Census 2020 Overview

- A nationwide count of every person living in the United States is held once every ten years, as required by law.
- Determines the amount of federal funding our community receives and the number of representatives; census data is also used for state and local redistricting.

Santa Barbara County Complete Count Committee

- Santa Barbara Foundation, Santa Barbara County Association of Governments & the County of Santa Barbara formed a Complete Count Committee (CCC) comprised of over 100 leaders from the public, private and nonprofit sectors to jointly develop and implement effective outreach strategies while maximizing resources.
- CCC employed a grassroots strategy to reach the hardest-to-count populations, or those less likely to respond to the census. The committee also served to provide technical assistance and help with those organizations on the ground achieve CCC goals.



Santa Barbara County Complete Count Committee

- An Implementation Plan was submitted to the State and approved in November 2019, describing census tract targets, the hard-to-count communities being reached and planned activities.
- Four Strategic Goals established:
 - ✓ Engage community resources to coordinate in the development and execution of outreach efforts. Achieved with CCC partnerships
 - ✓ Increase community awareness of the importance of the census, and build trust in the security, confidentiality and purpose for counting households regardless of legal status through a comprehensive, multilingual, multimodal communication campaign. Achieved with robust multimodal outreach
 - Active outreach to hard-to-count populations through education and engagement. Achieved with Innovative, multilingual outreach methods
 - Support every community member's participation in the Census 2020 by eliminating barriers to access. Achieved with varied methods, equipment offered & educational outreach conducted

Insurance Program, Pell Education Grants, and others relating to adoption and foster care, housing, vocational rehabilitation, emergency food and housing for families, child welfare, small business development and

our neighbors, family, friends and coworkers take this responsibility seriously. The census is a oncein-a-decade opportunity to help determine how much federal funding is distributed into our communities and how political boundaries are drawn for elected

Final Census 2020 data delayed

The U.S. Census Bureau has delayed deadline for disseminating final numbers (due to COVID-19), adjusted timeline:

- April 30, 2021 population counts used for apportionment.
- September 30, 2021 redistricting counts to the states.
