How Did We Get Here?

- Detachment is not a new issue
 - Detachment was anticipated by residents eight years ago when voting for incorporation
 - Voters supported detachment after extensive public debate
- Consolidation has been recommended
 - Three studies performed over the past 20 years have recommended consolidation
 - The most resent study was conducted in 2005
 - Despite the study's results, consolidation was rejected by GWSD's Board

Detachment Application

- The will of the voters
 - Council directed staff to begin applying to detach territory within city limits
- Comprehensive financial analysis
 - The City contracted with Bartle Wells to analyze the effects of detachment
 - Bartle Wells is a well-respected special districts financial consulting firm which has done studies for over 430 special districts, including GSD and GWSD

Two is Not Better Than One

- It is inefficient and irresponsible to spend...
 - Thousands of dollars on street sweeping services
 - Over \$1.1 million in pre-funding pension liability for six employees
 - More than \$750,000 over the past year in legal expenses
- Having two sanitary districts in Goleta is not economically efficient
 - It means double boards, stipends, conferences, overhead, etc.

Detachment Makes 'Cents'

- We owe it to the public to...
 - Reduce redundancies
 - Limit the layers of government
 - Spend taxpayer dollars effectively
- Significant improvements in efficiency could be realized through detachment
 - The City's analysis identifies over \$500,000 in annual savings

Annual Cost Savings

Administrative Services \$110,000

Financial Services \$153,000

Legal Services \$310,000


Misc. Services \$7,000

Total \$580,000

Rates Will Go Up

- But detachment can mitigate this
 - By allowing County staff to work with the City and GSD, we can better respond to concerns about rates
 - Goleta is committed to the stabilization of sewer rates over a 3-5 year period
 - Given the opportunity, the City would use whatever means available to secure rates

Other Benefits of Detachment

- Transparency
 - Televised meetings
 - A progressive website
 - Streaming audio and video of all meetings
- Improved Infrastructure
 - Council is committed to the District's infrastructure needs
 - Council has agreed with the County to set aside \$20 million in reserves for the treatment plant upgrade
- Prop 13
 - Pre-Prop 13 Special Districts with large fund balances have been the target of State takeaways
 - Local taxpayers deserve to have their tax dollars stay in this County

The Bottom Line?

- Bartle Wells validated what the voters sought some eight years ago
- We hope the Board of Supervisors will find value in working with the City on this proposal
