NOTICE OF EXEMPTION

Based on a preliminary review of the project the following activity is determined to be exempt from further environmental review requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) of 1970 (Pub. Res. Code Section 21000 et seq.), as defined in the State CEQA Guidelines and County Revised CEQA Guidelines.

LOCATION: Third Supervisorial District

PROJECT TITLE: Rescinding and Adopting Angle Parking in the Third Supervisorial District

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Public Works requests the Board of Supervisors adopt the proposed Resolution to rescind existing angle parking and re-establish it with new angle parking on Alamo Pintado Avenue in the Los Olivos area of the Third Supervisorial District.

The proposed project is to extend the existing angle parking on Alamo Pintado Avenue in the Third Supervisorial District by rescinding the existing angle parking and establishing new angle parking to include both the existing and new angle parking in one resolution.

Proposed Angle Parking Zone

Pursuant to County Code 23-11 permitted by California Vehicle Code Section 22503 the Board of Supervisors, by Resolution may designate portions of any highway under its jurisdiction as "angle parking zones" except on State highways.

• Alamo Pintado Avenue – Third Supervisorial District

Public Works recommends that your Board approve by resolution an angle parking zone on the north side of Alamo Pintado Avenue in the Los Olivos area by rescinding the existing angle parking zone established on January 29, 2019 in Resolution No. 19-22 and adopting the new angle parking zone (Vicinity Map #1). A recent Public Works project undergrounded the drainage channel that was parallel to Alamo Pintado Avenue. This has provided a new level surface adjacent to the roadway suitable for parking. Public Works will pave the area and stripe angle parking with the approval of the resolution. This will increase overall parking in Los Olivos. This new angle parking will add 19 regular and 1 van accessible parking stall to the existing 11 angled parking stalls.

The Public Works Department prepared the attached Resolution to rescind and adopt the angle parking zone at the following location:

THIRD DISTRICT - Los Olivos

RESCIND

Angle Parking Zone:

• On the north side of Alamo Pintado Avenue between a point 56 feet west of the centerline of Grand Avenue and a point 227 feet west of the centerline of Grand Avenue.

ADOPT

Angle Parking Zone:

• On the north side of Alamo Pintado Avenue from the centerline of Grand Avenue to the centerline of Nojoqui Avenue.

Cite specific CEQA and/or CEQA Guideline Section: 15301(c) Existing Facilities — Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. The types of "existing facilities", itemized below are not intended to be all inclusive of the types of projects which might fall within Class 1. The key consideration is whether the project involves negligible or no expansion of an existing use. Examples include but are not limited to: (c) Existing highways and streets, sidewalks, gutters, bicycle and pedestrian trails, and similar facilities (this includes road grading for the purpose of public safety).

Reasons to support exemption findings: Consistent with this exemption, the proposed project involves a in change parking designations as an effective method for improving traffic safety and circulation. Parking regulations on public roadways are established based upon safety, sight distance restrictions, necessity and how it relates to the use by the community as a whole. The project allows for a public safety activity designed to maintain a safe traveling condition of the highway facility as it was constructed. Further, there are no unusual circumstances which would create a possibility that there would be a significant effect. Therefore, the project can be found to be categorically exempt from CEOA.

There is no substantial evidence that there are unusual circumstances (including future activities) resulting in (or which might reasonably result in) significant impacts which

threaten the environment. The exceptions to the categorical exemptions pursuant to Section 15300.2 of the State CEQA Guidelines are:

(a) Location. Classes 3, 4, 5, 6, and 11 are qualified by consideration of where the project is to be located -- a project that is ordinarily insignificant in its impact on the environment may in a particularly sensitive environment be significant. Therefore, these classes are considered to apply all instances, except where the project may impact on an environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern where designated, precisely mapped, and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies.

CEQA Guidelines Section 15301 is a Class 1 exemption; therefore, this exception does not apply.

(b) Cumulative Impact. All exemptions for these classes are inapplicable when the cumulative impact of successive projects of the same type in the same place, over time is significant.

The project involves changes to parking areas on public roads. In addition, there are no other identified projects which would contribute to cumulative impacts. Therefore, this exception does not apply.

(c) Significant Effect. A categorical exemption shall not be used for an activity where there is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances.

The project involves a routine updating of parking regulations on public roads. Therefore, this exception does not apply.

(d) Scenic Highways. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project which may result in damage to scenic resources, including but not limited to, trees, historic buildings, rock outcroppings, or similar resources, within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway. This does not apply to improvements which are required as mitigation by an adopted negative declaration or certified EIR.

The project does not involve a scenic highway or a project which may result in damage to a scenic resource, removal of trees, rock outcropping or similar resource.

(e) Hazardous Waste Sites. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project located on a site which is included on any list compiled pursuant to Section 65962.5 of the Government Code.

There are no hazardous wastes site locations on public roads. Therefore, this exception does not apply.

(f) Historical Resources. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project which may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource.

The roadways involved are not identified as a historical resource. In addition, changes in roadway parking regulations would not involve any structural modifications to existing facilities. Therefore, this exception does not apply.
