Please affirm the Planning Commission's denial of the revised Santa Barbara West Coast Farms Project.

- I have personally smelled the Odors from the grow behind the Pence Property while driving along HWY 246 with my windows rolled up! How much worse will it be with Cannabis lining the highway itself? Will we be wearing masks forever? I moved my family here in 1992 for the clean air, pure water and unspoiled rural character of our Valley, not for it to turn into Industrial Cannabis County! We have a right to expect clean air in this valley!
- Residents, Vintners and Farmers vehemently OPPOSE the threat of an **Industrial Cannabis Corridor** lining Hwy 246 west of Buellton, and this DENIED project is only one of many cannabis applications in the immediate vicinity. These applications will create an environment inconsistent with both the essence of the Santa Ynez Community Plan and the CEQA premise that "It is necessary to provide a high-quality environment that at all times is healthful and pleasing to the senses and intellect of man."
- This project will impact agricultural activities on non-cannabis farms, specifically application of standard materials (e.g. sprays to control pests and mildew) and standard practices (such as plowing that kicks up dust). Fear of law suits from cannabis growers has stopped professional applicators who prevent drift from working near cannabis operations. This impacts the long term viability of non-cannabis farming which is protected in the Ag Element
- This project will impact quality of agricultural products specifically wine or the perceived quality of wine both threatening the industry in SB County.

We thank you for the work you and staff are doing and we hope that you are all healthy and safe during these challenging times.

We ask that you please read the following 248-word statement into the Public Record for Agenda Item #3 – Santa Barbara West Coast Farms:


We ask that the Board uphold the 5-0 denial by the Planning Commission for the West Coast application. This 50 acre industrial scale operation will adversely impact the entire Buellton community and legacy agriculture, wine and tourism. As shown in the attached map, 6 industrial cannabis projects run adjacent to each other along the scenic Highway 246 corridor - our designated Gateway to the Santa Ynez Valley and the STA Rita Hills wine appellation.

Combined with 21 pending projects in the area, this clustering of cannabis operations will total over 200 acres. The pungent smell of marijuana, coupled with the unsightly hoops in which it is grown, creates a virtual stop sign for visitors who support our hotels, restaurants, and tasting rooms. The Santa Barbara Wine Country's "brand" is built on its scenic landscapes and outdoor tasting experiences. Visitors that come for the outdoor experience only to find cannabis odors, will not come back. The significant odors produce and impacting over 20 tasting rooms and wineries in the immediate area and present a direct threat to the wine and tourism industries - the primary economic engines of the Santa Ynez Valley.

The over-proliferation of commercial cannabis operations, excessive acreage and density of grows along the 246 and Santa Rosa Road scenic corridors will put our wine industry out of business.

Please uphold the PC denial for West Coast and evaluate every successive application through a CUP and the project's impact on the surrounding community and environs.

Dear Board of Supervisors:

I respectfully ask that my email be read the Public Record. My name is Kurt Ammann and I am the General Manager of Melville Winery. We are a family owned and operated Estate Vineyard and Winery located approximately 6 miles west of the proposed project. We are very concerned about the cumulative impact of smells and Terpene released from 50 acres of Cannabis and the damage it can do to vineyards, tasting rooms, other agriculture, and visitors experiences in the very windy area. We are also very concerned about the visual blight that 50 acres of hoop houses will cause especially since it is located at the front door of the Sta. Rita Hills AVA. The proposed development is in the Santa Ynez Valley Community Plan, which makes it only 1 of 4 special Gateways in the SYV. It completely ignores this plan's mission which is to protect the scenic corridors and pastoral beauty of the region. The proposed odor control system (Byers) is not proven to remove all Cannabis odors, smells and certainly not Terpenes. Residents in Carpentaria say it emits Vapors that have a scent which would only add more smells and chemical compounds to the air, which will ultimately fall on our vineyards.

I am asking you to endorse your Planning Commission's decision to <u>not</u> approve the Westcoast Farms development for the following reasons:

- Westcoast Farms is at the entrance to one of the four gateways to the Santa Ynez Valley
  Community Plan (SYCP). Having 50 acres of Cannabis seen as a sea of plastic hoop
  houses completely ignores the guidelines and spirit behind development in Santa
  Barbara County. This large scale and industrialized Cannabis will ruin the bucolic and
  rural nature of the region.
- The odor and terpene drift from 50 acres of Cannabis will be unprecedented in size and scale affecting residents, other agriculture, vineyards and tasting rooms. Pence Vineyards is directly across the street and therefore will be exposed to these odors and terpenes for 3-4 months due to their harvest schedules. This will be further compounded by the east/west and north winds that blow every day tainting their fruit as unusable and deterring customers from coming to experience their wines.

