ARPA Funding Update: Recap and Focus

- \$86.7 million in two equal parts (Tranches): half in FY 2021-22 and half in FY 2022-23
- Must be obligated by December 31, 2024 and spent by December 2026
- Primary intent of funding is for community recovery needs and COVID costs
- Emphasis on equity, serving under-served and lowincome areas



ARPA Funding Update: Treasury Guidance

- Final Rule Guidance not yet issued as of October 11, 2021
- Lost Revenue Calculation *Updated*
 - Auditor-Controller calculated using prescribed entity-wide revenue growth
 - June 1 estimate of \$18 million increased to \$26.6 million
- New Compliance and Reporting Guidance issued June 24, 2021
 - Single audit and federal procurement regulations (2CFR200)
 - Quarterly expenditure reporting
 - Annual ARPA Recovery Plan Performance Report
 - Due within 60 days of drawdown of funds (November 29, 2021)
 - To be posted on the County's RecoverySBC.org website under ARPA Funding
- New Treasury's Portal for Recipient Reporting issued August 9, 2021



US Treasury 5 Spending Categories

- 1) To respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency or its negative economic impacts or services to disproportionately impacted communities;
- 2) To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to such eligible workers of the recipient, or by providing grants to eligible employers that have eligible workers who performed essential work;
- 3) For the provision of government services, to the extent of the reduction in revenue (lost revenue) of such recipient due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year of the recipient prior to the emergency;
- 4) To make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure; and
- 5) For administrative expenses, evaluation and data analysis or transfer to other government units as necessary.



Restricted vs. Discretionary Funding

 Restricted funding defined as costs for response and recovery efforts directly related to the public emergency and its effect on our communities. Focus of today's discussion.

*Support Public Health Response

*Address Negative Economic Impacts

*Premium Pay for Essential Workers

*Services to Disproportionately Impacted Comm.

*ARPA Administrative Expenses

*Infrastructure: Water, sewer and broadband

• **Discretionary funding** is related to <u>lost revenue</u> during the pandemic that is more flexible and can be spent on governmental services with few exceptions. Cannot be used for debt, settlements or replenishing rainy day or other reserve funds. To be discussed later in the fiscal year.

Prioritizing Needs Under ARPA

- Priority
 - Direct COVID-19 response costs
 - Administration, Compliance and Reporting
- Data and analysis studies
- Urgent infrastructure needs for water or sewer
- Critical health and human services needs
 - Underserved populations
 - Areas impacted by COVID



Prioritizing Needs Under ARPA: Health and Human Services Recovery Plan Framework

- Provide support interventions to most affected
- Incorporate equity and inclusion in service delivery
- Ensure capacity to deliver recovery services, continuity of critical County services and facilities, and sustainability of programs if continued beyond ARPA
- Develop innovative, rapid, and inclusive recovery activities



Approving Projects and Budget Adjustments

- Staff will prepare any budgetary adjustments for approved projects on subsequent Board agenda
- Majority vote required on most projects
- 4/5th vote required for transfers for non-General Fund departments for COVID cost reimbursements and projects primarily with staffing components

