley, the Carpinteria Valley Association (CVA) urges you to certify the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance with the 4 modifications requested by the Coastal Commission. It's not perfect, but we can not afford any further delay in the implementation. We are most supportive of the 2 mile ban of outdoor cultivation from the urban rural boundary line.

CVA feels that the community has waited long enough for the County to implement the rules and regulations for the Coastal Zone which were passed back in February 2018.

A CVA representative has attended most of the Planning Commission meetings and all of the Board of Supervisors meetings and supported most of the decisions that have been made during the past 2 years. Though many cultivators have received extensions on their temporary medical permits with the statement of having odor control, the odor continues to be a terrible problem here in the Carpinteria Valley, and all residents, including children at home and at school, need to be protected from these odors. Quite simply, it is our right living here. Yes, we live in a rural area but the vast majority of us have been living here for many years with no previous year round issues. We want to be able to open our windows and enjoy our outdoor beauty day and night, but this has been compromised for the past 2 years. It is time to begin serious enforcement.

The County has concurred that the Right to Farm Ordinance does not protect cannabis cultivators, but without the County's adoption of the Coastal Commission modifications, nothing can get done. Cultivators can't get licenses, the County can't receive any revenue, and the public is at the mercy of growers who aren't required to prevent their noxious odors from leaving their greenhouses, hoop houses, or outdoor fields. Nearly everyone has given up filing complaints because even though there's a new form, the pat answer from County Planning and Development is that nothing can really be done until the Coastal Commission approves the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance in the Coastal Zone.

CVA requests that you certify the Cannabis Land Use Ordinance that the Coastal Commission has approved.
