

Cumulative Cases





7-Day Rolling Sum of New Cases by Area





Blueprint Framework

County risk level	Adjusted case rate* 7-day average of daily COVID-19 cases per 100K with 7-day lag, adjusted for number of tests performed	Positivity rate** 7-day average of all COVID-19 tests performed that are positive
WIDESPREAD Many non-essential indoor business operations are closed	More than 7 Daily new cases (per 100k)	More than 8% Positive tests
SUBSTANTIAL Some non-essential indoor business operations are closed	4-7 Daily new cases (per 100k)	5 – 8% and 5.3 – 8% health equity metric Positive tests
MODERATE Some indoor business operations are open with modifications	1 – 3.9 Daily new cases (per 100k)	2 – 4.9% and 2.2 – 5.2% health equity metric Positive tests
MINIMAL Most indoor business operations are open with modifications	Less than 1 Daily new cases (per 100k)	Less than 2% and Less than 2.2% health equity metric Positive tests



*Small counties (those with a population less than 106,000) may be subject to alternate case assessment measures for purposes of tier assignment.

**Health equity metric is not applied for small counties.

EMERGENCY BRAKE

- Due to an unprecedented surge in cases in every region in CA, CDPH implemented immediate changes to its tier assignment process:
 - Tier assignments may occur any day of the week and may occur more than once a week
 - Counties may be moved back more than one tier if CDPH determines a need for intensive intervention
 - Moved counties with one week of worsening metrics (as opposed to the usual 2 during times of stability)
 - Moved counties by more than one tier if metrics merited this
 - Counties will be required to implement any sector changes the day following the tier announcement
 - County requests for tier adjudication will not hold the county in the current tier during adjudication





Case rate trend





Testing Positivity Trend


Santa Barbara County 7-day Average Community Test Positivity Percent



As of 11/15, CDPH changed the Case Rate and Testing positivity metrics to reflect a 4 day lag instead of a 7 day lag. Previously the data reported on 11/16 would reflect 11/1-11/7 data, but wth the changes now reflects 11/4-11/11 data. HPI data was not released this week.

School Guidance

>The emergency brake does not alter the state guidelines governing school reopenings.

Schools that have already re-opened may remain open.
These schools shall follow the guidance provided by CDPH when determining when or if to close.

Schools that have not re-opened may provide in-person instruction under the elementary school waiver process, or through small cohorts.

>Otherwise, schools may not reopen for in-person instruction until the county has been in the substantial (Red) tier for two weeks.



>Health Officer Order will be issued to reflect modifications of sectors

> Per State requirement, HOO will be effective @ Tuesday, 11/17, @ 12:59 pm



Potential Guidelines from State

- Curfew advisory @10 pm, and may eventually require businesses to close at a certain time.
- Revisions on facial coverings, restaurants, and capacity at essential businesses.

Community Testing



Community Testing

>SM, Buellton, and Goleta OptumServe sites

- >165 appts per day at each site
- >495 total tests per day at the three sites
- SM & Buellton utilization: ~100 appt per day

➢Goleta site

- ➢ Routinely full
- ➢Will be opened 6 days a week

>Addition of 5 extra days per month = 825 new appointment available per month

- > 3 additional walk-up sites
- Sector partners for testing
