For the June 2nd meeting regarding sensible cannabis cultivation, please note the following urgent concerns:

- 1. Highway 246 is the major highway in the Santa Ynez valley. In Colorado, since cannabis legalization, traffic fatalities have tripled, due to impaired drivers. Concentrating cannabis farms on this major highway, with the increase in impaired drivers it will bring, will be a clear danger to my family and neighbors whose homes front the highway.
- 2. Since legalization, Colorado has had a quadrupling of emergency room visits for 'cannabis induced psychosis', which includes paranoid schizophrenia, which can be irreversible. Dear friends, godparent to our granddaughter, experienced a murder-suicide involving paranoid schizophrenia from cannabis use, and our family has yet to recover. A local friend has had a similar experience in his family, and our daughter has encountered multiple cases of it in San Diego, where she is a police officer. This danger is tragic and real, and should not be encouraged to be concentrated in our valley when we have other options now available
- 3. Cannabis cultivation in Carpinteria has resulted in lawsuits against established agriculture, plummeting home values and chronic debility due to the odor. Because of the turpine creep, cannabis can destroy established wineries in our valley and degrade or ruin a billion dollar wine industry that has taken decades to establish. Cannabis does not seem to be compatible with existing agriculture as required by state agricultural standards when a new crop is introduced.

This is the story of and explosion and fire that occurred last Saturday evening in a cannabis processing firm in downtown Los Angeles. I am a 35 year resident of Solvang and a retired Los Angeles City Firefighter. I am forwarding this story to our Board in case they are not aware of the inherent dangers of cannabis processing. The processing uses large amounts of butane or propane which is very explosive in order to extract the honey oil from the plants. I know that we are in the middle of permitting or not permitting cannabis grows, but I feel that the processing, if it is going to take place in the county, needs to be highly regulated and regularly inspected for compliance along with the grows themselves. It should be classified as a hazardous material processing business with all the necessary regulations. Thank you for your consideration.



Dear County Supervisors,

As a resident of Buellton, I am very concerned about the proliferation of cannabis cultivation in the corridor between Buellton and Lompoc. While I support measured, well-planned cultivation in general, I believe there are too many acres being concentrated along Hwy 246 in an area close to schools, residences, senior living communities, parks and pre-existing agricultural industries such as vineyards, equestrian centers and other small farms. Odor is a major concern as there are already days that the skunk smell of cannabis is reaching my home and the River View Park. Carpinteria is so horrendous that I am affected by the odor even driving on 101 with my windows and vents closed. Increased traffic, safety and security issues, lighting, and aesthetic degradation of the viewscape are all factors to consider.

I urge you to approve the County Planning Commission's recommendations amending the Cannabis Land Used Ordinances to:

- 1) Require Conditional Use Permits for cannabis cultivation and on-site processing activities on agriculturally designated lands.
- 2) Require Odor Abatement Plans for all cannabis cultivation and processing.

With regard to Odor Abatement, methods which add other odors that may be noxious to sensitive individuals are not good solutions!

Thank you for your diligence in monitoring this burgeoning industry with a balanced approach taking our local communities into consideration.
