## **Recommended Actions:**

That the Board of Supervisors consider the following recommendations:

a) Receive and file a report and receive an oral presentation from the Homeless Death Review Team on deaths of homeless persons in Santa Barbara County for the period January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018.

### Summary Text:

This item is on the agenda to provide the Board with a presentational update on Homeless Deaths in Santa Barbara County. The Homeless Death Review Team (HDRT) was created by County staff in 2008 to review homeless deaths and their causes, explore means to avert similar deaths and, where available, compile statistical data to identify trends. A report on the deaths of homeless persons has been provided to the Board of Supervisors on a regular basis since data began to be collected and analyzed in 2009. The current report includes data from calendar year 2018 with comparative data from 2014 through 2017.

### **Background:**

Responding to citizens' and community advocates' concerns about deaths among homeless people in Santa Barbara County, it was determined that a better understanding was needed of the extent and

circumstances of these deaths. To that end, the HDRT was formed to review and analyze these deaths in order to develop strategies to better assist this population.

The HDRT has conducted systematic reviews of the deaths of homeless persons who died beginning on January 1, 2009. Reports have been organized on a calendar year basis to promote comparisons across years. This is the seventh Santa Barbara County (SBC) homeless death review team (HDRT) report. It contains data on the number of deaths among people experiencing homelessness in the County for calendar year 2018. The definition of homelessness for the purposes of these analyses is the definition from the Federal Bureau of Primary Health Care. Data from multiple sources, including County departments (Public Health Department, Behavioral Wellness, the Sheriff's Department and the Department of Social Services), was combined with data from community-based organizations (homeless shelters and hospitals) to obtain a more complete picture for each individual. The reviews were focused on answering the following questions:

- What are the characteristics and trends in the deaths of homeless individuals in Santa Barbara County?
- What are the recommendations to improve care and reduce preventable premature deaths within the homeless population?

The HDRT identified 41 persons experiencing homelessness who died in Santa Barbara County in 2018. This compares to 44 deaths in 2017, 44 deaths in and 2016, and 40 deaths in 2015.

Based on the 2018 data, as well as data from previous reports and an understanding of the service area, several themes are apparent:

- Trends remain comparatively consistent. As identified in previous reports, substance abuse (drugs and alcohol) remains the most prevalent health condition identified in homeless individuals who died in 2018.
- In 2018, 15 out of the 41, or 36%, of the deaths occurred outdoors. The remaining 26 individuals, or 64%, died indoors. Of these indoor deaths, 13 died in a hospital or care facility. The percentage of outdoor deaths was lower in 2018 than noted in the 2015 through 2017 reports.
- Although more deaths occurred in the winters of 2016, 2017, and 2018, since reviewing homeless deaths in 2009, there is an overall even distribution of deaths seasonally when compared over the years.
- No deaths were attributed to the weather in 2018. In other words, no hypothermia, hyperthermia, or dehydration-related causes was listed as a cause of death for any of the 2018 decedents.
- Multiple agencies in Santa Barbara County work together to address challenges and to provide lifesaving/life prolonging services, i.e., housing, drug treatment, medical care, employment resources, etc. These interventions require intense coordination across organizations that is inherently complicated and the numbers of those in need outnumber the supply available.

Of the 41 cases, the leading cause of death in 2018 was due to cardiovascular disease and Drug/Alcohol overdose. These individuals died prematurely with average age of death being 58 years in 2018, compared to 76 years in the housed population for the same year.
