




A System of Care and Recovery



Types of Facilities in the BeWell Continuum of Care

Acute

Facilities with the highest intensity level of medical and nursing support for patients in periods of acute psychiatric need. (Psychiatric Health Facility, Las Encinas)

Crisis

Facilities with available medical and nursing short term support to bridge individuals during periods of serious psychiatric crisis (23-hour bed Crisis Stabilization Unit, 30 day Crisis Residential)

Residential


A broad range of licensed facilities providing varying service intensity levels and longer-term stays (Residential Treatment Facilities, Mental Health Rehabilitation Center (MHRC), Board & Care)

Housing with lower service intensity levels that may provide onsite support for client recovery and independent living skills.

Department Priorities



Residential - Mental Health Rehabilitation Programs (MHRC)

Definition:

- 24-hour locked facility (also at times referred to as IMD)
- Intensive support and structured rehabilitation services
- Program designed to develop residents' skills to increase independence
- Considered a lower-level alternative to state hospitals

Strategies

- Recently secured two additional beds at the Champion MHRC for clients with misdemeanor offenses
- Goal is to secure an additional 16 MHRC beds with at least 6 for LPS (mental health) conservatorship state hospital stepdown



Residential - Adult and Youth Residential Facilities

Definition:

- A state licensure category for facilities serving adults 18 to 59 *receiving* specialty mental health services.
- Broad range of facilities offering different service level intensities.
- Examples range from out-of-County placements not currently available within County (Psynergy's unlocked MHRC funded by MHSA) to local residential treatment (Phoenix) and smaller facilities with onsite support (Alameda House)

Strategies

- Identify opportunities with community partners for development of additional Board and Care and residential treatment beds (focus on medically fragile, aging population)
- Explore MHSA and/or grant funding to support development of an unlocked MHRC to support clients transitioning from locked facilities to the community
- Continue to explore youth placement using grant and STRTP funding



Supportive Housing - Independent Living

Definition:

- Permanent housing with onsite support: Unlimited length of stay with some onsite mental health and substance use services and peer support. Examples: Pescadero Lofts, Homekey Studios
- Independent Living Units: Clients reside in private units. Minimal treatment staff onsite with linked services that support treatment. Examples: Garden St. apartments

Strategies

- Complete development of No Place Like Home (NPLH) funded projects
- Explore and secure sites for additional Homekey projects