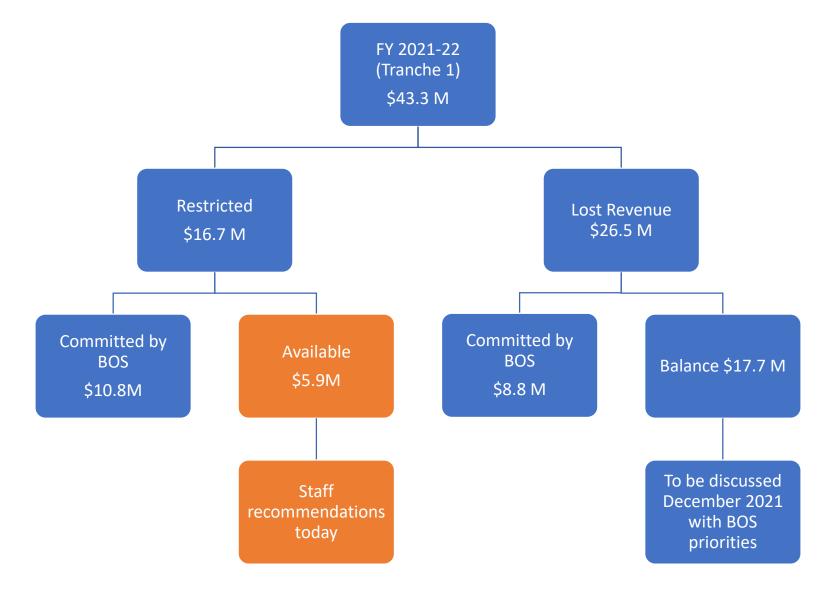

Tranche 1 Allocation Breakdown



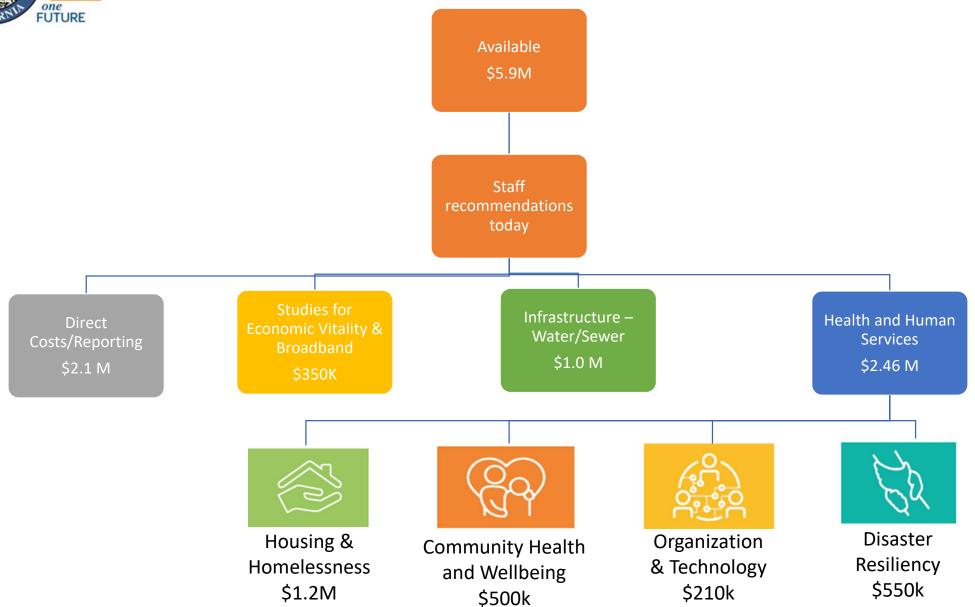

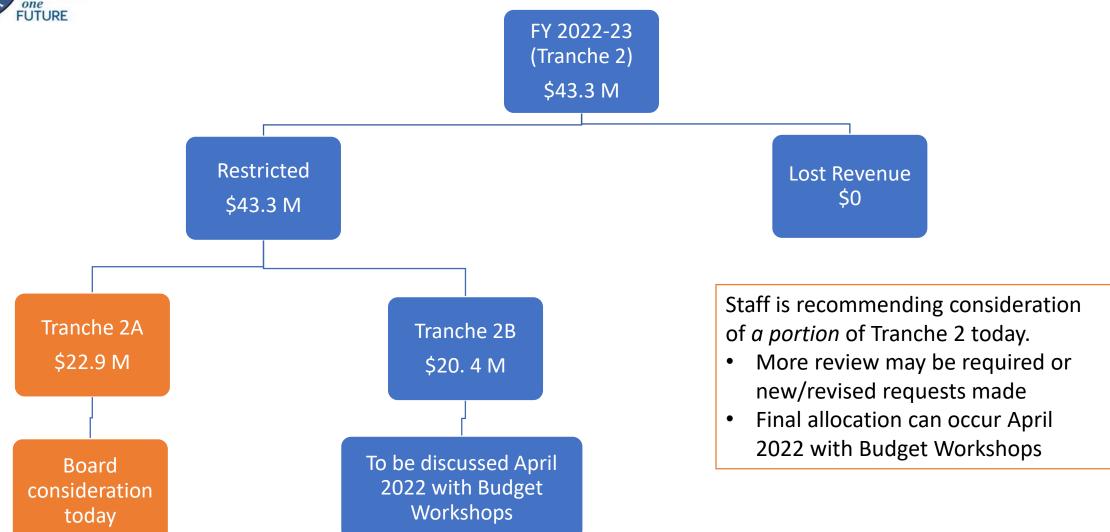

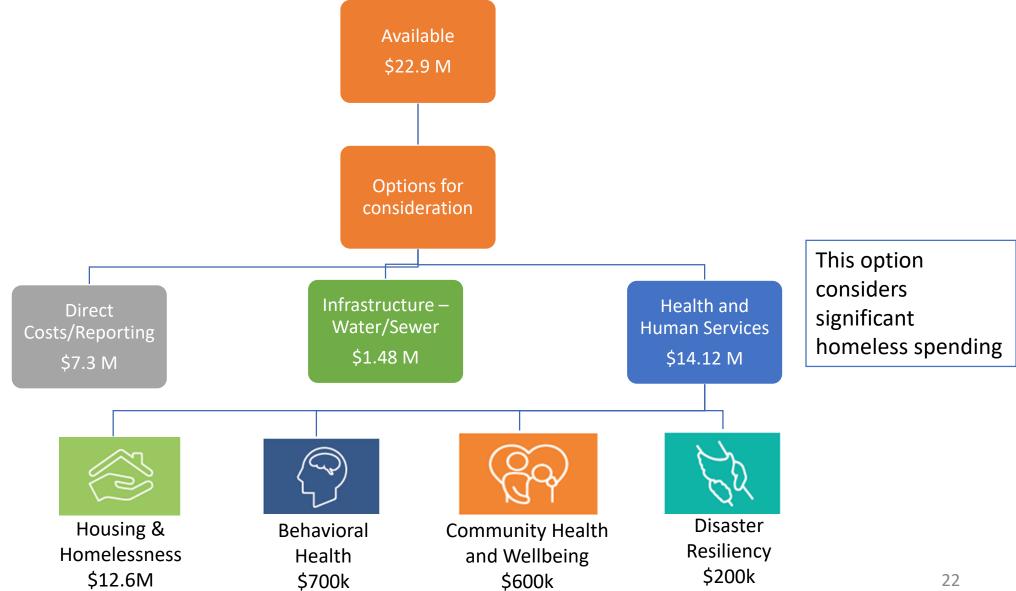


Tranche 2 Proposed Allocation

- c) Consider optional allocation prioritization of a portion of ARPA Tranche 2 funds towards eligible restricted categories for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23; (Slide 23)

- e) Determination that the above actions are not a project under CEQA.
