As an Indigenous woman, an executive, a social worker, and as a clinician leader with various perspectives varying from individual health, public health, population management, and medical administration, I want to leverage my unique scope of knowledge to support the work of the Women's Commission. Furthermore, it would be my great honor to represent the City of Guadalupe on the Women's Commission and learn from a circle of women who are committed to promoting the well-being and equal status of women in Santa Barbara County. My personal and professional life are very integrated at this phase of my life. In my professional experience, while navigating the line between clinician and executive, I have championed through example a culture of civility and inclusion among leadership, key staff, and my service lines. My department has changed the clinical care teams because it is intentionally ethnically, racially, culturally, and linguistically diverse to better meet the behavioral needs of our patient population. We have piloted programs and developed affirming spaces for our LGBTQA community. When I arrived at Community Health Centers of the Central Coast 5 years ago, I was one of 6 behavioral health clinicians. Today, we embody 4 service lines. The goal of our behavioral health community-based education and outreach activities is to empower newly identified members of special populations and to systematically deconstruct institutional and cultural barriers that have not been affirming of their healthcare needs. We have created a safe space through trauma-informed, network-wide community circles, and groups that foster trust between members of these special populations and the larger systems of care. As a result of our behavioral health integration initiatives, local community members have been challenging social norms and cultural roles which previously impeded their ability to access mental health services. Through these pointed outreach efforts the team has addressed multiple barriers to accessing services, such as those related to culture, language, transportation, location, stigma, and institutional mistrust or fear due to historical experiences of discrimination and racism. In 2021, we as a community must create a cross-sector network focused on the promotion of healing and unity of our families and that begins with women.

The Behavioral Health Team at Community Health Centers of the Central Coast and I work very closely with the farmworkers and there is a tremendous need during this pandemic to create remote access for families who have fallen through the digital divide. Moreover, the disparities experienced by the most marginalized patients have been exacerbated by the recent transition to remote and virtual platforms. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, our patients struggled to navigate the structural inequities which are further compounded for the women and children we serve in Northern Santa Barbara County. As I look forward, past the coronavirus pandemic, to the inevitable ripple effects on our economy, our healthcare delivery system, even our collective mental hardiness, a goal, and mission begins to emerge of how to best serve the community. This is a potential area of focus for this commission. In 2021, I hope to further expand our clinical and community programs through technology-based platforms to close the digital divide that exists within the populations we serve.

In 2015, she completed a Public Health program focused on health equity and community organizing in American Indian and Indigenous populations from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She is the Director of Behavioral Health and Psychiatry Services for Community Health Centers of the Central Coast and oversees the adolescent and adult mental health programs. In 2017, she received the Latino Legacy Award for her contributions to increasing access to mental health treatment in Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo County. Over the last 5 years, Magdalena and the CHC clinical leadership team have committed to developing a culturally and linguistically inclusive care model where diversity is celebrated at all levels.
