

# Cannabis Regulatory Program Amendments - Chapter 50 Storefront Retail Amendments

Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors November 5, 2019



## Background – Current Framework

- Maximum of one storefront retail operation may be allowed in each of six community plan areas: 1) Orcutt, 2) Los Alamos, 3)
   Santa Ynez, 4) Eastern Goleta Valley, 5) Isla Vista/Goleta, and a combined 6) Summerland & Toro Canyon, plus up to two countywide for all sites in areas not covered by the community plan areas listed above
- One application per person, per business location would be pre-qualified
- Pre-qualified applicants would be random selected in each plan area and countywide for non-community plan locations
- All licenses are renewed annually; can be suspended, revoked or non-renewal for non-compliance; nontransferrable

### 1. Establish Criteria-based Selection

### Existing County Regulations

• Chapter 50 has a pre-qualification review process, placement on an eligible list, followed by a random selection process to rank the qualified applicants by community plan area and "at large."

### Area of Concern

 Members of the public have expressed concerns that the current random selection process left no ability to identify the high quality cannabis storefront retail operators

### Options

- Option #1 Amend Code to create a three-step criteria-based selection process that scores and ranks applicants in plan areas;
- Option #2 Amend Code to create a three-step criteria-based scored <u>pre-qualification</u> process; then a random selection among those prequalified; or
- Option #3 Maintain existing regulations



### 2. Roles in Criteria-Based Process

- Existing County Regulations
  - No roles are specified in the existing random selection process
- Area of Concern
  - Ensuring neighborhood compatibility could provide a role for the Board, staff and/or third party consultants in the criteria-based selection process

#### Options

- Option #1 Include the Board member, or a delegate, on a County Selection Committee for the community plan areas in their district;
- Option #2 Create a County Selection Committee to review and score cannabis storefront retail applications, and possibly with a public hearing for input prior to final selection;
- Option #3 Allow a third-party contractor to review and score applications;
- Option #4 Approve final selections at a Board meeting; or
- Option #5 Maintain existing regulations.

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# 3. Require Biz Ops and/or Neighborhood Compatibility Proposal

- Existing County Regulations
  - Chapter 50 requires the applicant minimal submission of the location and right to occupy with attestations
- Area of Concern
  - Random selection does not allow for ranking
- Options
  - Option #1 Amend Code to require submission of a Business Operations
     Proposal including the experience owning a cannabis business, record of
     compliant operations in the County, procedures manual, finance plan,
     employee training program, procurement and delivery plan, communications
     plan and security plan; or
  - Option #2 Amend Code to require submission of a Neighborhood
     Compatibility Proposal including customer & community education plan,
     community engagement plan, and neighborhood compatibility plan; or
  - Option #3 Both Options #1 & #2: or
  - Option #4 Maintain existing regulations



## 4. Application Format & Submittal

#### Existing County Regulations

 County Code has very broad description about what to submit and is nonspecific about format

#### Area of Concern

Given interest in submitting, common formatting with aid in proposal review

### Options

- Option #1 Amend Code to limit the size of applications submitted;
- Option #2 Amend Code to specify noticing and application submission period;
- Option #3 Amend Code to require previously identified criteria-based components and existing application elements from County Code § 50-8;
- Option #4 Any combo of Options #1-3; or
- Option #5 All Options #1 through #3; or
- Option #6 Maintain existing regulations.



# Retail Licenses and Permitting

- Land Use permitting for cannabis retail is in County Code Chapter
   35 and no changes are being proposed to those regulations at this time.
- Under County Code § 50-7.e.2, following the cannabis storefront retail selection process, the selected applicants would have 90 days to submit an application to the Planning and Development Department.
- The selected applicant may also apply for their Cannabis Business license at that same time.
- Cannabis retailers would also be required to obtain their State retail license from the Bureau of Cannabis Control prior to be allowed to operate in the unincorporated area.



### Recommended Actions

- Consider potential changes to the County's current cannabis storefront retail business licensing regulations;
- Provide conceptual direction on possible amendments to Chapter 50 (Licensing of Commercial Cannabis Operations to improve the effectiveness of the cannabis regulatory system;
- Provide any other direction to staff to amend the County's cannabis regulatory program;
- Determine, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines 15378(b)(5), that the above actions are not a project subject to CEQA review because they are administrative activities that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.
