## **Recommended Actions:**

That the Board of Supervisors:

- Approve and execute an application for the destruction of Sheriff's Office copies of inked ten-print cards and inked palm print cards, as authorized by Government Code section 26202, from January 1969 – February 2000; and
- b. Determine pursuant to CEQA Guidelines 15378(b)(5) that the above actions are not a project subject to CEQA review, because it is a government administrative activity that does not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.

## **Summary Text:**

The Sheriff's Office, Forensics Unit has identified 8 large file cabinets, each with 5 drawers containing over 30,000 copies of inked ten-print/palm print cards, that are no longer necessary to maintain on file. The above listed items are copies of the original physical cards which were mailed and submitted to the California Department of Justice prior to the year 2000. Since the use of Livescan in the year 2000, maintaining hard copies of inked ten-print/palm print cards is no longer necessary as these records are electronically submitted via Livescan to the California Department of Justice. The Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Office (Records Bureau) has verified that all the above items are on file with the California Department of Justice for future reference. The copies of the inked ten-print/palm print cards

are deemed to have no further administrative, legal, or fiscal value to the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Office.

### Background:

California Government Code Section 26202 allows the Board of Supervisors to authorize the destruction of records that are more than two years old. "When the retention of any such record, paper or document is no longer necessary or required for County purpose."