I am a second generation Winegrower and Winemaker here in the Santa Barbara County. We were drawn here back in 1990 due to the rising acclaim of the region for the quality cultivation of winegrapes. Our mild daytime temperatures, ancient sea-bed soils, cold evenings, and cold breezes blowing off the cold pacific make for a near perfect place to grow world class grapes. The problem with Cannabis grows in Santa Barbara County is that they have grown relatively unchecked, and certainly out of step with how wineries and vineyards were allowed to establish themselves over the last 3 decades. Most Cannabis growers have intentionally flocked to the area, not for the climate, but rather for the loose laws and enforcement provided by our officials. I reference this Politico article that mocks Santa Barbara County for its unrestricted growth <a href="https://www.politico.com/news/2020/02/18/wine-vs-weed-in-napa-valley-115322">https://www.politico.com/news/2020/02/18/wine-vs-weed-in-napa-valley-115322</a>. We are routinely held up as the Poster Child for how NOT to manage Cannabis growth in California. I am concerned about the cumulative impact of Smells and Terpene that will be released from 50 acres of Cannabis and the damage it can do to vineyards, tasting rooms and other agriculture in a wind prone wine region (our grape growing areas are literally defined by winds). I am further against the Visual Blight of 50 acres of Plastic and Hoop Houses in the Gateway to the Sta Rita Hills. In some corridors in Santa Barbara County, one needs to ask permission for the color of their barns...yet these Cannabis grows can create such an ugly, unnatural and smelly sight corridor.

Good Morning Chair Hart and Supervisors,

Please uphold the unanimous Planning Commission decision to deny the West Coast Farms project.

In my opinion, there are several ongoing problems with the Cannabis Ordinance, including the immense size of proposed projects such as this one, the uncertainty associated with current odor abatement techniques, the granting of permanent land use entitlements before unintended consequences to neighborhoods become apparent, and the potential cumulative impacts caused by the clustering of Cannabis projects in sensitive areas like the Lompoc and Santa Ynez valleys.

West Coast Farms is way too large and is too close to the City of Buellton. Persistent westward winds will blow any odors associated with this project towards Solvang and Buellton, where residents have already been complaining about Cannabis odor.

The proposed project is too close to existing vineyards and wine tasting rooms. Please protect the established farming operations from Cannabis grows. They are not compatible with each other.

The wine industry is well established in Santa Barbara County and needs your respect and support. Wineries contribute to our local economy in many ways, providing good jobs, sales and property tax dollars, and they also attract tourists to our area.

Please do not jeopardize the future success of our local wine industry by allowing incompatible activities to move in, in this case right next door. Established businesses should be given priority when changes to our important agricultural and scenic areas are being considered.

This is the wrong place for a commercial Cannabis operation of this size.

We are all suffering financially, and particularly the wine and restaurant sector. However, reading in the papers that the BOS believes that the cannabis industry is the panacea is more than disturbing. Do you know that we are all scrambling to connect with our direct customers to try to keep our businesses viable until we can re-open? As an operator of a 68 year old family business, the Hitching Post Restaurant, that has been built around the legacy agriculture and tourism brought to our region by the growing of grapes, I must voice my objection to this West Coast Farms Project. It is imperative that we maintain a rural agriculture farming environment at the entrance to and within the visual perspective of the tourism corridors of the grape growing valleys of Santa Barbara County.

I have written before to explain my concern as a citizen and a winery owner of the seriously deleterious effect that unchecked cannabis growth will have upon our neighborhood, the already established (and very valuable and productive) wine industry and tourism more generally. Fifty acres of hoop houses in the middle of the Santa Rita Hills wine growing region is a visual blight of immense proportions. Moreover, the odor and the potential for terpene drift to adjacent vineyards are serious concerns for agriculture and tourism. We have all smelled Carpinteria from the freeway, and they apparently have odor mitigation measures.

The Santa Ynez Valley is a world-class wine growing region that brings notoriety to Santa Barbara, large scale tourism and obviously significant revenue. It would be the height of foolishness to sacrifice this young but already world-renowned wine industry to the forces of industrial cannabis production. This product further threatens litigation already existing agriculture – even certified organic agriculture.

It is painfully obvious that cannabis production is not traditional agriculture, and it is NOT compatible with legacy agriculture or the Santa Ynez Community Plan, which seeks to maintain and celebrate the natural beauty of the region. Giant swaths of hoop houses violate those principles, regardless of what is being growth in them. This product also produces noxious odors and the need for armed guards. It violates the community plan. This project should be rejected.
