Process of drafting the Community Action Plan


- Scan of the homeless and housing environment in Santa Barbara County
- Review of all related material, processes and planning from the past several years
- Community-based process held October 2018 January 2019
 - community meetings
 - consumer focus group
 - targeted outreach through interviews, surveys and data collection

Goals of the Community Action Plan:


- Identify needs

SB County Homeless Population over Time





 subsidies and affordable
 housing projects

Activities to be Initiated

- Increase affordable housing available for those experiencing or at risk of homelessness
- Increase the Pool of Funding Available to Provide Housing and Services
- Expand Shelter System and Create Low Barrier Options
- Develop and Improve
 Partnerships with Landlords

5) Build Provider Capacity to Address the Needs of Specific Populations

Activities in Progress Activities to be Initiated At least one existing provider **Build Provider Capacity to Address** already specializes in serving the Needs of: the needs of homeless Survivors of Domestic Violence survivors, families, veterans, Families with Children youth, seniors adults with Homeless Veterans serious mental illness, and the Homeless Youth vehicular homeless Vehicular Homeless Adults with Serious Mental Disorders Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance
