Recommended Actions:

That the Board of Supervisors:

- a) Authorize the Community Services Director or designee to submit a funding application and all certifications, standard forms, and other related documents to the State of California Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency (BCSHA) for 2019 State of California Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) funding for \$2,123,943 to obtain the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care (CoC) funding allocation; and
- b) Authorize the Community Services Director or designee to submit a funding application and all certifications, standard forms, and other related documents to the BCSHA for 2019 HHAP funding for \$1,967,681 to obtain the County of Santa Barbara allocation; and

- c) Authorize the Community Services Director or designee(s) to execute all certifications, standard forms, and grant agreement in a form substantially similar to the State Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) grant agreement included as Attachment A, and other related documents required for the acceptance and administration of HHAP funds allocated to the County of Santa Barbara; and
- d) Authorize the Community Services Director or designee(s) to execute all certifications, standard forms, and grant agreement in a form substantially similar to the State Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) grant agreement included as Attachment A, and other related documents required for the acceptance and administration of HHAP funds allocated to the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care; and
- e) Authorize the Community Services Director or designee to sign a Letter of Support for the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care to be included in the 2019 State of California Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) application for funding (Attachment B); and
- f) Determine that the recommended actions are not the approval of a project that is subject to environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15378(b)(5) and 15378(b)(4), finding that the recommended actions consist of administrative or fiscal activities of governments that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

Summary Text:

State Assembly Bill 101 included \$650 million in one-time HHAP block grants that provides local jurisdictions with funds to support regional coordination and expand or develop local capacity to address their immediate homelessness challenges. The Board is asked to authorize the Community Services Department (CSD) Director, or designee to submit two funding applications and all certifications, standard forms, and other related documents to BCSHA for HHAP funding for the following eligible uses:

- Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care \$2,123,943, of which \$700,000 to be dedicated for rental assistance and rapid rehousing, \$299,154 for incentives to landlords to provide dedicated housing units, \$700,000 to support the development of a Crisis Respite Navigation Center located in South County, and administrative and system support costs;
- *County of Santa Barbara* \$1,967,681, of which \$574,145 to be dedicated for outreach and coordination to assist vulnerable populations in accessing permanent housing and to promote housing stability in supportive housing, \$1,000,000 to support creation of a Crisis Respite Navigation Center located in South County and administrative and system support costs; and
- Combined Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care and County of Santa Barbara Youth Set-Aside allocations \$327,330, of which \$218,220 to be dedicated for rental assistance and rapid rehousing, and \$109,110 to outreach and coordination to assist vulnerable populations in accessing permanent housing and to promote housing stability in supportive housing.

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CSD requests authorization to execute all certifications, standard forms, and grant agreements on behalf of the County of Santa Barbara and the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care in a form substantially similar to the Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) (HEAP grant agreement included as Attachment A), and other related documents required for the acceptance and administration of HHAP funds; and authorization to sign a letter of support (Attachment B); these actions will allow \$4,091,624 in grant funds from the State of California to be used for eligible activities as defined by HHAP authorizing legislation.

The Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention Program (HHAP) was designed to provide jurisdictions with funding to support regional coordination and expand and develop local capacity to address immediate homelessness challenges. This regional coordination will help to ensure that services and efforts within the area are not duplicated, but instead are supplemented by one another. The Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC) is requiring applicants to submit letters of support from the other eligible applicants that are receiving grant funding within their jurisdiction. These letters shall acknowledge and agree to regional coordination and partnership, per Health and Safety Code 50219(a)(1). Letters should acknowledge that the overlapping jurisdiction(s) have reviewed and agree with how the applicant jurisdiction intends to spend their HHAP funds, and that the applicant's spending plan accurately addresses their share of the regional need to address homelessness. On February 6, 2020, the CoC Board affirmed use of the County HHAP funding to include support of the development of a Crisis Respite Navigation Center located in South County. In addition to supporting the County's use, the CoC will also dedicate part of the CoC HHAP allocation toward the development of a navigation center. The County has dedicated their youth set aside to be paired with the Continuum of Care's youth set aside allocation for \$327,330 and be included in the CoC's local NOFA process to distribute HHAP funds. The CoC Board is comprised of a broad range of stakeholders, including representatives from homeless service agencies, and others from the fields of behavioral health, health care, public health, law enforcement, education, youth, LGBT+, the faith community, public and private housing providers, local government, Veterans services, legal and disability services, domestic violence and victims assistance services, and formerly homeless individuals.

Applications are due to BCSHA on or before February 15, 2020 with all awards made by April 1, 2020.

Background:

The 2019-20 California State Budget included significant investments in both housing and homelessness. HHAP is a \$650 million one-time investment allocated to the 44 Continuums of Care, the 13 large cities and 58 Counties (Table 1). Allocations were based on the 2019 Point in Time Count of persons experiencing homelessness.

The County of Santa Barbara is both the State-recognized Administrative Entity on behalf of the Santa Maria/Santa Barbara County Continuum of Care (CoC) and the Lead Agency for the CoC. The County is the only eligible applicant on behalf of the CoC to apply to the State for HHAP funds. The allocations of \$2,123,943 million in HHAP funding is available for eligible homeless assistance activities within the jurisdictions served by the local CoC. An allocation of \$1,967,681 million in HHAP funding is available for eligible homeless assistance activities within the County. All funds are to be expended by June 2025. Grantees must administer programs in compliance with California's Housing First Policy and may not supplant existing program funding.

The program requires grantees to expend funds on eligible uses in an evidence-based framework that address and prevent homelessness. The eligible uses are: rental assistance and rapid rehousing; operating subsidies in new and existing affordable or supportive housing units, emergency shelters, and navigation centers. Operating subsidies may include operating reserves; incentives to landlords, including, but not limited to, security deposits and holding fees; outreach and coordination, which may include access to job programs, to assist vulnerable populations in accessing permanent housing and to promote housing stability in supportive housing; systems support for activities necessary to create regional partnerships and maintain a homeless services and housing delivery system particularly for vulnerable populations including families and homeless youth; delivery of permanent housing and innovative housing solutions such as hotel and motel conversions; prevention and shelter diversion to permanent housing; and new navigation centers and emergency shelters based on demonstrated need.

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The Phase I Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness was adopted by the Board of Supervisors on June 18, 2019. This report identified five key strategies to address homelessness:

- 1. Increase access to safe, affordable housing;
- 2. Use best practices to deliver tailored support services;
- 3. Build a collective action plan;
- 4. Strengthen support system to obtain and maintain housing;
- 5. Build provider capacity to address complex needs.

The Phase II Community Action Plan to Address Homelessness community outreach involved feedback from over 400 community members, key stakeholder groups, and feedback during the Consolidated Plan process. Staff gathered funding amounts for housing and services dedicated to homelessness in Santa Barbara County for a 12-month period and analyzed recent state and federal investments to address homelessness. The housing and shelter needs identified were based on a gaps analysis conducted which included system modeling using data from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), the Coordinated Entry System (CES), Point in Time (PIT) Count and other data sources. Gaps identified included (but were not limited to) need for additional rental assistance and rapid rehousing; incentives for landlords; shelter beds; and assistance for Transitional Aged Youth. These critical steps assisted both the CoC and County to identify eligible uses and meet threshold criteria for the CoC and County to apply for the HHAP funds.

The County and CoC have determined the following eligible uses will address critical gaps in the homeless response system and strengthen current investments to address homelessness (Table 2).

On behalf of the CoC, the County will apply for HHAP funding to provide Rental assistance and rapid rehousing (RRH), as it was determined to be one of the largest unmet needs in the conducted gaps analysis. Rental assistance and rapid rehousing generally are used with a private market housing unit and will be paired with incentives for landlords to dedicate units to rental assistance and rapid rehousing participants referred through the Coordinated Entry System. Incentives to landlords include funding from a Flexible Housing Subsidy Fund, which will cover rental deposits, and other potential losses from vacancies. Santa Barbara County has a large unsheltered population, many of whom have chronic illnesses. The County is in the process of identifying a suitable site for a Crisis Respite Navigation Center in South County, which will provide 30-40 needed temporary beds for this identified gap in the homeless response system. The CoC has opted to designate \$700,000 of their HHAP funding allocation to support the Crisis Respite Navigation Center.

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The County will apply for HHAP funding to provide outreach and coordination to assist vulnerable populations in accessing permanent housing and to promote housing stability in supportive housing. A multi-disciplinary team proposed to be formed with the Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) funding awarded to the County by the CoC is still pending Board of Supervisors approval. The proposed team would include staff from Behavioral Wellness, the Public Defender's Office and Public Health. The HHAP funding would allow the team to continue after the HEAP funding ends on June 30, 2021. As stated, the County is in the process of identifying a suitable site for a Crisis Respite Navigation Center in South County to provide temporary beds to persons experiencing homelessness.

Both applications include funding to address youth homelessness, which is defined as unaccompanied youth between the ages of 12 and 24 who are experiencing homelessness. An unaccompanied youth can be pregnant or parenting. HHAP requires a minimum of 8% of funding to be used to address youth homelessness. The County and CoC have combined their allocations to maximize the impact of the youth set-aside funds.

Both applications include funding requests for administrative and system support costs. System support costs provide for software user fees and staff support of the HMIS and CES administered by the County's Housing and Community Development Division of the Community Services department (HCD/CSD). The State of California will be integrating the collection of HMIS data into new funding stream reporting requirements.

The State of California set the following threshold criteria to apply for HHAP funds:

- Demonstrate regional coordination;
- Identification of all funds currently being used to provide housing and homeless services;
- Assessment of existing programs and gaps analysis;
- Identification of how funds requested will complement existing investments and close gaps;
- List of measurable goals including percentage placed in permanent housing;
- Data on the demographics and characteristics of homeless population (HMIS and PIT); Coordinated Entry System and HMIS.
- Letter of support from other HHAP recipient covering same or overlapping geographic regions.

Performance Measure:

Per HSC § 50219(a)(6), all applicants' measurable goals must include the number of individuals they intend to serve, and the number of individuals they intend to successfully place in permanent housing with HHAP funding. This chart identifies clear, measurable goals that HHAP will be expected to achieve in Santa Barbara County:

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

Approval of this Board action authorizes staff to apply for HHAP grant funds. When combining the CoC and County allocations, Community Services will administer \$4,091,624 in HHAP funding to address homelessness in Santa Barbara County. HHAP is a multi-year grant of one-time funds to be expended by June 30, 2025. Once the State has issued confirmation of grant award, staff will work on a local Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). Staff will return to the Board at a later meeting to review recommendations on any subrecipient awards.

Key_Contract_Risks:

CSD administers federal and state funding programs on behalf of the County and the CoC. As the recipient of state and federal funds, the County is responsible for ensuring that funds are used in accordance with all applicable requirements. HHAP program guidelines indicate that failure to comply with program requirements may result in the County being required to repay funds. Sub-recipients selected will have prior experience operating homeless assistance projects.

The Program Subrecipient Agreements will be on a cost-reimbursement basis. This allows CSD to review and monitor sub-recipients for eligible costs to the extent prescribed by the state guidelines to mitigate risk. Disbursements will be made after the sub-recipients demonstrate that reimbursable services were provided and substantiate the eligibility of incurred costs to the satisfaction of CSD.
