Governor's Road Map

Resilience Roadmap Stages

STAGE 1: Safety and Preparedness

Making essential workforce environment as safe as possible.

STAGE 2: Lower Risk Workplaces

Creating opportunities for lower risk sectors to adapt and re-open.

Modified school programs and childcare re-open.

STAGE 3: Higher Risk Workplaces

Creating opportunities for higher risk sectors to adapt and re-open.

STAGE 4: End of Stay-At-Home Order

Return to expanded workforce in highest risk workplaces.

Requires Therapeutics.



Governor's Road Map

Stage 2: Lower Risk Workplaces

Gradually opening some lower risk workplaces with ADAPTATIONS:

- Retail (e.g. curbside pickup)
- Manufacturing
- Offices (when telework not possible)
- Opening more public spaces

Expanded Workforce Safety Net:

Wage replacement so workers can stay home when sick



Stage 2: Re-opening of lower-risk workplaces

- Guidelines for reopening as of May 8
- Phase 2 Initial businesses opened with modifications
 - <u>Curbside retail</u> such as clothing, bookstore, sporting good stores, toy stores, shoes stores, home and furnishing stores, antique stores, music stores, florists, etc.
 - Associated manufacturing and supply chains
 - Physical distancing and worker/customer protections will be needed



Stage 2: Re-opening of lower-risk workplaces

What can be open later in Phase 2:

- Destination retail, including shopping malls and swap meets
- Personal services, limited to: car washes & tanning facilities
- Office based businesses (telework still strongly encouraged)
- Dine-in restaurants (other facility amenities, like bars or gaming areas, are not permitted)
- School and childcare facilities
- Outdoor museums and open gallery spaces



Stage 2: Re-opening of lower-risk workplaces

➤ Variance to Stage 2

- Counties can move more quickly through the Initial Stage 2, if they <u>attest</u> that they meet State's readiness criteria
- Counties must still stay in Stage 2; cannot advance into Stage 3 until Governor moves State into Stage 3
- Counties begin the process with phone consultation with CDPH
- Counties submit a readiness plan attesting to meeting stated readiness criteria
- Readiness plans will be posted publicly on CDPH's website



Local Variance Criteria

Epidemiologic Stability

- No more than 1 case per 10,000 residents for the past 14 days
- No COVID-19 death in the past 14 days

Protection of Stage One Essential Workers Status

- Clear guidance for employers and essential critical infrastructure workplaces to protect essential workers
- Availability of disinfectant supplies and protective gear

Testing Capacity

Minimum daily testing of 1.5 per 1,000 residents

Containment Capacity

- At least 15 contact tracers per 100,000 residents
- Ability to temporarily house at least 15% of county residents experiencing homelessness

Local Variance Criteria, cont.

→ Hospital Capacity

- County or Regional capacity to accommodate a minimum surge of 35%
- Hospital facilities must have a robust plan to protect hospital workforce

≻ Vulnerable Populations

 Skilled nursing facilities must have more than 14 day supply of PPE on hand for staff with ongoing procurement from non-state supply chains

Sectors and Timelines

 Which sectors and spaces will be opened, in what sequence, and what timeline

> Triggers for Adjusting Modifications

 Metrics that serve as triggers for either slowing the pace through Stage 2, or tightening modifications



State Sponsored Community Testing STATUS

- Collected over 1600 specimens collected as of Monday evening
- •Received 191 results so far... 4 positives in-county
- Results are available 5 to 7 days from date of collection
- More resource intensive than anticipated
- Santa Maria: Wed to Sun
- Lompoc: Fri to Tue
- Santa Barbara: Thurs to Mon
- •We are now able to block appointments for key groups, based on Public Health requests.
 - All other appointments are first come first serve for now










NEW CASES IN PAST 2 WEEKS: City-by-City











DAILY: New Cases (COMMUNITY ONLY)





PERCENTAGE in MED/SURG vs. ICU






TESTS PER 1000 RESIDENTS (TODAY)



% TESTS POSITIVE (TODAY)






Takeaway regarding data

- > 790 new inmate cases account for ~88% of total new cases
- > Reaching capacity of daily testing volume to test 1.5 per 1,000
- Hospital capacity to absorb surge










Total Recovered Cases with regular flu is not available as described above. PHD is providing total cases of COVID with number recovered and dead.











Takeaways regarding Influenza & COVID-19

INFLUENZA

- ➤ Not a test confirmed diagnosis
- > 7 deaths in 3 months
- ➤ R0- reproduction number 1.2-1.4
- > Fatality rate 0.01%
- Wide spread immunity in population
- > Vaccine and medications available

COVID-19

- > 11 test confirmed deaths in 1 month
- > R0- reproduction number 2.5
- > Fatality rate 5.7% in USA
- No immunity in population
- No vaccine
- No medications other than experimental convalescent serum



Behavioral Wellness Data/Findings

- Decrease in daytime Access Line call volume
- Recent increase in information requests for MH & SUD treatment services
- Decrease in SUD treatment screenings and referrals
- Increase in the number of deaths by suicide in the month of April
- Increase in referrals for mental health screening from the Child Welfare System, seen in March and April
- High demand for PHF beds from criminal justice system referrals
- Community Wellness Team
 - Resource and Referral Line active
 - Services available virtually and countywide in English and Spanish
 - Range from linkage to individual counseling to online support groups






Be Well: Change in MH & SUD ACCESS Screening/Referrals 1/20-4/20






Be Well-Mental Health Outpatient Services





Be Well - Mental Health Crisis Services






Be Well - Substance Use Treatment

- All outpatient SUD treatment providers transitioned to telehealth
- 2 outpatient providers continue limited face to face with telehealth
- Consistent DMC billing (24-30K minutes/week from 2/23-4/19)
- Difficulty maintaining engagement with complex/co-occurring clients
- No significant decrease in Opioid treatment program dosing services
- @(750) OTP clients; roughly half receiving take-home doses
- Decreased OTP counseling (17K-13K minutes/week from 2/23-4/19)
- Increase in Residential treatment admissions (33 February- 48 April)



- •24/7 Access Line for crisis and routine referrals for MH/SUD treatment, fully staffed and operational

- •Psychiatric Health Facility, Crisis Stabilization Unit, Crisis Services, Co-Response teams & Sobering Center open
