The new plan is an innovative, out-of-the box approach which is exactly what is needed to break the logjam and move the Goleta Beach effort forward.

Goleta Beach 2.0 moves threatened sewer and utility lines and parking spaces inland out of harms way. Moving the lines inland makes good sense and is good, long-term planning. In fact, the utility lines are located in the critical erosion zone and should be moved inland to Highway 217 to avoid future sewage spills on Goleta Beach. Moving the lines further inland will also avoid future calls for ecologically-damaging seawalls or revetments.

The Coastal Commission action last year was clear guidance not to pursue a structural solution. The Coastal Act and LCP both favor non-structural solutions which do not interrupt sand movement along the coast and which do not redirect

erosion problems and causes beaches to erode. Goleta Beach 2.0 preserves and enhances the Park, protects the beach (and down-coast beaches) while adding an acre of sand. It is environmentally sustainable and is supported by the Coastal Commission, community groups, scientists, and park users.
Goleta Beach 2.0 will protect the restaurant, the pier, and all park infrastructure while respecting the ocean?s natural processes. The new plan is a win-win for the environment and park users.
Please put an end to years of costly debate and take a solid step toward protecting our beloved Goleta Beach Park by initiating Goleta Beach 2.0.
